

Dear Residents,

Back in 2014, immediately after the current council's election, I set out that my objective as Leader was to work with organisations and individuals across the community to make Hounslow a place that we could all be proud to live, learn and work in.

The borough was in a tremendous position to achieve this, thanks not least to the diverse and vibrant mix of people who call this part of west London "home".

Achieving this ambitious goal was not going to be quick or easy. Not least because the council had been required to reduce its budget by £60 million over the previous four years, and was facing having to do the same again. Nevertheless, I was determined we should aim for this vision.

Our approach would build on the existing successes of the borough and tackle the key challenges that it faced. It would deliberately be innovative, as traditional methods alone were unlikely to be successful.

We would introduce new online services, build new Civic Offices in the town centre to boost regeneration, develop housing on the old Civic Centre site, and create new commercial ventures to generate income.

All of this would enable the council to provide residents with the widest possible range of quality services and real value for money.

The last three and a half years have been every bit as challenging as we could have expected. Funding for the council, like other parts of the public sector, has reduced massively, and at the same time the demand for our services has increased due to factors such as a growing and aging population.

It is against this backdrop that the effectiveness of our approach is now clear to be seen.

Great customer service is available from an expanded range of council services accessible via our website and over the phone. Construction of the new Civic Centre is underway, and the first blocks of new flats are nearing completion around the current Civic Centre. The council's trading company, Lampton 360, is now handling improved refuse and recycling collections across the borough, and the new depot to handle these materials will open later this year.

A full review of what the council set out to accomplish between 2014 and 2018, and what has been achieved, forms the bulk of this edition of Hounslow Matters. I believe this amounts to dramatic progress in achieving the ambitious goals.

Credit for that though is not just due to the council, its employees and contractors. Residents have played a huge part too. In everything from helping increase recycling to helping tackle antisocial behaviour such as littering and dog fouling.

By continuing to work together I am utterly confident Hounslow will become, and remain, the best borough in London.

Simple steps to cut "White Goods" fire risk



Hounslow Council is advising residents to take a few simple steps to help avoid fires caused by faulty "white goods" such as washers, dryers, fridges and freezers.

There have been 65 fires in the borough involving this type of appliance since 2010. Across the capital, London Fire Brigade attends,

on average, to one of these fires each day, and between 2010 and 2016 they caused nine deaths and 298 injuries. By taking some simple steps, everyone can minimise the risks:

- If any appliance starts making a strange noise, don't ignore it.
 Always unplug it and contact the manufacturer or a qualified appliance repair technician
- Check which electrical products have manufacturer recalls at www.london-fire.gov.uk
- Fit at least one smoke alarm on each floor of your home, and fit enough alarms to cover all areas where a fire could start
- Test your alarms regularly
- Plan how you would get out of your home
- Make sure appliances do not block routes out of your home so, if they do catch fire, they don't hinder your escape
- If a fire does start, don't try to fight it. Get out, stay out, and call 999 immediately.

Steve Curran, Leader of Hounslow Council, said: "While most white goods work safely without incident, it is clear that fires do occur. The council and Fire Brigade will play their part in addressing this but it is vital that residents follow the guidance above as well."

Hounslow students rise to tougher challenge of A levels and GCSEs

Cheers rang around the borough in August as Hounslow pupils celebrated top grades in both A levels and GCSEs.

More students in Hounslow who took on the new tougher A Levels achieved above the London and national average.



The percentage of A Levels in Hounslow at A*- A was up 2.1 percentage points to 23.2% in 2017, compared to 21.1% last year.

This year's provisional figures show that Hounslow's overall pass rate at 98.4% was above the London (97.6%) and national (97.9%) figurs.

In GCSEs, pupils performed to a higher standard in the new tougher English and Maths GCSEs, now graded from 9 (higher than A*) to a 1.

In English, 84% achieved a Grade 4 (standard pass - broadly equivalent to grade C) or better.

With Mathematics, 76% of students gained a GCSE Grade 4, which was 16 per cent better than other pupils in England.



Beat the Street

Thousands of people are taking to the streets of Hounslow once again to see who can walk, run or cycle the furthest for Beat the Street.

Schools, businesses, community groups and residents are taking part in the scheme which is funded by Hounslow Council and run by Intelligent Health.

It began in September and runs until Wednesday 8 November.

It is free to join in and there will be rewards including prizes for those clocking up the most miles across the borough either on foot or on a bicycle.

More than 180 special sensors

called 'Beat Boxes' have been allocated across Hounslow outside local landmarks, in parks and along popular walking and cycle routes.

Those taking part can pick up their own Beat the Street cards and maps from their local libraries and swipe the cards on the boxes to receive points and win prizes and raise money for charity.



Leader visits hospital

Councillor Steve Curran, Leader of Hounslow Council, visited hardworking staff at Hounslow's Extended Hospital Social Work (EHSWT) team recently. Based at the West Middlesex University Hospital, the team ensures that vulnerable residents over the age of 18 are discharged safely from hospital with the

support needed to ensure that they can return home safely.

Councillor Curran also visited one of the wards for stroke patients and saw how a new scheme called Red to Green, deals with any delays which lead to a patient being in hospital for longer than they should be.



A cycle super highway could be on its way to the borough connecting Chiswick and Brentford town centre.

Following an announcement from the Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, a consultation is under way until 31 October on plans that could see safer cycling for residents.

More than half of the proposed 5.6 mile route between Kensington Olympia and Brentford town centre would be on segregated tracks protecting cyclists from other traffic and creating a more pleasant environment for cycling.

The proposed route would run from King's Street in Hammersmith along Chiswick High Road with a two-way cycle track provided on the southern side as far as Heathfield Terrace. The route would then transfer onto Heathfield Terrace and Wellesley Road.

Access for motor vehicles to the South Circular via Wellesley Road and Stile Hall Gardens would be removed allowing cyclists to use Wellesley Road in comfort, by-passing the busy Chiswick Roundabout.

One-way cycle tracks would be built on either side of the South Circular Road, Kew Bridge Road and Brentford High Street with those cycling toward Brentford town centre being routed through Watermans Park.

The intention is to eventually extend the route west in Hounslow town centre. A second public consultation is expected in summer 2018.

Councillor Amrit Mann, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Environment, Hounslow Council said: "This will make a real difference in encouraging residents and people who work in and visit our borough to get on their bikes.

"The council is committed to encouraging people to take up cycling as part of leading more active lifestyles and invites all residents and local businesses to take the opportunity to shape these proposals."

Subject to the results of the consultation, Transport for London (TfL), which would fund the scheme, aims to start building the cycle superhighway in late 2018.

New recycling and waste services introduced in Hounslow in the summer are already having a positive impact on increasing recycling and improving the cleanliness of the borough's streets.

Weekly collections of recycled waste were introduced in June and, as a result, the percentage of waste recycled in the borough has quickly climbed to 33.9% and is on track to reach our target of 50% by 2019.

As well as improving the environment, by recycling local waste rather than disposing of it in landfill sites £1.3 million can be saved each year. These savings can be used to protect other services for residents.



In introducing the new recycling and waste services Hounslow Council invested f6.4 million in a fleet of more than 40 new, low-emission, recycling and waste collection vehicles, and is in the final stages of building a £22 million state-ofthe-art new depot at Southall Lane where everything collected will be handled, and

materials sorted for reuse and sale.

The new depot (pictured left) should open before Christmas enabling SpaceWaye, Hounslow's reuse and recycling centre to return to public use seven days a week before Christmas too.

Councillor Amrit Mann, Deputy Leader of Hounslow Council and



Cabinet Member for Environment said; "These early improvements in recycling levels are a great endorsement of the investment made by the council and the commitment of local residents to recycle.

"In order to maximise the benefit, it's important everyone puts the right thing in the right collection container."



Garden waste collection service NOW **AVAILABLE FOR LESS**



Residents in Hounslow can now take advantage of garden waste collection from their home by the council at a greatly reduced price.

For just £30, garden waste will be collected fortnightly over the six months until the end of March 2018 (apart from two weeks over the Christmas/New Year period). This is a 40% reduction on the annual £50 charge.

If you receive Council Tax Benefit you qualify for a 50% reduction so will pay just £15.

The reduced-price service is available to sign up to from 1 October until 31 October. Everyone subscribing can choose between having a 240 litre wheelie bin or two 90 litre sacks to put their garden waste in for collection.

For anyone with a garden this service is a great way to dispose of cuttings etc. with minimal effort and at an affordable price.

More and more people across the borough are taking advantage of the service and seizing the opportunity to keep on top of their garden.

New Extra Care Scheme opens its doors

Hounslow Council has opened Bridgewater House - a development of extra care apartments exclusively for the over 50's in Isleworth.

xtra care provision is part of the council's strategy to promote independent living with the added benefit of support and reassurance when residents need it the most. It offers people with care needs who are no longer able to live in their own home a real alternative to moving into a care home, with the opportunity to live an independent life with their own front door, safe in the knowledge that care and support services are close at hand.

Bridgewater House in Isleworth consists of 36 extra care flats, 32 of which will be offered on an affordable rent basis and four which will be shared ownership units, specifically for residents over 50.

There is a growing demand for extra care housing in Hounslow and the opening of this service brings the council another step closer to delivering its target of an additional 180 units of extra care flats by 2019.

Bridgewater House offers 24-hour on-site care for vulnerable older people, but also caters for those with

a range of needs from dementia and learning disabilities to general frailty due to ageing. The level of support is dependent on, and adaptable to, the needs of the resident.

The apartments offer level access, comfortable communal living, onsite laundry, an activities room, a small landscaped secure garden, CCTV to ensure added security, the use of colour co-ordination on fixtures and fittings to support people with sensory impairment or dementia and call-cord systems which supports independent living and ensures peace of mind.

Taking a family holiday during **term time...**What you need to know

arlier this year Jon Platt lost
a Supreme Court battle over
taking his daughter on holiday to
Disney World during school term-time.
Five senior judges at the court gave
the ruling on 6 April after his local
authority challenged the decision that
Mr Platt did not have to pay the fine.
Mr Platt had previously won an earlier
battle against a £120 fine after taking
his daughter out of school without
permission.

The Supreme Court justices considered whether or not Platt committed an offence by failing to ensure his daughter "attended school regularly", as required by section 444(1) of the 1996 Education Act. They ruled that "regular attendance" had to be keeping with rules of the school.

After the Supreme Court made their ruling, the case was returned to the Magistrates' Court in the Isle of Wight, whereby Mr Platt was found guilty.

If the court finds that a parent or carer has broken the law by taking their child or children on term time leave that is not authorised and a penalty notice has not been paid then the possible outcomes are: a fine up to £2,500, a community order or a jail sentence of up to three months.

Hounslow Council's policy on school attendance, including term-time leave, is based on the Department for Education guidance and the law. We appreciate that holidays are generally more expensive during school holiday periods but if you do decide to take your child out of school during term-time and it is not authorised by the school then the law is clear.

Since August 2016 the council's Education Welfare Service has issued 229 Penalty Notice fines to parents whose children have poor attendance. We are fortunate in Hounslow to have so many schools that are judged good or outstanding by Ofsted and we want children and young people to benefit as much as possible from what our schools offer

School attendance is important so that pupils maximise their educational opportunities as much as possible during the 38 weeks of the year that schools are open.

It is helpful to remember that even a pupil with 95 per cent attendance will have missed an additional 9.5 days out of the 38 weeks a school is open and if attendance drops to 90 percent this increases to just under four weeks (19 days) away from school.

It is always important to talk to your child's school and keep them informed of any occasion when your child might be absent from school, whatever the reason.

Headteachers in Hounslow follow the Department for Education's guidance which states that any absences for term time leave can only be authorised where there are "exceptional circumstances".

There are 14 weeks during the academic year when schools are closed to take holidays. Is it really worth the risk of receiving a fine

Pink Ribbon Foundation is a grant-making trust with a mission to fund projects and provide financial support to UK charities which relieve the needs of people who are suffering from, or who have been affected by breast cancer or who work to advance the understanding of breast cancer, its early detection and treatment.



The Mayor kick-started her fund-raising for both charities at her inaugural ball in July, raising over £13,000 in a big way and followed that by jumping out of a plane in a parachute jump at the end of August. That was for the Pink Ribbon Foundation and although nervous of undertaking such a feat, she enjoyed every minute of it. So far, over £5,000 has been raised and donations are still flying in.

Refuge is the country's largest single provider of specialist accommodation and support to women and children escaping domestic violence.

Refuge provides safe, emergency accommodation through a growing network of refuges throughout the country and runs the Freephone 24-Hour National Domestic Violence Helpline in partnership with Women's Aid. It also offers services for children, individual and group counselling for abused women and community based outreach services.

The Mayor was on to her next fundraising effort soon after, when she took part in the Walk4Refuge at the start of September. Donations are still coming in, but the Mayor has so far raised £3,500.













Progress on Hounslow's

School Expansion Programme

The borough has experienced one of the fastest growing birth rates in London, and with new housing developments being built to provide homes for more families, the demand for school places is growing at a rapid rate.



s part of its commitment to all borough children and young people, Hounslow Council has been creating high quality school places. Since 2008 twenty five permanent forms of entry have been added to existing local authority primary schools, four Special Schools expanded and places at four free schools within the borough facilitated.

By 2023 the council predicts there will be a need for 26 additional forms of entry at secondary level, this includes the expansion of three existing Hounslow Secondary Academies and plans for two additional secondary free schools. Recently Hounslow's planning committee approved the planning application for Bolder Academy, a non-denomination, mixed gender, six form entry Secondary school for 11 to 16 year olds providing 900 school places within the Osterley, Brentford and North Isleworth area.

The School Expansion Programme is progressing well to meet demand and the council is now undertaking major permanent expansions of various provisions to meet additional places for Primary, Secondary and Special Educational Needs. Building projects have now been completed at various schools, including St Pauls CE, St Mary's Isleworth RC, Wellington Cedars, Lindon Bennett and Woodbridge Park.

Councillor Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Education, Children's Services and Youth Services, Hounslow Council, said:

"One of our main priorities is to ensure there are enough high quality school places for all children and young people who need them. It is an important responsibility and a big part of our promise to provide them with the best possible start in life with a solid education."

Hounslow has also been approved to create a new special school through the free school process. This new school will provide places for pupils with Social, Emotional and Mental Health needs (SEMH). To find out more visit www.hounslow.gov.uk/freeschoolcompetition



Fostering success

Maurice and Blanca Lyons talk about their experience as approved long term carers to foster children between five and 18 years old.

eople always ask what motivated us. Well we saw a fostering poster in the high street saying they needed foster carers for the borough of Hounslow. I guess the timing was right, all our children are now married except for our youngest son who was 23 at the time. As parents, we wanted to make a difference to the lives of young people by giving them the love, care and attention that they deserve for a normal life as other children have. Many of these children have either been neglected, mistreated or abused in this cruel world, so we applied, did the training and were approved as Hounslow foster carers.

One of our placements came to us aged 14 and last June he turned 17 and we are very pleased with how things have turned out for him. The environment where he came from

was very stressful to say the least and we were a bit apprehensive with the thought of looking after him at first but we were given unlimited support from social services.

Looking after fostered children is slightly different than bringing up your own children because raising your own children everything is down to you about what happens to them, in other words 'the buck stops here'.

With fostered children you have the backing of social services behind you.

Fostered children have their own social worker who is regularly in touch with them and we also have our own supervising social worker who we can contact anytime during

office hours, we even have the out of hours' duty desk from 5-11pm or the emergency duty team. So, support is always at hand.

Over a period of time when you have completed all the mandatory training from first aid to safer caring you will be confident to cope with anything that may arise. It doesn't end there as there is a foster carers support group that you can attend with other foster carers to discuss anything you want in a confidential environment. And to add icing on the cake, four times a year there is a carers consultation forum where you can voice your concerns. This makes you feel you are part of the team which puts you at ease.

There are lots of young people who need loving care in a stable environment. For us we could see the changes in our foster child from him arriving at our house nervous and withdrawn with no confidence which caused him to be slightly behind in his school work, but now he seems like a different person. He has so much more confidence and is full of life. We are so proud of him, he has taken part in the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme and most of his summer break he attends West Thames College and mentors other children.

You might think that all that activity would hamper his education, but no, he achieved 6 GCSE's at A grade and three A*. Also, he has just received his results for his mock A level exams and they were all A grades for the three subjects he has chosen to take next year, which means if he is successful he will attend university.


Blanca and I are committed to fostering because

More for less

The challenge of having to spread money around is familiar to most households in the borough. It's the same for the council, but on a dramatically bigger scale.

Although our annual budget is over £600 million, the money we receive from central Government has fallen dramatically since 2014 while increases in the number of residents, and especially the number of young and old people, have significantly increased demand for council services.

The council has focussed on the things that matter most to residents of the borough at large, while also protecting those who are most vulnerable.

By renegotiating contracts and improving online and over the phone services, savings have been generated. Our workforce is now smaller, and Lampton 360, our trading company, now provides services including the collection of waste and recycling.

Council Tax in Hounslow did not increase from 2006/7 to 2017/18 despite the financial pressures. Further reductions in funding mean it will have to increase in 2018, but by just 1.99%.

More cost saving initiatives are already underway and our new, smaller council offices in central Hounslow will play a major role, while also boosting the regeneration of the town centre.

What you think

The most important judges of the Council's performance are, of course, the people living in the borough. For this reason, every two years the council commissions an independent research company to seek the views of residents.

In the latest survey, in late 2016, a total of 1,207 people carefully selected by the researchers to be representative of the community at large, were interviewed about all aspects of the council's services and its effectiveness. Encouragingly, the results were overwhelmingly positive.

- 2,760 affordable homes have been provided (93% of the target). 310 new council homes have been built and a further 102 are under construction.
- 400 homes on the lvybridge estate have been modernised with new kitchens and bathrooms.
- A new 40 home sheltered scheme for older residents has been opened at Hogarth Court in Heston.
- All council housing meets the "decent homes" standard for warmth, dryness and safety.
- Nearly £2 million has been invested each year in improving communal areas at council housing.
- Tenants are increasingly satisfied with the council's improved housing management service. 83% are happy with the quality of repairs.
- People in temporary accommodation has been reduced by 23% and the use of Bed & Breakfast has been reduced by 67%.
- Tough action has been taken against rogue landlords renting sub-standard and illegal accommodation.
- The council campaigned for a better not bigger Heathrow Airport. In light of the go-ahead for a third runway we will seek to **ensure that**Hounslow residents benefit from the economic growth and good quality jobs created.
- Regeneration of Hounslow and Brentford town centres, and the "Golden Mile" area of the Great West Road is underway.
- Public transport links along the Golden Mile are being improved. Plans for a service from Transport Avenue to Crossrail at Southall are well developed.



A cleaner, greener borough

Making sure the borough is a place where people feel proud to live and work.



- A new system of **fortnightly wheelie bin waste collections and weekly recycling collections** has been introduced.
- Recycle 360, part of the council's trading company Lampton 360, has taken over the collection of waste and recycling from all homes.
- Each week 333,000 containers are collected from 72,000 private properties on 1,810 roads, plus collections from a further 33,000 homes where there are communal waste and recycling facilities.
- Recycling levels in the Borough have increased to 33.9% and are on target to hit 50% by 2019.
- Firm enforcement **action** is taken **against** irresponsible people **littering and fly-tipping** in the borough. We have fined tens of thousands of people and businesses that have disposed of waste illegally.
- A striking poster campaign has encouraged dog owners to clear up any fouling by their pets in public spaces.
- **£2.7 million** is invested each year on average in maintaining and **improving the borough's roads and pavements**. Concerted effort has reduced the number of potholes on Hounslow's roads.
- ✓ All the borough's **street lights** will be **replaced** with new improved lamps on schedule.
- Gates have been installed across the borough where residents have faced problems with alleyways.
- ✓ Prestigious **Green Flag status** has been won for 14 parks.
- Heritage Lottery Funding has been secured for major restoration and improvements at Gunnersbury Park and Boston Manor.
- ✓ Plans for a **new War Memorial** have been progressed.
- Campaigning to ensure a better not bigger Heathrow airport continues and efforts will focus on ensuring noise and air pollution is controlled.
- **20mph zones** have been introduced **around all schools** to improve the safety of pedestrians.
- Overnight parking by lorries on residential roads has been banned.
- New cycle lanes have been introduced in Hanworth and Hounslow and a largely-traffic free cycle route created from Brenford to Twickenham.
- Over 70 electric vehicle charging facilities have been installed and a car club launched.
- Over 600 households have been helped to make their homes warmer and more energy efficient.





- Council initiatives to encourage participation in sport and exercise have led to an increasing proportion of people who are active. The increase has been in line with London (since 2014) and England as a whole (since 2012).
- ✓ Heston leisure centre has been completely refurbished and now features a 25m pool, learning pool, 100 station gym, soft play area for children, exercise studios, cycle training, cricket, football, basketball and tennis facilities.
- ✓ £2 million investment with Fusion Lifestyle from late 2017 will see major improvements at Hanworth Air Park Leisure Centre, Isleworth Leisure Centre and New Chiswick Pool.
- ✓ £1.1 million is being invested in new and improved

 Active Spaces to get children more active outdoors.
- Over 3500 children taking part in daily running as part of the Super Active Schools programme.
- ✓ **Eight new outdoor gyms** suitable for people of all ages and fitness levels have been created.
- Over 29,000 residents took part in Beat the Street a walking and cycling challenge to get more active and reduce car use.
- At Feltham Arena the car park has been improved, and new sports facilities, play areas and a renovated running track are in the pipeline. Access will be improved and the Parkguard service utilised to prevent antisocial behaviour.
- One You Hounslow has helped 5,000 adults to get active, over 1,200 to stop smoking, and offered advice on healthy eating across the borough.
- 2,145 residents have been provided with free health checks.
- Working with local voluntary and community groups local people's lives have been improved. Examples include Goodgym, whose runners do community tasks like gardening and weeding, and Green Gym which improves people's health and wellbeing while creating green spaces for everyone to enjoy. Parkruns in the borough are participated in by over 800 people each week.
- ✓ The council continues to **press for** appropriate **health services to be available for all residents** as changes to the NHS take place across London.



Improving quality of life to reduce the need for care and hospital admissions, while making sure there is high quality care and support for those who need it. Keeping vulnerable adults safe.



- Advice and information for people looking for care services has been improved including through the CarePlace website.
- Services and support for people with learning disabilities and dementia, and their carers, have been improved.
- Support for elderly, isolated and vulnerable residents has been improved by a new integrated service that has introduced a home care service and also achieved 46% savings.
- Strengthened safeguards have helped vulnerable people to continue living in their own homes.
- **36 apartments** for older and disabled people have opened in Isleworth.
- **94 apartments** in Feltham with facilities for people with dementia and learning disabilities are planned.
- People have been given **greater choice and control** over the care services they receive. More than 1,000 residents now get direct payments.
- A new community recovery

 Service provides rehabilitation and reablement support to older people and people with physical disabilities.
- **94%** of care and support service users said they **feel safe**.
- ✓ 89% of people are satisfied with their care and support.

An ambitious council delivering quality services and value for money

Having the best interests of residents at heart. Providing leadership for the community and finding new, ambitious ways to improve our customer care for our residents and deliver even better value for money.





- New, smaller council offices (pictured) being built now in central Hounslow will replace the Civic Centre in 2019, reduce costs, and help regenerate the town.
- The current Civic Centre site is being redeveloped to provide **hundreds of much needed new homes**, including many that are "affordable".
- Council Tax in Hounslow did not increase at all from 2006/07 to 2017/18 despite reducing Government funding and increasing demand for council services. In 2018/19 it will increase, but by just by 1.99%.
- Improved council online services, including a **completely new website** designed specifically for easy use on tablets and phones, have meant fewer people need to visit our offices. The number visiting the Civic Offices is now half what it used to be.
- Satisfaction with council services has increased, and the number of complaints received has fallen by 60%.
- 97% of people are satisfied with council reception services.
- An **improved council telephone system** offering better services for callers is launching in October 2017.
- Improved IT facilities are enabling council staff to work more flexibly and offer improved services to residents.

Elderly people and anyone who feels vulnerable are being reminded to take care when people claiming to be contractors visit their home.

Hounslow Council's Trading Standards team is offering some straightforward guidance to prevent rogue contractors ripping off the borough's residents.

The simple advice is:

- Never let an uninvited contractor into your home.
- Never give them any money.
- Always ask for their contact details.

In this way, you have the chance to discuss any work needed with a relative, neighbour or friend, and they can also be present when you do invite the contractor to meet you.

If you need a council Trading Standards officer to be there, this might be possible too.

rs Rogers* is a fiercely independent 89-year-old resident who lives alone in Chiswick. At the beginning of May this year she was at home and answered a knock at her front door.

Two men, apparently, from a roofing company called DUNNS & SONS ROOFING were standing there. Mrs Rogers invited them in to discuss the state of her roof and the maintenance work they claimed was needed. The men said they would be more than happy to carry out the work but they would need £1,000 in cash up front. Mrs Rogers had the money in the house and handed it over to them in good faith.

The next morning the two men were back saying they now needed £2,500 upfront to complete all the roofing work and they would drive her to and from her bank that afternoon.

Hounslow's Trading Standards team had already established a banking protocol with local banks and building societies in the borough to protect our elderly and vulnerable residents. As a result, when talking to Mrs Rogers about the cash withdrawal, Halifax bank staff on Chiswick High Road became suspicious and called the police. On their arrival, the 'workmen' and their white Ford estate fled and were nowhere to be seen.

The police officers brought back Mrs Rogers to her home to see the abandoned building materials and ladder in her front garden. They then contacted Hounslow Council's Trading Standards team who took over and visited Mrs Rogers to give her reassurance, advice and confidence with dealing with rogue traders in the future.

Mrs Rogers is very thankful that Trading Standards intervened as they also managed to glean a description of the rogue traders. They then shared this information with neighbouring boroughs so they could be on the alert for these men who may try and prey on their elderly residents.

Welcome to our latest edition of Housing News

Councillor Katherine Dunne, Cabinet Member for Housing

Following the horrific Grenfell Tower fire in Kensington back in June, our thoughts are with the victims, their loved ones and all those affected. The scenes we have witnessed have been beyond belief, and witnessing the pain of the affected community in west London is utterly heart-breaking.

I want to reassure you that as a Council, we ensure all our council managed blocks have regular fire safety checks to ensure all equipment, are in good working order. We also have fire safety signs installed in entrances. Please read them carefully.

Grenfell has changed the landscape for housing. We will continue to be proactive in assuring our tenants and leaseholders that the buildings they live in, are safe and we are reevaluating our existing investment plans for our housing stock. Through our engagement with the Department of Communities and Local Government, London Fire Brigade inspectors and public meetings we have gained a wealth of knowledge of the issues faced by our residents.

In view of the gravity of the issues and the pressing need to take steps to improve the safety of our housing stock and to reassure our tenants, the Leader of the Council announced at Borough Council in July the preparation of a Fire Safety and Estate Improvement Programme across all of our 16,000-housing stock. We are developing this programme which we believe will amount to over £125m over four years. This will include plans for replacing internal and communal fire doors, and improving coverage of safety lighting and signage.

The council has a statutory duty to carry out Fire Risk Assessments (FRA) and undertake general precautions to, as far as is possible, safeguard its tenants and leaseholders from the risk of fire. Scheduled Fire Risk Assessments are carried out on all of the council's stock with frequency varying according to the assessed level of risk. There will be a one page summary about fire risk assessments placed on each communal board on high-rise blocks every two weeks.

If there is a fire in your home, don't try to tackle the fire yourself. Leave your home, closing the door behind you and call 999.

Safety in your council home

Following the devastating fire at Grenfell Tower, we understand that people will be concerned about the safety of their own homes. The safety and wellbeing of our tenants is very important to us and we have pledged that lessons will be learnt from this incident.

The council works very closely with London Fire Brigade to deal with fire safety issues to deliver improvements on fire safety and to ensure that we offer good advice. Advice to residents in high rise blocks remains unchanged. If there is a fire in your flat or floor, leave, shut the door and call London Fire Brigade on 999; otherwise shut the doors and windows and remain in your flat to await rescue.


Evacuation plans for elderly, disabled and vulnerable residents will have been agreed with housing officers. In blocks of sheltered accommodation this information is stored externally to the blocks in a secure box for the fire brigade and is updated monthly.

The advice from London Fire Brigade for people who live in high rise properties or purpose built flats and maisonettes, aside from having a working smoke alarm and taking fire safety precautions, is to make sure you know your escape plan and what to do if there is a fire inside your home or somewhere else in the building.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND ABUSE

isn't just about bruising, violence can be just one part of it. There are many other factors that can be domestic violence and abuse:

- Not being allowed to talk to family or friends
- Having to 'walk on eggshells', being blamed for things out of your control
- Being in a relationship where your partner is charming in one instance then switches to being aggressive; this is just a way of manipulating

Supporting you to get involved

The tragic fire at Grenfell Tower has underlined the importance of Local Authorities doing more to engage with the communities they serve, and at September's meeting of the housing Joint Consultative Committee (TLSTJCC), Peter Matthew, Director of Housing, committed to doing just that.

The TLSTJCC is made up of three forums, representing tenants, leaseholders and sheltered tenants respectively, and Peter recognised

that for the overarching group to function effectively, its constituent parts must also be effective. Peter committed to an improved support offer for the forums, to be developed with their input, which would allow them to attract members with the right skills to effectively represent the views of the tenant, leaseholder and sheltered communities.

Resident engagement is a priority for Hounslow Housing, and we are developing new ways for residents to have their say. Over 300 residents have already signed up to let us know they want their voices to be heard, whether that means taking part in surveys or workshops, becoming part of a forum or registering an interest in our upcoming 'mystery shoppers' and 'estate inspectors' programmes. Housing Tenants, have your say!

Understanding the views of our tenants is very important if we are going to make good decisions about how we provide housing services. We need a strong Tenants Forum, made up of tenants who are not afraid to challenge us when they think this is necessary, and who can help us get messages out into the community when we need to do this. If this sounds like you, then consider putting yourself forward to be on the Forum.

The Tenants Forum is holding a general meeting, open to all tenants, at which it will elect a new committee. The general meeting will elect 15 members to the committee. If you are a Hounslow Housing tenant, you can nominate yourself to be on the committee by submitting 30-50 words on why you think you would do a good job, along with your name and address to community.development@hounslow.gov.uk

Forum members attend four meetings a year, and the Forum nominates five of its members to be part of the council's Tenants, Leaseholders and Sheltered Tenants Joint Consultative Committee, which is the formal consultation body for Hounslow Housing residents. We'll give you training on being a committee member and effectively challenging and questioning, which could prove useful in other areas of your life.

All tenants will receive a letter inviting them to attend the general meeting. We hope to see you there and look forward to hearing what you have to say.



Is your home too big?

Transfer to a smaller, manageable and more affordable home

Do you have a spare bedroom, have your children left home or is your home too big for your current needs and you're finding it expensive to manage? If you have answered 'yes' to any of these questions, we may be able to assist you.

Hounslow Council's downsizing incentive scheme is aimed at providing support and financial assistance to council tenants who wish to transfer to smaller, manageable and more affordable homes. It is a voluntary scheme which means that you do not have to move unless you choose to do so. Our aim is not just to help people wanting to transfer to a smaller

home but to release properties that are in high demand.

If you qualify for the scheme, you will get an incentive payment of £1,000 per bedroom. If you are in need of one bedroom and reside in a property with three or more bedrooms and do not request for an extra bedroom, you will qualify for an additional £1,000. You may also get £300 towards the cost of your removal, and you may also get £100 if you leave your property in a clean condition.
