Seeing is believing

Dear Residents,

As 2017 draws to a close, across the borough a wide range of major developments that will transform the lives of residents are underway and I've been "on site".

In this edition of Hounslow Matters, we look in detail at the very real progress that has been achieved in taking ideas and plans through to actual physical improvements.

The £22 million new facility to handle all the borough's recycling at Southall Lane will enable 50 per cent of local waste to be recycled by 2019, improving our environment and enabling expensive landfill costs to be avoided.

At Lampton Road, hundreds of new homes are nearing completion in the first phase of the Housing Zone that is being created around, and, eventually, in place of the Civic offices.

Building work on the new Hounslow Town Primary School has reached roof level, and construction of the new, smaller, council offices and a new library at Bath Road are also progressing rapidly.

Meanwhile, preparatory work for the start of construction of the High Street Quarter in central Hounslow has been completed. This exciting scheme will bring 527 new homes, shops, restaurants and cafes, and a multi-screen cinema, all around a new town square, with over 400 underground car parking spaces, that will give the borough a massive boost.

Back in 2014, when the current council was elected, we committed to make the borough a place where

everyone could be proud to live, learn and work. Indeed, we made specific promises to deliver good quality homes and jobs, brighter futures for our children, and create a cleaner and greener Hounslow.

It is human nature to sometimes look at artists' impressions of proposed new developments and question whether they will really happen. There can be no such doubt in Hounslow. Recycled waste is already being handled at Southall Lane. The first residents will move into new homes in June 2018. And students will start school at Hounslow Town Primary in September 2018.

Although the council should take a lead, making the borough a better place is something that we all have a role to play in. Everyone has a responsibility, for example, to recycle as much of their waste as possible. The council will seek to make it easy for everyone to do their civic duty, but will also take tough action against those who don't, such as people dropping litter and fly tipping.

As the new year approaches, many people will be thinking about making resolutions. I will be resolving to do my utmost to deliver the council's promises in the last few months before next May's elections. But I will also be reflecting on the great progress that has been made. Hounslow is a great borough and together we can ensure it is even better in the future.

Public toilet locations across the borough promoted

The location of public toilets across the borough is being promoted in a new initiative by the council.



Working in partnership with "disabled go", new highly visible "use our toilet" signs to clearly identify toilets available for public use are being displayed at a wide variety of locations including shops, pubs, and petrol and train stations.

In addition, all 138 public toilet locations across Hounslow are presented online at www.hounslow.gov.uk/publictoilets so that anyone needing to locate one can do so via their smartphone.

Councillor Amrit Mann, Cabinet Member for Environment said; "Budget reductions have meant that the council is having to close six public toilets, but the usage of these has actually been very low.

By promoting the many toilets available, local people will always be able to find a convenient location."

The council is also inviting the owners of other premises with toilets that could be used by the public to get involved in the scheme. In addition to performing a valuable service by doing this they can also draw potential customers to their premises.

Council delivers on its promise to stop HMOs

Hounslow Council has put in place measures to prevent houses in the Hanworth ward of the borough becoming Homes of Multiple Occupation (HMOs) - dwellings where a bathroom or kitchen are shared by three or more unrelated people.

The council has withdrawn permitted development rights which enable property owners to change the use of a house without planning permission.

Councils must have appropriate justification to withdraw these rights. It is only possible to do so where it is necessary to protect local amenity or the wellbeing of an area.

Leader of the council, Councillor Steve Curran said; "The type of properties in Hanworth, many of which were built in the 1930s, are completely inappropriate to be converted to HMOs. "We consulted on our intention to prevent HMOs being created in the area, and received overwhelming support. I am delighted that we have now been able to take this step as part of the council's overall commitment to ensuring quality homes in the borough."

The council has also been helping to draw Government attention to unscrupulous developers and landlords reaping massive rental income from very small flats in converted houses.

Working with BBC 1 TV's Inside Out programme, evidence has been presented to Clive Betts MP, chair of the Government's Communities and Local Government Committee, who has vowed to investigate. The hope is that councils will be given more powers to act to prevent inappropriate HMOs.

Local parks to be locally managed



The borough's parks will return to council management in 2018.

Hounslow Council and current contractor Carillion have reached agreement for the transfer to take place.

The parks service will be delivered by wholly-owned council company Lampton 360, from April 2018. Councillor Samia Chaudhary, Cabinet Member for Green Policy and Leisure, said: "By bringing this service back inhouse, we can integrate it with wider leisure and cultural services, improve what is a service valued by residents, and save money."

Management of library services in Hounslow transferred back to the council from Carillion in August 2017.



Children's services praised

Children's services in Hounslow have been commended in a wide-ranging inspection conducted by inspectors from four key agencies.

A 13-strong team of inspectors from Ofsted, the Quality Care Commission (CQC), Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary (HMIC) and Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Probation (HMIP) spent over three weeks looking at how the council, police, health and probation agencies, and youth offending services work together to protect the borough's most vulnerable young people.

Amongst the key findings was that effective multi-agency working is leading to improvements in the lives of children facing domestic abuse. The Hounslow One Stop Shop providing support for parents, "Learning to Respect" and "Let's Talk" programmes, Youth Offending Service and Safer Homes Sanctuary project were all felt to be real strengths in the borough.

Councillor Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Education and Children's Services said: "This type of inspection is incredibly thorough. It is to the credit of all the organisations involved in children's services in Hounslow that the findings were overwhelmingly positive.

"Inevitably, there were also some areas for improvement identified and the council will take a lead role in ensuring these are acted upon as part of our commitment to ensure brighter futures for the borough's children."

Volunteering with Help Your Health

The Help Your Health project, which supports people with additional needs, has seen its first two volunteers graduate from the 12-week volunteering programme, with others due to complete the programme by the end of 2017. The programme, delivered by Volunteering Hounslow on behalf of Ealing CVS, provides intensive support to people with disabilities and health conditions who are interested in volunteering. All organisations involved have been extremely supportive

of the project, which has enabled both volunteers to make a valuable contribution to Hounslow communities.

Diabetes prevention initiative wins national award

An initiative led by Hounslow Council's Public Health team to rollout the National Diabetes Prevention Programme across five west London boroughs has won the national Quality in Care (QiC) award.

The local programme demonstrated a commitment to ensure residents at high risk of diabetes are detected at an early stage and are offered a comprehensive lifestyle intervention service to prevent the onset of diabetes.

The largest initiative of its kind in England, around 5,000 people have already joined and receive support including minimising the chance of developing diabetes, and making lifestyle changes to live with the condition.

The North West London Diabetes Prevention group involves local authorities, clinical commissioning groups and a private sector provider.

Councillor Kamaljit Kaur, Cabinet Member for Public Health, said: "This national award is fantastic recognition for all the hard work that has gone into the programme.

"In Hounslow, we want to ensure we provide services and support to the highest standard for residents who have, or live with, someone who has diabetes."

Quality in Care (QiC) is an awards programme that recognises good practice in patient care and joint working in key therapy areas and allows these schemes to be shared on a national level.



Time to re-think the drink

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Heathrow Expansion: Last chance to have your say



Hounslow residents and businesses have until Tuesday 19 December to express their views on new evidence in the Government's revised draft Airports National Policy Statement.

The new consultation includes

information on long-term aviation forecasts and the new government National Air Quality Plan.

Councillor Steve Curran, Leader of Hounslow Council, said: "Our position on Heathrow Airport remains, as it has always been, that we'd like to see a better not bigger airport.

"The Government's recommended expansion at Heathrow will have a huge impact on the residents and businesses of Hounslow. The council wants to ensure that issues of noise, pollution and additional congestion are properly addressed.

"This Department of Transport consultation is an important step towards a final decision and I strongly urge all Hounslow residents and businesses to make sure they have their say online.

"Have a look at all the information and put your views across. The consultation is open to everyone and we want to ensure voices from our borough are heard."

Hounslow bids for Borough of Culture

Hounslow has submitted a bid to become London Borough of Culture in 2020.

This responds to a new opportunity being promoted by the Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, for boroughs across the capital to apply for the honour in both 2019 and 2020, and to receive over £1 million of funding for cultural initiatives.

Hounslow's bid will join-up regeneration and cultural ideas for the borough and reflect its history, cultural diversity, heritage and connections - including by water, road, and air - through Heathrow airport.

If the bid is successful, 2018 will become a year of consultation, with events and workshops with residents and local organisations to understand what they would like to see happen and how they could be part of this amazing opportunity.

An announcement of the winning bids for both 2019 and 2020 is expected in February 2018.



Save the Date

As the time for New Year resolutions approaches, residents are being invited to put

a date in their new 2018 diaries.

From February 2018 householders will be able to sign up for Hounslow Council's garden waste collection service. For just £50, a fortnightly collection will take place from April 2018 to March 2019.

More and more people in the borough are taking advantage of the service. Last year, over 18,000 saved the time and effort to take their grass cuttings and prunings to a civic amenity site.



History unlocked in Cranford

A Victorian lock up for rogues and villains has been restored by Hounslow Council and the Heritage of London Trust.

Cranford Village Lock Up, near the Bath Road, was used for the temporary detention of thieves and drunks in the 19th century. The village was on the main route leading into London from the west and had problems with robbers preying on wealthy travellers.

Any offenders caught would spend a night in the lock up before being taken in front of a magistrate. The Lock Up fell out of use by the mid-19th Century. It became a Grade II listed building in 1973.

Over the last two decades, the building has been covered with ivy, which was damaging its structure. The restoration has ensured the preservation of an important part of local history.





SOUTHALL LANE MATERIALS HANDLING FACILITY

Construction of Hounslow's new recycling facility has been completed and the £22 million building handed over to the council.

All recycled waste collected from the 103,000 homes in the borough will now be processed at the facility in Southall Lane.

This will help ensure that 50 per cent of local waste is recycled by 2019. As well as improving the environment, this will avoid expensive landfill charges and enable income to be generated from the sale of processed recycled waste.

SPACE WAYE NOW OPEN SEVEN DAYS A WEEK

The borough's re-use and recycling centre, Space Waye, has re-opened to the public seven days a week. This follows a two-weekend closure in early December.

Space Waye played a vital role in handling the borough's recycled waste while the new £22 million facility was built at Southall Lane, but this meant that public access had to be limited to weekends.

Now that we can return Space Waye to its normal role we have seized the opportunity to make some improvements.

Residents are thanked for their understanding while access to Space Waye has been reduced. It has ensured the borough now has the opportunity to recycle far more of its waste and that will benefit everyone.


The new facilities at the school in Sutton Lane are part of the council's expansion programme and help meet its pledge to provide sufficient high quality school places in the borough. Additional classrooms have increased it from a two-form entry to a four-form entry school with 420 student places.


£3m of remodelling and expansion now forms the nursery and infant school.

A further £12m has developed the new building on Church Meadows which now forms the junior school, opened to pupils early September this year.















LAMPTON ROAD HOUSING

Building more new high quality homes is a priority across London and the country as a whole. In Hounslow, the council is taking the lead.

Two new housing zones have been created with more than 3,600 homes built in Hounslow and 3,300 in Feltham.

One of the largest developments is at Lampton Road where 919 new flats are being built at the current site of the Civic Offices. 50 per cent of these will be affordable.

The first blocks have now had their concrete frameworks completed and work is underway to install windows, insulation and brick facades.

At an event to mark the "topping out" of the development, Council Leader, Steve Curran, and Chief Executive Mary Harpley (pictured above) were joined by (pictured left to right) Pascal Lux, Operations Director at Bouygues UK, Nick Taylor, Head of Housing and Land, North-West at City Hall and Kate Davies, Chief Executive of Notting Hill Housing.

The first families are expected to move into their new homes in June 2018.



HOUNSLOW HIGH STREET QUARTER

Work on the exciting new housing, shopping and leisure development that will transform the centre of Hounslow has started.

Hoardings have been erected around the site of Hounslow High Street Quarter ahead of construction starting in January 2018.

In total 527 high quality homes will be created and 41 per cent of these will be affordable housing. New shops, cafes and restaurants will sit alongside a new multi-screen cinema and a new town square will provide a focal point for the community. An underground car park will have 410 spaces for shoppers and residents.

The first homes will be completed in 2019. The cinema, shops and car park will open in 2020.

SCHOOL ROAD HOUSING




The first phase of new housing at School Road will see residents move into 50 new homes from June 2018.

Mayor applauds vibrant



REFUGE CHARITY FUNDRAISER

Isleworth resident Lesley Brock has raised £1,200, at a fundraising evening, at The Victoria Tavern, Isleworth, for Refuge, one of the Mayor of Hounslow's chosen charities.

Lesley, who has lived in the borough all her life, has herself experienced domestic violence and remembered how there was no one to help her until she was eventually put in touch with Chiswick Women's Aid, which is known today as Refuge.

"I had a violent husband and no one to turn to. When I tried to speak to someone, I was told go home. I was the mother of young children and was badly beaten up, yet I didn't know who I could turn to or how I could escape, doors were closed to me.

"Being put into contact with the Chiswick Women's Aid as it was known back then, saved my life and that of my children. I truly believe that. I had two cousins and also knew Sue's (the Mayor's) sister who were all murdered by their husbands. I really thought it was going to happen to me.

She added: "Thankfully the charity helped me escape the violence and get my home back for me and my children. Refuge is a cause close to my heart for all of these reasons.

"I am determined, along with Sue, to keep raising as much money as possible for them, to ensure that no door is ever closed to those who need it to be open, with help and support available to them at any time."

Refuge Is the country's largest single provider of specialist accommodation and support to women and children escaping domestic violence.
