



#### **Number of Allotments**





#### Cost per annum to rent an allotment plot in 2018/19




# Expected levels of increase in 2019/20


Comparison of allotment cost 2018/19 and expected cost per annum to rent an allotment plot in 2019/20

#### **Waiting lists**

- 69% of respondents have 100-400 people on waiting lists for an allotment compared to 75% in 2018 which shows a slight improvement.
- 8% of respondents claim they have over 1000 people on their waiting list which was the same percentage in 2018.
- over 49% stated that over 18 months was the average, which is a rise of 9% on 2018 when the figure was 40%.
- 12% of respondents could guarantee a plot within 6 months which is a 3% improvement on 2018 when the figure was 9%.
- The average waiting time is now between 6-18 months (51%).
- 8 % of respondents can offer an allotment plot within 3 months, again a 3% improvement on 2018.



Provision by builders/developers as part of a housing/planning policy	76%
Provision by community groups supported/facilitated by council	43%
Provision by other council departments (e.g. Education, Social Work) as part of a healthy lifestyles/eco-schools/health type project	24%
Other	5%


## **Budget for allotments**

The average annual budgets for allotments were stated as below




## **Budget responsibility**

#### Site maintenance


As an integral part of grounds maintenance operations/contracts	56%
By the plot holders/site association	12%
By volunteers	28%
By a dedicated allotments team/person	61%
As part of rehabilitation programmes (health, offenders etc.)	19%
No grounds maintenance is carried out on the sites	3%
Other	16%

### **Monitoring allotments**

- Through inspections/site visits by an allotment officer (51%).
- 47% a council officer or site representative

### Time before taking action

What length of time do you allow a plot to be uncultivated before you take actions?



### **Security**

- 66% Plot-holders themselves generally manage the security on allotment sites
- 39% don't actively manage security.
- 9% have a 'plot watch' scheme or something similar.
- 5% stated that park rangers manage security.
- 3% stated that community wardens manage security

#### **Allotment strategy**

- 42% have an allotments strategy and of 58% that haven't currently got a strategy 30% stated that the council is planning to develop one within the next 2 years.
- 54% stated that their health and wellbeing strategy recognises the value of allotments.
- 53% of Local authorities have a Friends Group/ Forum or similar.
- 67% of respondents now include allotments into their Local Plans and 54% have the value of allotments recognised within their Health and Well-Being strategies.

#### **Biodiversity**

Areas being set aside for wildlife	77%
Information on how to improve biodiversity	53%
Planting pollinator friendly species	53%
Promoting native crops	17%
Other	32%

#### **Closing Comments**

- Reductions in council budgets is having an impact on the ability to maintain sites.
- Local authorities are continuing to provide and manage allotment sites.
- Allotment holders able to apply for funding which is not available to local authorities.
- Many allotment sites are now moving to self-management models, with a slight increase in the number of sites which are now selfmanaged by allotment holders themselves often with the continuing support of the local authority.
