## Welcome to the latest edition of Hounslow Matters – Spring 2020



Dear residents,

The coronavirus is of course a grave concern. We all have a responsibility to try to keep ourselves and others free from infection and help prevent the disease from spreading. I urge you all to visit [nhs.uk/coronavirus](https://www.nhs.uk/coronavirus) for advice and guidance.

Last June, Hounslow Council joined other local councils and the Mayor of London in declaring a climate emergency that requires urgent action. Global warming is the biggest threat facing our planet, and we're now developing our Climate Emergency Action Plan and want to tell you about the work we're doing to improve our environment and how you can shape our plans. As such, this issue of Hounslow Matters is environment-focussed.

As a council we have committed to achieving zero carbon emissions for all our activities by 2030. We also want to help you play your part in addressing the challenges. Whether it's how you travel, your recycling habits or how you heat your home, we all have a role to play. Then there's the opportunities for you to be involved in making your area, and the borough in general, cleaner and greener. There's been an inspiring increase in community action over the past 12 months, such as tree planting, seeding wildflower meadows and clean ups. We want to encourage more of this fantastic community spirit and we're committed to supporting residents and businesses.

Our Greener Borough Framework, approved this January, incorporates a broad range of projects to support our environmental ambitions. There are many opportunities for you to play an active part, whether it's by becoming an Environmental Champion or joining one of our Community Reference Groups. You can read all about our environmental work and how to get involved throughout this edition, and we really want to hear your thoughts on our Climate Emergency Action Plan, so please have your say (page 7).

Last month we approved the council's Budget for 2020/21, setting out how we will continue to provide services, protect

our most vulnerable and deliver on our priorities for the borough. It was also agreed to increase the council's element of Council Tax.

This wasn't an easy decision, but a decade of austerity, national economic uncertainties, rising local costs - particularly in social care, special educational needs and homelessness - and our desire to keep delivering quality services and invest in the borough, left us with no choice. The majority of London boroughs are expected to increase their council tax, but we will continue to support the most vulnerable groups in our community through our Council Tax Support scheme.

Despite the challenges we face, and the need to always spend within our means, we'll always be ambitious for Hounslow and committed to keep delivering on our pledges to build more council homes, make recycling easier, improve roads, create thousands of apprenticeships and training opportunities and support the London Living Wage. Our Budget supports us to do all this and you can read more about where our money comes from and how we spend it on pages 16 and 17.

In very exciting news for the borough, football's coming home! It was announced last month that Brentford FC will host four of the UEFA Women's EURO 2021 matches, including a high-profile quarter final in their new 17,500 community stadium, which will also be home to premiership rugby club London Irish. The eyes of the world will be on Brentford, which provides us with a great opportunity to showcase our borough and welcome visitors from all over Europe.

During these difficult times for everyone, it is important that we all pull together and look out for one another. I'm very proud of the residents and businesses of Hounslow, and I'm sure if we all work together, we will be stronger for it.

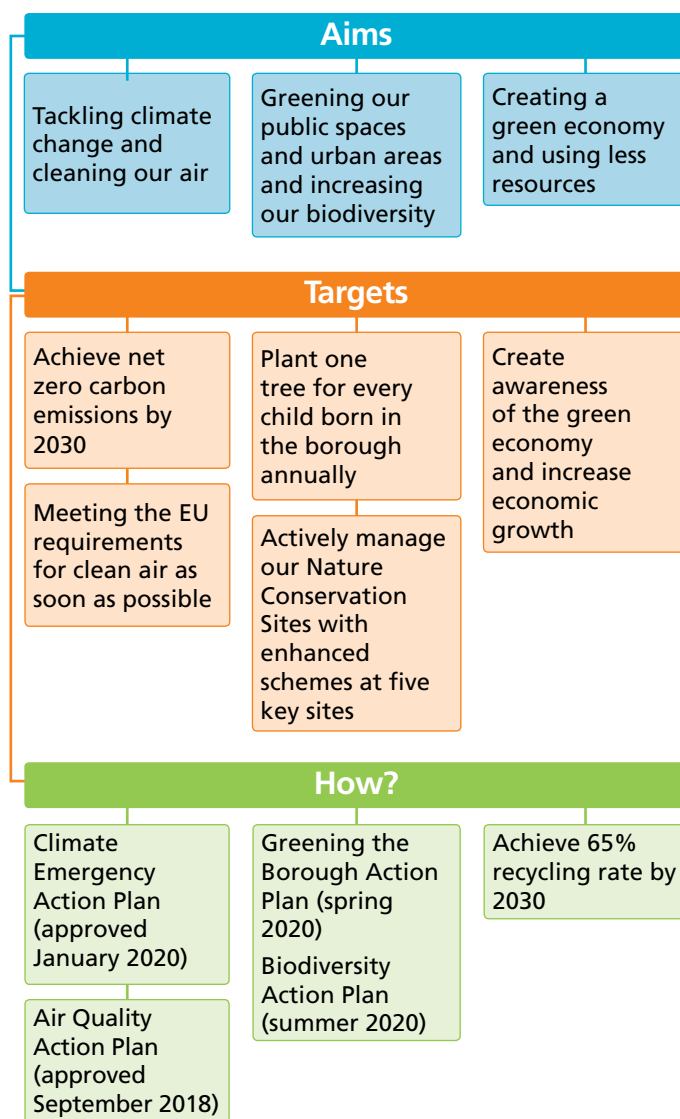

# Responding to the Climate Emergency

Last June, we joined the UK Parliament, the Mayor of London and other local authorities in declaring a climate emergency requiring urgent action.

Not only that, but as a council we want to show we mean it by looking at ourselves first. We have committed to reducing our own carbon footprint and taking steps towards making our activities carbon neutral and zero-carbon as quickly as we can.

We worked with experts to review our operations and work out how we can reduce our carbon emissions to net zero by 2030, whilst also helping reduce wider emissions across the borough and galvanising a local response to the declaration of a climate emergency.

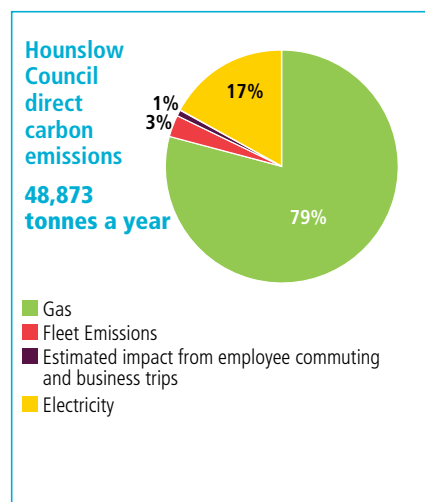
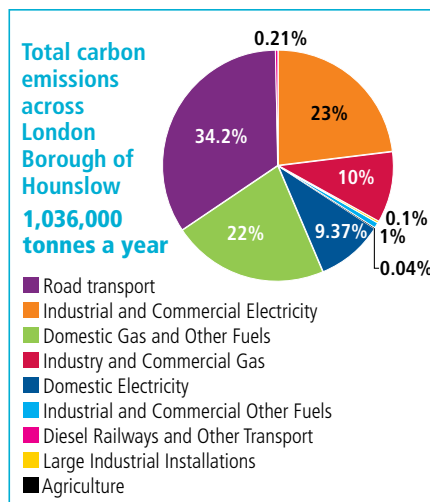
We joined together with local people to identify the local priorities and opportunities. Many ideas were put forward and included in our draft Climate Emergency Action Plan which outlines seven key programmes for reducing carbon emissions created by the council, and six key programmes for reducing carbon emissions across the borough.



Cllr Katherine Dunne, Cabinet Member for Communities and Climate Emergency, said:

"We are really pleased to have progressed our Climate Emergency Action Plan to this stage. We believe it represents a comprehensive blueprint for reducing carbon emissions in Hounslow. The world has woken up to climate change and we can't delay in taking action to tackle the biggest threat our planet has ever faced.

"We all have a part to play in addressing this global challenge and we want to hear your views on whether you think we have developed the right programmes and actions to reduce emissions from our activities as well as borough-wide."

# On a mission to reduce emission

Through our Climate Emergency Action Plan we have committed to reducing council emissions to net zero by 2030, and to working with residents and businesses to help you reduce your own emissions right across the borough.

## How we plan to tackle direct emissions created by the council:

# Reducing carbon emissions across the borough – with your help



## 1 Retrofit Hounslow

**We will** support the delivery of zero carbon new development

**We ask you to** help us to keep it that way by reducing litter and flytipping.

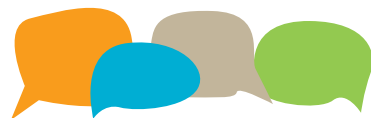

# Taking action for our future generations

**While the world has woken up to the climate emergency, it's our young people who have most at stake as they will suffer the consequences if the measures taken do not go far enough to reverse the damage done to our planet.**

Sixteen-year-old Greta Thunberg has spearheaded the world's enlightenment on the issues that are threatening our planet and it is evident from the frequent activism of school children, that this is the generation that will really make a difference.



In November 2019, the Inter Climate Network (ICN) in partnership with Hounslow Council and the Hounslow Youth Council hosted the first Climate Conference for secondary school children from across the borough.

The conference, hosted at Hounslow House, saw more than 65 pupils and staff from 10 local secondary schools.

The schools took part in global negotiations modelled on the UN Climate Conference format and then discussed the key climate challenges that face the local area and their schools. The Conference was part of the ICN Climate Voices programme which helps young people to think critically about climate change and inspires them to action.

## Working with schools to deliver our ambitions

Within our Climate Emergency Action Plan, we're working with students and teachers to encourage schools across the borough to declare a climate emergency. We want to:

- Reduce the carbon footprint of all school buildings in Hounslow by installing energy efficiency measures such as new lighting and boilers
- Encourage schools to generate renewable energy by installing solar panels on their buildings
- Understand how students and teachers travel to school and promote sustainable modes of transport
- Reduce waste in schools by increasing recycling rates, composting food waste and reducing litter
- Work with students and teachers to secure funding to develop community projects that will reduce their carbon footprint.

We want as many young people as possible to make their voices heard and have their say on our consultation."

# Backing the green economy

The effects of climate change can have a major impact on businesses, so this is becoming a priority for business owners.

We are supporting them to play their part in reducing the carbon footprint of their activities to maintain economic growth and continue creating jobs and opportunities across the borough. There are many ways businesses can reduce their energy costs while helping to reduce climate change.

## As part of the draft Climate Emergency Action Plan, we want to:

- Develop guidance and provide advice for businesses to implement both carbon reduction and energy saving measures.
- Work with large businesses in Hounslow to develop specific training programmes to provide local people with the skills for roles such as Environmental Engineers, Geoscientists or Energy Auditors to help address our environmental challenges. This will be achieved by delivering a programme of environmental and sustainability education in Hounslow primary and secondary schools, colleges and universities with a focus on carbon reduction.
- Work with developers to secure apprenticeships and training opportunities for Hounslow residents related to the environmental sector.
- Develop co-working space for SMEs in Hounslow and support the provision of shared office space for VCSE sector groups.
- Work with businesses to explore the potential for shared renewable energy generation
- Investigate opportunities to develop low carbon skills, education, training and employment opportunities by ensuring that any growth in the renewable energy retrofitting sector delivers new skills and job opportunities for local people.



Cllr Steve Curran, Council Leader and Cabinet Member for Corporate Strategy, Planning and Regeneration, said:

"The energy transition to renewables and other actions against climate change is changing the world of work by creating a need for new skills, offering unprecedented employment opportunities. In the coming decade that demand will continue to grow and we want to take advantage of the new opportunities by equipping Hounslow's young people with the skills required to prepare them for these new career opportunities."



## Ever thought of becoming a 'green' apprentice?

With the surge in demand for skills in the green economy, many apprenticeships are becoming available in the environmental sector.

# On yer bike... or bus, or train

**Our aim is for almost three quarters of trips to be made on foot, by cycling or by public transport by 2041.**

Road transport is responsible for approximately one third of Hounslow's carbon emissions and other pollutants that are harmful to our health, including particulates and Nitrogen Oxides.

To achieve the ambitious targets set out in our Climate Emergency Action Plan, Hounslow's latest transport strategy proposes that 71 per cent of trips must be made by walking, cycling and public transport by 2041, up from around 56 per cent presently. This is to be achieved through the introduction of a wide range of infrastructure such as new rail and bus routes, combined with measures designed to encourage behaviour change such as free cycle training for all school pupils. The benefits of this approach are not limited to the environment however, and will

also improve the health of residents and unlock economic growth.

The strategy also recognises that a car will still be necessary for some journeys and in order to minimise their environmental impact, a change to electric vehicles is necessary. To support residents without a driveway, we have installed over 80 charge points within lamp columns on 37 residential streets and we now have our first fully electric street in the borough (Wavendon Avenue, Chiswick). By the end of 2021 we aim to have over 200 residential charge points installed. However, in response to the declaration of a climate emergency, we are proposing to allow residents who register with us to run charging cables from their homes across the footway if protected by a suitable trip deterrent.

The council is also committed to providing 'rapid' public charge points across the borough, specifically around town centres, to alleviate concerns surrounding range anxiety. We have

over 85 public charge points in the borough and aim to double this number over the next two years. We are also committed to providing charging infrastructure in all of our public car parks.

"For Hounslow to make a significant reduction to its carbon emissions, it is necessary for us to also reduce our dependence on fossil fuels. As the borough with the second largest number of EV charge points in London, we want to make the switch to electric viable for our residents. Additionally, our expanding cycle and public transport infrastructure will make it easier for you to choose more sustainable ways to get around."



Although electric vehicles are currently more expensive to buy than the petrol equivalent, they can offer significant savings in fuel costs.



**An EV charged at home could save you £1,000 a year in fuel costs (based on 10,000 miles/year)**

We are requesting residents who have no access to off-street parking and who own an electric vehicle to come forward so we can look to provide charging infrastructure in your area. ## Cycle Parking

Cycling is a great way to get around the borough but not everyone has the space to store their bike inside their home. We are now offering to install on-street bike hangars, such as this one in Silver Crescent, Chiswick where there is demand from residents. There is no charge for installation although users will be asked for a £36 annual rental per space. ## Cycleway 9 on track

Safety is the number one barrier to taking up cycling and the provision of cycle routes that are separated from other traffic is a priority for us. In December 2019, after several years in development, works to implement Cycleway 9 began at Kew Bridge and, by the end of 2021, will provide a continuous, fully segregated facility between Brentford and Chiswick town centres. This initial phase of work will modernise the traffic signals at Kew Bridge junction, improving crossing facilities for both pedestrians and cyclists.



Proposals to improve cycling facilities between Twickenham and Brentford recently received approval at Isleworth and Brentford Area Forum. The route is a key link between these town centres and users will benefit from a high-quality route along quieter roads and a new cycle track created on South Street and Upper Square in Isleworth. Work on this route will begin this month.

## Making south Chiswick pedestrian-friendly

The South Chiswick Liveable Neighbourhood scheme will deliver a number of projects across the Grove Park and Dukes Meadows areas that aim to increase the number of trips made by foot, bike and public transport while improving local public space. The proposed projects include a new pedestrian walkway under Barnes Bridge and a new public square in Grove Park near to Chiswick Station. The initial consultation generated great feedback from the local community with over 600 comments received. ## On the low-emission buses



In June 2019, Chiswick High Road became one of 12 low emission bus zones introduced across London, in which only buses with the latest 'Euro VI' compliant engines and exhaust systems are allowed. These buses emit on average 91 per cent less NOx than those used previously and have been an important factor in reducing measured NO2 concentrations along the High Road by 24 per cent between 2016 and 2019.

# Transforming our parks and open spaces - you'd better be-leaf it!

**Hounslow will be home to thousands of new trees, shrubs and flowers as our planting programme progresses this year.**

Our Greener Borough Framework guides all our activities around creating a more attractive and environmentally-sustainable borough and greening activities play a key part in this. We are already working with residents, community groups, partners, schools and business on a variety of greening projects including:

- 🌿 Planting a tree or hedge for every child born in the borough for the next ten years (about 5,000 a year).
- 🌿 Greening our urban spaces including green roofs and walls
- 🌿 Establishing Greener Community Reference Groups to co-design service provision and to develop the delivery of action plans
- 🌿 Maximising the health and wellbeing benefits from our parks and open spaces
- 🌿 Planting wildflowers in 20 new urban sites and in our parks, providing over 10,000m<sup>2</sup> of coverage throughout the borough.



Cllr Samia Chaudhary, Cabinet Member for Leisure, said:

"Hounslow is a green borough – with parks and open spaces accounting for 33 per cent of it. But we want to make it even greener. Not only will this make our parks, open spaces and urban environment more attractive for everyone, but greening the borough will play an essential part in offsetting our carbon emissions and helping in our fight against climate change."

## Cleaner Greener Action Days – tackling flytipping

Our Environmental Services team has been carrying out Cleaner Greener Action Days in central Hounslow to clamp down on illegal dumping of waste.

We take flytipping very seriously in Hounslow, with 4,803 Fixed Penalty Notices issued in 2019. The negative effects of dumping waste are not just limited to the environment. This activity really affects our communities; most of whom take pride in where they live and who are weary of the selfish actions of a small number of people.

We will continue to carry out further action days throughout the borough, so flytippers beware!



Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Highways, Recycling and Companies, said:

"Our cleaner greener Hounslow programme continues to go from strength to strength, driven by our communities who are at the heart of this programme, along with the council's teams. I am continuously impressed by the level of ongoing community action in Hounslow. I hope that more will be inspired to join us by getting involved with our many community initiatives to make Hounslow cleaner and greener.

"What flies in the face of this effort is the persistent littering and dumping of rubbish in the borough by a small minority. We are stepping up our efforts and resource to clamp down on offenders and will be bringing them to book."

# Waste less, save more

A new waste partnership has been set up to increase food waste recycling, tackle climate change and save taxpayer's money across the borough.

## WASTE PLEDGE:

Make recycling easier, improve bulky waste collections and reduce flytipping



West London Waste which manages Hounslow's food waste, has partnered with Bio Collectors to help achieve the London-wide recycling target of 65 per cent by 2030, as well as reducing the borough's overall CO2 emissions.

Collected food waste is transferred to an anaerobic digestion plant in Mitcham where it is composted. The end products are biogas, used to fuel the trucks and generate electricity for west London homes, and digestate that is used as a fertilizer in local farms and parks.

**Coming soon! If you live in a flat in the borough, then food waste recycling is on its way. Look out for more information over the coming months.**

## Why should I recycle my food waste?

- Food waste on average makes up 30 per cent of all residual black bin waste, costing the council to collect, transport and incinerate as part of the energy from waste process.
- This waste equates to around £700 per year for the average household.
- If each west London household recycled just 2kg of food waste per week, it would save 600,000 tonnes of CO2 per year.

## How can I start recycling my food waste?

If you receive a kerbside recycling collection, you can order your FREE indoor 5L caddy and outdoor 23L caddy to start your food waste recycling journey.

If you order before 30 April, you will also receive FREE compostable liners, not normally provided.

## New bulky waste service launches Wednesday 1 April

Disposing of large and bulky household items can be tricky. We have overhauled our bulky waste collection service to make this easier for you.

### Who can use the Bulky Waste service?

Anyone registered to pay Council Tax in Hounslow (with payment details matching your Council Tax address) and landlords with properties in the borough.

### What does it cost?

- The price has been reduced to £40 for up to five items (previously £50) with additional items charged at £8 each.
- Residents in receipt of Council Tax Reduction are eligible for the discounted rate of £15 for up to five

items with additional items charged at £3 each.

- The cost to landlords is £70 for up to five items with additional items charged at £14 each.

### What are the collection days?

Collections are now available five days a week (Monday to Friday).

# Our Budget

## for 2020/21 explained

We want to keep investing in Hounslow, delivering our pledges, improving services and enhancing our borough and the lives of our diverse communities. At the same time, a decade of austerity and increasing costs and demands means we face significant financial challenges. That's why this year we have taken the difficult decision to increase Council Tax.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Cabinet Member for Finance and Corporate Services, said: "Our responsibility as a council is to provide local services for residents and ensure our borough is a great place to live, work, study and visit. We have ambitious plans for Hounslow but need to respond to increasing local demand and government requirements.

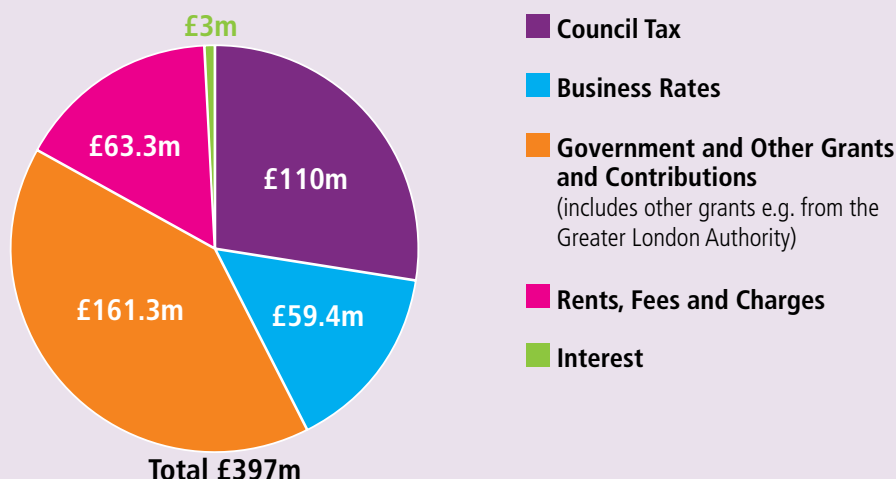
"Over the past 10 years we have had to manage unprecedented reductions in funding from the Government, meaning we have had to save many millions of pounds from our core budget since 2010.

"Against this backdrop, and in order to protect frontline services while achieving our ambitions, deliver government requirements and meet increasing demand for services and the needs of a growing and ageing population, we have had to make the difficult decision to increase your Council Tax this year by 3.99 per cent. This increase will cost an extra £48.92 a year, or just over £4 a month, for a typical Band D property (excluding the Greater London Authority precept). A two per cent increase is ringfenced to protect adult social care – an increase in line with government policy – and 1.99 per cent is a general increase

reflecting the impact of inflation on the council's costs.

"To minimise the impact on services, we have focused on increasing our efficiency by encouraging greater use of online services, reducing contract and insurance costs, working smarter and reducing back office costs. Our move to a smaller, modern, efficient and environmentally-friendly building – Hounslow House – in April 2019 has also resulted in lower running costs as well as placing us at the heart of the community providing easier access to our building, increasing visitors to our library."

## Where our money comes from



We also receive £93.5m for Housing Benefit and £116.3m for schools, which cannot be spent on anything else. We get £88.9m from council housing revenue which covers the costs of building and maintaining homes and estates.

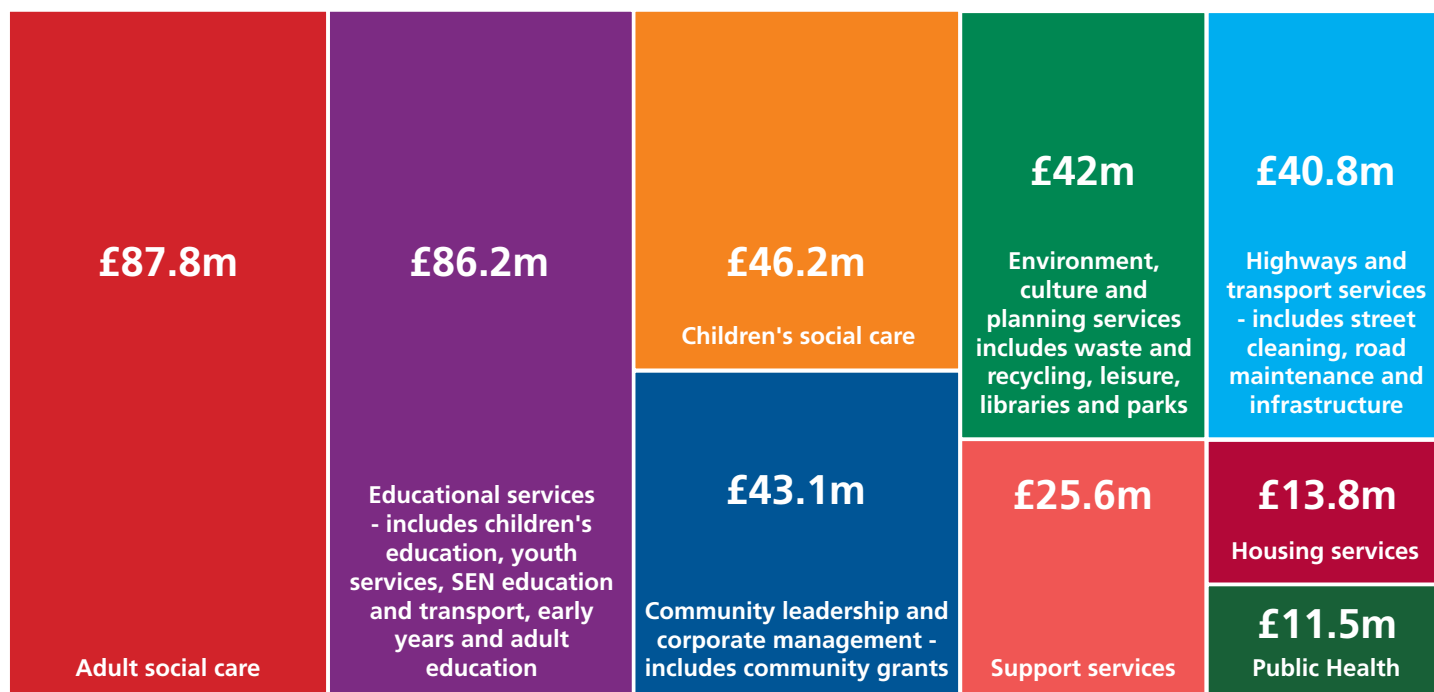
## Where it is spent

The money we receive gets spent on providing services for our residents, businesses and schools. By far the biggest share is spent on adults and children's social care - £134m combined. This is where some of the greatest pressures are on our budget

with a growing and ageing population with increasingly complex care needs. We spend £86.2m on education services including youth services, special educational needs (SEN), and adult education. Our £42m spend on environment, culture and planning

includes £22.2m on waste and recycling, and £8.3m on our parks, leisure and libraries. We also spend £40m on highways and transport making sure our streets are clean, well maintained and the infrastructure improved.

Cllr Steve Curran, Leader of Hounslow Council, said: "We continue to live through uncertain times. As Britain has just left the European Union, we are not yet clear what this will mean in terms of a trade agreement or the impact on our economy. Then there is the unknown impact of coronavirus. However, what we can be sure about is our continued desire to provide good quality services for you, to enable everyone to receive a good education, find suitable work, live in good quality homes and in a clean and green environment, and for those in most need to be looked after.

"We will continue to invest in our borough and the services that are important to you, while making savings where we can. Though we always need to spend within our means, we remain ambitious for Hounslow and we will continue to make improvements for the benefit of all."

We are committed to delivering on our pledges and the priorities outlined in our corporate plan, and we are well on the way to doing so:

- 5,000 pledge - our biggest priority continues to be the provision of new housing. We are working with the Mayor of London to deliver our housing targets, and we have pledged to secure the delivery of 5,000 genuinely affordable homes by 2022 (page 20).
- We will spend £2m on fixing potholes and improving streets. Thank you for highlighting the potholes and streets that most needed fixing, we now have the lowest backlog of streets needing maintenance in London\*. (page 10)
- We will create 4,000 new apprenticeships across the borough, including 400 within the council. We are more than half-way to achieving this (page 9)
- We have pledged to increase our recycling rates, and we are doing this through improving services to flats and increasing food waste recycling (page 14).

Nasra and Yusuf Husein who have fostered a total of 46 children (so far) were just two of 120 foster carers from the borough recognised at a loyal service event held recently.

While the work of foster carers can go unnoticed, the positive impact and effect they have on the lives of children and young people is impossible to ignore and the Huseins were presented with a

20-years' loyal service award at the event. A number of other attendees were recognised with awards for 10- and 15-years' service.

Mrs Husein said: "I have three boys of my own and they were young when we started fostering. After we saw a TV programme about fostering, as a family, we decided to help children in care.

"My boys became friends with the children that came to stay with us, sharing their toys and teaching younger ones skills. This made the children we cared for feel like part of the family and understand how families work."

The couple have fostered babies, children and teenagers, with placements lasting anything from a few weeks to a few months. It's well known that giving children the best start in life helps them to lead healthy and happy lives. But the benefits don't stop there. Parents who have taken up the opportunity for free childcare have used their time well – to return to work, undertake training / education or had more time to focus on themselves.



The free time childcare gave Gwyneth Rogers allowed her to complete a qualification, which saw her being awarded Learner of the Year. She said: "Sending my two-year-olds to nursery gave me back some independence – and they both thrived. My children loved their time at nursery. They made friends, grew in confidence

and took to going to school very easily. I was able to use the time to take up a voluntary placement, followed by training which led to a childcare qualification and then a job."

- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Universal Credit and are not working
- Universal credit and you and your partner have a combined income from work of £15,400 or less, a year after tax
- Working Tax Credit and you have an income of £16,190 or less before tax.

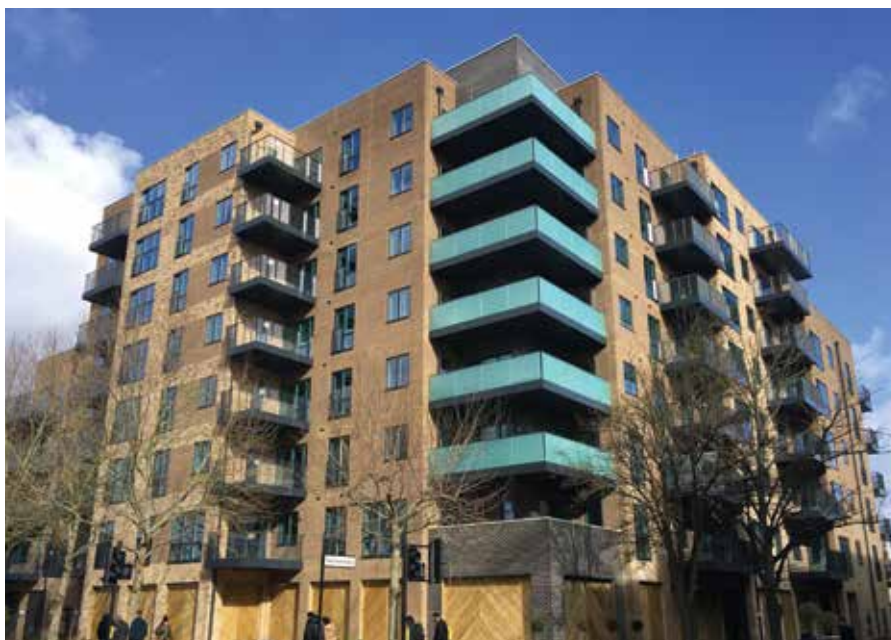

## Eden House – Hounslow

Eden House in Hounslow town centre will provide 75 new flats for the borough, and local residents will be able to move into their new homes over the next few months.

Eden House (formerly Nantly House) provides a mix of London affordable rent, private rent and shared ownership flats, along with a community facility for adult social services. The shared ownership homes will be delivered by Octavia Housing.

Cllr Steve Curran, Leader of Hounslow Council and Cabinet Member for Regeneration, said: "The new building is the first site to be completed by Lampton360, the council's wholly-owned trading company. This development will create much needed new housing, including many more affordable homes which will benefit the local community."



Designed by architects Archadia, the new homes will have their own balcony and benefit from shared access to a garden, as well as providing a large community space.

## Building at Brentford Towers

Work started on the construction of 11 homes at Brentford Towers in January, following engagement and consultation sessions with residents during 2017 and 2019. These will consist of one-, two- and four-bedroom flats within the Brentford Towers Estate, creating homes for people in the local area.

The tower blocks benefiting from the work include Wicksteed House, Fraser House, Cornish House, Harvey House, Maudsley House and Boulton House.

# Care and the community

**The opening of Bristol Court - Extra Care Housing in Feltham - provides a fantastic resource for our high-needs and vulnerable residents enabling them to stay independent while receiving the care they need.**



The innovative project is the council's first ever scheme for older people who need extra care, those with dementia and those with learning difficulties.

Extra Care Scheme housing is a radical new way of delivering care: it delays the prospect of moving into a full-time care home as it is designed to meet the needs of vulnerable adults, enabling them to get support to stay independent as and when they need it. It also decreases the need for acute medical services. The Bristol Court development specifically aims to improve the independence and quality of life of its residents, with the added benefit that couples and friends can stay together.

The opening on 28 January was a fun-packed day, mixed with music, food, and Bristol Court's own version of Britain's Got Talent, where residents had an opportunity to demonstrate a variety of their hidden talents.

The Mayor, Cllr Tony Louki, said: "Bristol Court is a great joint partnership between the council's Housing and Adult Social Care teams. It's inspiring to see people with different needs and of different ages living together. "

Council Leader Steve Curran added: "This has been such an exciting project and demonstrates our commitment to providing the borough's older

and vulnerable people with top-class facilities.

"By providing good quality homes we are bringing a new quality of life; especially for people who require physical adaptations to their homes and care where they live. For friends and family, they also have the comfort and reassurance of knowing that help is on the doorstep as and when required."

Bristol Court provides 94 self-contained flats and will include a restaurant and beautiful communal gardens and lounges for residents to enjoy.

## Pilot programme sees gas consumption halved

A pilot programme carried out by Hounslow Council on seven properties in the borough, to ascertain the effects of external wall insulation, found a staggering 50 per cent reduction in gas consumption in properties where solid-walled housing had been retrofitted. This decrease saved one particular householder a total of £367 a year.

This is part of a wider programme of work we are carrying out to improve energy efficiency and reduce carbon emissions in council-owned homes.

We have fitted insulation in 250 properties, replaced single-glazed windows, inefficient gas boilers and faulty radiators as we implement our fuel-efficient mission in council housing.

- **Energy improvement projects**  
- External wall insulation improvements to approximately 250 properties on the Worton and Worple Estates (Isleworth) and other social properties as well as the insulation of any remaining loft or roof voids.

- **Heating** - replacing old, inefficient gas boilers, faulty radiators and upgrading heating controls, as well as upgrading district and communal heating systems and water risers in housing estate blocks to improve the efficiency of heating systems.
- **Window renewal** - replacing single-glazed windows and older less efficient double-glazed windows. The Mayor of London is calling for a system of "deep retrofits", by which each dwelling would receive a one-off refurbishment covering all the needed improvements and make the homes fit for the future. These whole house retrofits aren't cheap – and we are assessing the financial implications of such a programme across our managed stock. Retrofitting a typical house can take several weeks and residents can remain living there throughout - acknowledging that some minor inconvenience associated with building works is inevitable.

energy efficiency of council-owned buildings including our housing and to commit to delivering zero carbon housing developments.

To achieve this, we must retrofit all our existing stock in order to significantly improve the energy efficiency, reduce space heating costs for residents and address fuel poverty. The scale of our task is clear when you consider that 80 per cent of the housing stock that will exist in 2050 is already built and gas used for heating council-owned homes and water accounts for 71 per cent of all the council's carbon emissions!

## Building up to carbon neutral

The council has a key role to play in shaping future housing development through the planning process. The Hounslow Local Plan seeks full carbon neutrality for all new development which in the first instance should be achieved on site. However recent developments that have been granted consent demonstrate that this can be challenging. For example, the Capitol Interchange Way development includes energy efficient building fabric and insulation, highly efficient double glazing and heating systems, low energy lighting, a site wide decentralised energy network and 93sqm of solar PV.

Even with these measures the development could not demonstrate full carbon neutrality and as a result the developer had to make a contribution to the council's Carbon Offset Fund to make the entire project essentially 'zero carbon'. These are the challenges that the council will be lobbying central government to address as we work towards reducing our own carbon footprint.



## Seven million litres of water saved in Hounslow!



Householders across the borough have been benefitting from Groundwork London's Green Doctor service. As well as giving you tips and advice on how to make your home more fuel efficient, saving you money while keeping you warmer and staying well, the Green Doctors scheme has resulted in some impressive reductions in carbon emissions, which nationally achieved the results outlined below:

Last year, Green Doctors visited 610 homes in Hounslow, and through a combination of providing energy efficiency measures and encouraging residents to change their behaviour they were able to help households save:

- Over £95k through switching utility providers, applying for grants and discounts, and implementing efficiency measures.
- Saving over 38,000kg of carbon dioxide emissions and over 7m litres of water through energy saving methods.

## Our young residents get their voices heard

Around 50 of our young residents and their family members attended the premiere screening at Hounslow House in February of 'Hard to Reach', a film the team produced jointly with the Heston West Big Local youth film club and local film company MADE. The 15-minute documentary sees young Hounslow residents talk about their hopes and fears for the borough, and their messages to the people in charge. Having a home that suits your needs can transform people's lives, which is why we want to help you make the change.

Where possible we will equip homes with specialist equipment or fixtures that will help residents with special needs. This can vary from installing ramps, modifying door frames and bathrooms to helping keep everyone secure where residents with special needs pose a risk to themselves or others.

The Housing Adaptation team has recently started installing Safespace enclosures (as pictured) for residents with children who have sensory needs utilising the Disabled Facilities Grant.

We recently installed a Safespace for a child who has benefited greatly from the space as it provided a calming influence on the child, enabling her to sleep through the night giving their family peace of mind - they can all now better focus on their school and work.

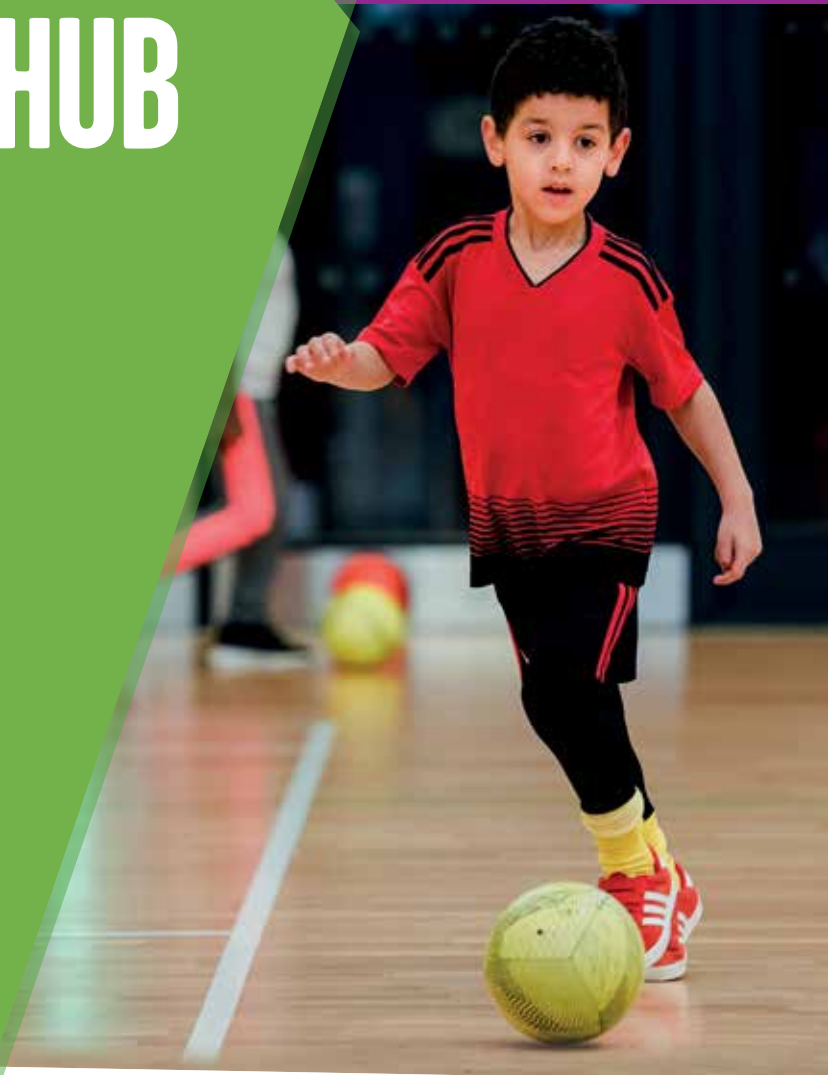

The last three months have been filled with a mixture of anniversaries, ceremonies and celebrations for The Mayor of Hounslow, Cllr Tony Louki

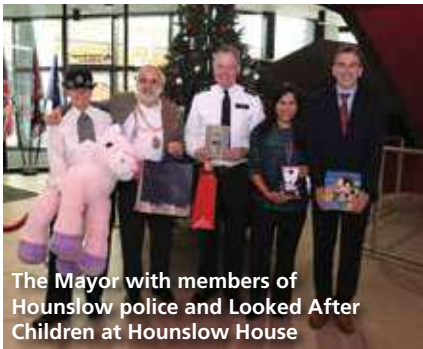
## HIGHLIGHTS

# Cllr Hanif Khan

## Cabinet Member for Transport and One Hounslow

### How long have you been a councillor?

I was elected in 2014 in Hanworth Park. I am very thankful to the residents of Hanworth Park for putting their trust in me.

### What got you interested in politics?

I grew up in a very political household. At every election we would be out canvassing. My father was a big influence on me.

### Have you always lived in the borough?

Yes, I was born, raised and educated here. Hounslow has always been home to me and politically we are very well represented by our MPs, Seema Malhotra and Ruth Cadbury. Hounslow was also the setting for one of my favourite films: Bend it Like Beckham. Hounslow is a wonderfully diverse and exciting place to live with very strong communities.

### Do you have a 'day job' as well as being a councillor? How do you manage to juggle your workload?

Yes, I have a video production company that takes me to exciting places and to meet interesting people. It's very flexible and allows me to be available for council business and devote time to my casework for residents.

While working in this industry, I have been fortunate to work at BskyB, both

for Sky Sport and News. When Mo Farah won his first gold medal, he did his famous MOBOT signature and I was responsible for editing the footage to be aired as soon as the race was over. Mo's gesture was played directly from my editing suite live to the world. A very pressured moment but that's what makes live sport and news so exciting.

Away from work I volunteer as a radio presenter for a weekly drive time show on digital radio and I regularly get involved in organising community events.

### What are your key priorities in the next year for your portfolio area?

My two key areas are Transport and One Hounslow, the council's transformation programme. That will help us improve our residents' experience, reduce bureaucracy and improve our use of information. Our focus on One Hounslow, building quality housing and embracing our vibrant culture is music to my ears.

With Transport, I'm keen to prioritise the safety of our residents, make better use of our cycle highways, and introduce a Workplace Parking Levy – the first London borough to do so – which will go a long way towards paying for our new transport infrastructure.

Cycling is a key area, so it is important

to encourage everybody to try cycling as an alternative way of getting around.

### What are your aspirations for Hounslow going forward?

I have three goals for Hounslow: Firstly, I want education and training available for everyone and to improve standards and opportunities. This promotes innovation and raises the prosperity of our residents. Secondly, I want to see high levels of long-term employment. And last, but most importantly, I would like to see improved health of our residents, with everyone given access to good quality care.

# Meet the team keeping you safe

**Keeping our residents safe is our number one priority, but we couldn't do it without our partners in the emergency services. That's why Hounslow Council has its own police team.**

Despite the government cutting council budgets and policing across the capital, we continue to invest in

our own LBH police force to protect everyone in the borough.

Our 14-strong police team comprises one sergeant and 13 constables, across two teams; with four Estate Patrol Officers (EPOs) and nine police officers. The main role of the Estate Patrol Officers is to work alongside our Housing and Enforcement teams

tackling problems on estates. The other nine officers work with other council departments, targeting priority areas.

Some of the main issues that the police team cover include illegal traveller camping, anti-social behaviour, drug dealing and cuckooing, where drug dealers target vulnerable people.

## Our CCTV cameras never sleep!



In January we unveiled our new state-of-the-art CCTV control centre in Brentford enabling us to monitor our streets and public places round the clock. Our capability is further enhanced by our new high definition CCTV cameras being installed right across the borough. These provide much better picture

quality, enabling us to identify suspects, read vehicle registration plates, and record crimes such as assaults or fly tipping.

There are over 500 CCTV cameras on the council's housing estates, and a further 200 across the borough, all of which are being replaced this year.

In addition, the council has invested in 20 rapid deployment cameras that can easily be moved round the borough to monitor hotspots for crimes such as fly tipping, drug dealing and anti-social behaviour. The entire network is monitored 24/7, 365 days.



Cllr Katherine Dunne, Cabinet Member for Communities and Climate Emergency said:

"Compared to many other London boroughs, Hounslow is not a high crime borough, but of course crime does occur, and sometimes it can be very serious. We are doing everything we can to safeguard our communities and keep crime low. Our investment in our new control centre and CCTV network is helping us to achieve this."
