Christmas will be different this year

There will be special restrictions for five days over the Christmas period, the Government has announced. When following these new rules, we must each continue to take personal responsibility to limit the spread of the virus and protect our loved ones, particularly if they are vulnerable.

- For five days, 23 to 27 December, you can form a bubble of people from no more than three households.
- You can only be in one Christmas bubble which can't change.
- You can travel between tiers and UK nations to meet your Christmas bubble.
- Please limit social contact with people you don't live with to minimise risk and protect your loved ones, especially the most vulnerable.

Dear residents,

Welcome to Hounslow Matters - Winter 2020. What an extraordinary year. Little did we know last January what lay ahead, but as 2020 draws to a close, our lives have been dramatically changed by the pandemic. Some of you will have lost people dear to you. Many are worried for the future. We are all still adapting and learning to live with COVID-19's challenges, and Hounslow has been particularly badly hit, in no small part due to our economic dependence on Heathrow.



As we go to print, we're waiting to see what tier London will be in, but it is still not clear in the run-up to Christmas and New Year festivities when - or whether - we will resume a form of normality.

Despite the challenges, we should be delighted with how we have responded as a borough; proud of how our communities pulled together and of the large numbers of people volunteering their time and supporting others. Throughout the year we have done our best to support you and keep you up to date with a rapidly evolving situation, and made sure thousands of people got the support they needed.

We've also acted to demonstrate optimism for our future. The Borough Recovery Conference brought together those who serve our community to hammer out plans which address the serious challenges that lie ahead.

We will renew the local economy, reimagine the places we live in, tackle inequality, and empower more residents to deliver that vision with us. We will continue to call on Government for an Aviation Communities Fund to support boroughs like ours, where tens of thousands of jobs are at risk because of their reliance on airports and associated businesses.

There is still a way to go until vaccines will start to bring the pandemic under control, but we have been given hope by the fantastic news of two vaccines which - tested in rigorous trials - offer protection from COVID-19. In the meantime, it's important we stick together and look out for our neighbours in these cold winter months.

On 1 January, the UK will leave the European Union. I know this adds extra uncertainty for many, but we will continue to work hard to make all residents feel welcome and supported. In recent weeks, we have worked with Hounslow Citizen Advice to support EU nationals to maintain their right to live, work and study in the UK. I urge you to get in touch if you need that extra support.

With all those we have lost this year in our thoughts, I wish everyone a happy and hopeful festive season. I look forward to working with you in 2021 to build a fairer, greener, stronger borough.

Aviation Communities Taskforce takes flight

We are leading national calls for targeted support for communities which could be devastated by the downturn in air travel due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Support for an Aviation Communities Taskforce was pledged at a summit hosted by the Council in November, which was attended by leading politicians and experts. It heard from places across the UK which are reliant on local airports for jobs and are now facing major economic and social impacts.

Speakers included Aviation Minister Robert Courts MP, Shadow Aviation Minister Mike Kane MP, and Anas Sarwar, MSP for Glasgow, alongside representatives from the Greater Manchester Combined Authority and the International Air Transport Association.

Cllr Steve Curran, Leader of the Council, who opened the summit, said: "Hundreds of thousands of people in communities reliant on the aviation industry are facing widespread unemployment, deprivation and barriers to securing future work. They cannot be forgotten.

"Our new Taskforce will bring together key individuals and organisations

nationally and come up with the solutions needed to support families and jobs. We need to build a broad coalition to support aviation communities and see concerted action to ensure their recovery and prosperity."

Independent research shows almost £1 billion could be lost from Hounslow's economy from the downturn at Heathrow alone, and 43,000 connected jobs are at risk.

The Taskforce is calling on Government for an Aviation Communities Fund to invest in training, reskilling, low carbon jobs and local infrastructure.

The Aviation Minister praised the Council's work and its "constructive and pragmatic ideas for the future", and stated his commitment to helping aviation recover.

A cool half million...

Hounslow's creative sector has gained a £500,000 boost to help local people into careers and support small businesses.

The new fund comes from the Mayor of London's Creative Enterprise Zone programme, the European Social Fund and the contributions made to the Council from developers as part of planning applications.

Hounslow is home to highprofile names in the creative sector such as Sky, Paramount and Disney, but also to many small, innovative businesses and start-ups that are vital to the local economy.

The new fund will support residents into employment in a sector often overlooked as a career choice. It will particularly focus on women and BAME creatives in areas where they are often underrepresented.

Plans on how to allocate the funding are being developed, and hope to involve local organisations, including schools, colleges and creative specialists. The programme will launch early in 2021.

The Job Entry Targeted Support (JETS) is designed to help people to find work who have been unemployed and in receipt of benefits for at least 13 weeks. Job seekers will receive support for up to six months on a one to one basis, helping to overcome barriers to employment and identifying transferable skills to expand their opportunities. There will also be access to online courses, training, video tutorials and updates on suitable vacancies.

Our plan to make Hounslow a thriving borough, digitally fit for the future is well on track with the first-ever Digital Festival Hounslow.

Hounslow's first Digital Festival attracted household names like Microsoft, Amazon and Google. Experts from these global giants took to the virtual stage to deliver seminars and workshops in a jam-packed schedule throughout November.



n March, Hounslow's Cabinet approved the Digital Strategy which sets out a vision of connected communities across Hounslow. As COVID-19 's impacts have been felt across the borough, the plan has grown in importance, as we all seek to meet the challenges of renewing our local economy.

Over four weeks, 40 sessions on a mix of digital, IT, and issues like wellbeing, and how to get your dream job were livestreamed, with events ranging from Bot Building to Stress Busting.

Digital Festival Hounslow was a great success, providing residents with opportunities to learn new skills free of charge and to meet new people - safely as it was held virtually! If you didn't tune in, don't worry. We expect it back bigger and better in 2021!

The Digital Festival was the first of many of our Digital Strategy initiatives

designed to help you to use digital to transform your life for the better. Our strategy will help create a better-connected borough and help those who are not confident using the internet. One of its most important aims is to make our online services so good, most people will choose to use them. Within the Council the strategy promotes datasharing to assist more effective planning and to better-design services.

We are also working to make services easier to use and we are using all the evidence available to us to do that. But we won't pressurise residents to move online for key services. Digital does enable many improvements, but traditional customer service methods will remain a crucial element of our service delivery.



Homelessness can happen to anyone

COVID-19 has affected many of our residents in ways they would not have imagined and has resulted in more people facing homelessness. The current rules about evictions from your home can be confusing but you can find useful information on the Council website.

During lockdown restrictions and over the Christmas period between 11 December 2020 and 11 January 2021 evictions will not take place, except in the most

serious cases. We urge you not to leave accommodation where it is safe for you to remain and to get in touch first if you think you are going to be homeless.

If you come across anyone sleeping rough in Hounslow, please tell us so we can reach out and support them off the streets and into accommodation. You can send an alert via Streetlink at www.streetlink.london or call 0300 500 0914.



Housing help is at hand

Our residents have faced extraordinary challenges this year, including job losses and hardship, with more people facing homelessness and financial difficulties. The Housing Service has sought to ensure it has always responded decisively and compassionately, making fast adjustments to redirect resources where they are most needed, sourcing more accommodation to meet increased demands.

Over 8,000 residents have contacted us for advice and support. Our focus continues to be on preventing homelessness and providing help and support for those who need it.

We recognise that Christmas can be a particularly difficult time for those facing

homelessness but this year is going to bring even more challenges with restrictions in place due to COVID-19. If you are experiencing difficulties, you may not know who to turn to, but you can check out the information on our website.

SUPPORT IN A CRISIS: The Samaritans offer a safe place for you to talk at any time you like. Whatever you're going through, a Samaritan will face it with you. You can call for free on 116 123, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The pandemic has presented many challenges however we have continued to work towards ensuring we can deliver local homes for local people. We have now secured 1,985 homes as part of our housing pledge.

Alcott Close

In October we marked the completion of the roof of our new development at Alcott Close, Feltham – part of our small, Council-owned site development programme. This bungalow will suit a person with disabilities, needing support.

Cllr Steve Curran, Leader of Hounslow Council said, "The biggest cost of building new homes is land, so doing it this way makes real financial sense and supports our commitment to provide affordable, high-quality council homes for our residents.



"I'm very pleased that this development supports the Council's commitment to be carbon neutral by 2030 and I would like to thank our Housing Development Team for their continued hard work and the construction company, Borras Construction."

Frank Towell Court

We have granted planning permission to build 102 new Council homes on land within the existing estate at Frank Towell Court in Feltham.



Go green and save money

You could help us to tackle climate change and save money on your energy bills with the Government's Green Homes Grant (GHG) scheme, available now.



Homeowners and landlords can apply for a voucher towards the cost of installing energy efficient and low-carbon heating improvements to homes, saving up to £600 a year on energy bills.



You could get up to two-thirds of the cost of their home improvements paid for to a maximum of £5,000 to cover home improvements such as insulation of walls, lofts, floors and roofs.

onvent Way in Heston, and Charlton House in Brentford, are the first estates being consulted as part of the Council's major estate regeneration plans announced in January.

If residents agree, six estates will be transformed to provide better quality, energy efficient homes for them. New and improved public open spaces and hundreds of new affordable homes will also be built.

The proposals for Convent Way could see more than 500 new homes added to the current 414, as part of the major redesign of the estate. At Charlton House, the existing 92 homes and shopping area will be redesigned, with about 100 new homes added. At least 50% of homes on the estates will be for Council social rent or shared ownership, and all secure tenants will have a right to return.

Council staff have been busy talking to residents to explain the proposals



and get their thoughts and ideas. They have now spoken to every household at Charlton & Albany House and will be continuing the intense engagement at Convent Way. Residents will continue shaping the plans as they develop and there will be a ballot on each estate next year where tenants and leaseholders vote on the Council's proposals for regeneration.

During the summer, the Council called for volunteers to form a Resident Steering Group (RSG) at Convent Way. Thirty-six families got involved to help select an architect through a design competition. Workshops were held to identify residents' priorities and aspirations for their homes and community. The feedback was used to create the initial designs, which the architects presented to the RSG, before a week-long public exhibition was held in September on the three competition entries. More than 300 residents gave their feedback.



Estate residents Shirley Wheatley, Manji Madhar and Ahmed Mohammed were nominated by the RSG to judge the entries with Council officers from the planning and development teams. After an extensive round of presentations and discussions the panel chose Bell Phillips Architects.

Shirley Wheatley said: "I found the process of the panel interesting with the views from ourselves the residents and the council. It was a long process listening and watching the architects talk and show their designs. It was quite difficult to decide which would be good for the estate but hopefully we have chosen the right one who seemed to be willing to work with us and listen to our views."

Cllr Steve Curran, Leader of the Council and Cabinet Member for Corporate Strategy, Planning and Regeneration, said: "The Estates Regeneration programme is part of our long term strategy to provide hundreds of new Council homes for our residents, which are not only sustainable, but meet the Council's climate emergency target to be carbon neutral by 2030.




Economic history

Feltham - our westernmost town centre - was once a home for thriving businesses in the aircraft industry and market gardens. The largest commercial glasshouses in the world were erected on Feltham Farm, now the Rochester Avenue estate.

Feltham Tram was made in what is

now the Leisure West complex. Aircraft manufacture was an important industry, particularly in the war years. Feltham was home to Britain's second largest railway marshalling yard, a target for German air force bombs in WW II. The Feltham factory was Aston Martin's post-war headquarters.





Housing zone status



Feltham was designated as a Housing Zone by the GLA in 2016, setting out a plan to deliver over 3,000 new homes by 2026. One of the housing schemes is Fairview's Feltham 355. The 120-unit development of which 40 per cent is affordable, located next to Feltham Station, is almost complete.

Feltham today

Feltham's bustling town centre includes 'The Centre' shopping centre, offering a wide range of shops, cafes, restaurants, banks, a library and health centre. Leisure West is the borough's only multiplex cinema and bowling alley. St Catherine's spire and Feltham War Memorial are iconic local landmarks, while green spaces, Feltham Green, Bridge House Pond and Feltham Arenas provide valuable spaces to bring communities together. The first two have recently been awarded the coveted Green Flag status. Feltham train station provides excellent connections to central London and beyond.



Public realm improvements

Investment in the public realm around the war memorial at Feltham Pond include a programme of fantastic improvements for Feltham Green. Local people will have witnessed the desilting operation at the pond last year. Tree pruning, new aquatic plants, shrubs grass, and a new boundary wall have also been completed.





Our Masterplan for Feltham

The 2017 Feltham Masterplan provides a framework to guide the transformation of Feltham until 2032. One of the major infrastructure projects is the road and rail improvement programme.

To enable South Western Railway to introduce ten-carriage trains, Network Rail extended the Feltham train station platforms, and the level crossing on Bedfont Lane was permanently closed. Work was undertaken to improve road safety and bus journey times and to minimise the impact of the

level crossing's closure on surrounding roads

The works were a massive undertaking and the closure of the bridge on Hounslow Road, necessary to widen the carriageway, caused significant disruption to local traffic. The works were unavoidably delayed for a number of reasons but the road bridge was finally reopened on 14 October, resulting in a much improved road and rail network for the town centre, improving connectivity and making it fit for 21st Century needs.

Town centre improvements



Meanwhile, the town centre has been transformed with an extensive programme of improvement works. Footways have been repaved and widened, new street lighting installed, new pedestrian crossings and cycle lanes introduced, bus lanes have been lengthened, carriageways resurfaced and new street furniture put in place. A new one-way system in Victoria Road has improved pedestrian safety and links to the town centre.

Feltham in Bloom

Year 3 pupils at Victoria Junior School, the inspiration behind the Feltham in Bloom community volunteering movement have been busy preparing plants to give away to care homes and in the community in the run-up to Christmas. So far, working with Feltham In Bloom, they have given away over 500 cuttings and plants and will continue making Feltham greener and bringing joy to many. Well done Victoria Junior School - You're blooming marvellous!

THINKING GREEN, ACTIN

Hounslow is one of London's greenest boroughs, and plans to be greener still, with about 40 per cent being parks and open land.

Hounslow Council's Climate Emergency Action Plan puts climate emergency and improving Hounslow's air quality at the top of the agenda. With commitments to thousands of new trees, shrubs and wildflowers, increasing re-use and recycling rates and reducing the Council's own emissions and use of plastic, the plan has won national praise.

The Council has taken some important and innovative steps to tackle climate change and to keep the borough as one of London's greenest.

However, we plan to become even greener! We adopted a climate emergency action plan in July this year and have been working hard to progress on a huge programme of positive changes to reduce carbon emissions and transform our environment and improve air quality for the benefit of everyone.



Greening the borough - 4,500 new trees

This year the Greenspace 360 parks team and Hounslow Highways tree team, are planting more than 4,500 saplings of different varieties across the borough, a long-term commitment as part of our plans to tackle the climate emergency and support greening the borough.


A greener borough benefits both people and the environment, providing homes for wildlife and helping to absorb pollution. Trees are vital to this strategy and as the biggest plants on the planet they give us oxygen, store carbon, stabilise the soil and are a critical support for wildlife.

You can get involved through your local Friends groups of volunteers to look after our parks and open spaces. If you have a garden, why not plant your own trees, along with wildlife loving varieties of flowers and shrubs?

More green steps

We've contacted over 350 households providing them advice on improving the energy efficiency of their homes as well as providing the most vulnerable with vouchers and devices to help get them out of fuel poverty.

We have also been developing funding bids to secure government grants to retrofit Hounslow schools and council buildings, allowing us to generate localised renewable energy and reduce our utility bills.




Kar-go ships medicines

Hounslow is the first location in the UK to trial the Kar-go autonomous delivery vehicles – initially delivering prescriptions to care homes. This is the result of a partnership between the Academy of Robots (a UK tech start-up) and Hounslow Highways. Plans are now in place which aspire to use Kar-go's vision system for the early detection of faults in the road.

Electric Vehicle charge points

We have extended our network of Electric Vehicle (EV) charge points across the borough with a combination of 173 lamp column, 80 fast charge points and seven rapid charge points which typically offer a full charge up to ten times faster than any other charge point, facilitating recharging for EV drivers across the borough.

Sunny side of the Streetspace!



Less traffic, safer roads, cleaner air, more freedom to walk and cycle safely - these are some of the Streetspace goals. But we want to hear what you think!

Our Low Traffic Neighbourhoods (Streetspace) programme launched in May, when the Government asked us to make extra space for pedestrians and cyclists to get around more safely and observe social distancing as lockdown eased and businesses began to reopen.

The government encouraged councils to use different powers to put trial measures in as quickly as possible. That meant not following our usual process of consulting before schemes go in. Instead of consulting on whether a scheme should be installed, we have instead installed experimental schemes, so allowing our citizens to actually experience what the new traffic patterns would be like if the schemes were to be made permanent.

Streetspace trial measures across the borough take different forms. They may be:

- suspension of parking bays to widen pavements for pedestrians
- access restrictions to stop traffic from using residential streets as rat runs

- segregated, pop-up cycle lanes that make cycling safer
- 'school streets' which help children and their families walk, scoot and cycle to school in safety.

We believe Streetspace will bring many benefits for all who live and work in Hounslow - safer streets, a nicer environment, cleaner air, more people with healthier, active lifestyles. Less traffic on the road also enables those who need to drive to do so more easily.

Streetspace also supports our Climate Emergency Action Plan, and our vision for a green recovery.

We know that people may experience these trials differently or that they may not work as well as we intended, so we really want to hear from as many people as possible - whether you love or loathe the measures near you. These are temporary trails, and your feedback will help us to evaluate whether they are working or not.

Independent review

Our Low Traffic trials Clear signs of early wins

In November, The Prime Minister announced his commitment to doubling the number of UK journeys made by bike, by designating more "Low Traffic Neighbourhoods (LTNs)".

This means roads are closed to through traffic - and more road closures near schools, to promote cycling among pupils and boost air quality.

Both the Prime Minister and Labour Leader Sir Keir Starmer have backed Low Traffic Neighbourhoods in London, and in Hounslow COVID-19 has radically altered how we use transport. Brought forward at the Government's request to ensure COVID-safe spaces for pedestrians, cyclists, the elderly and disabled, Hounslow's approach to Low Traffic Neighbourhoods already seems to be delivering benefits. They are forecast to deliver increases in walking and cycling, cleaner air and nicer neighbourhoods, fewer accidents and safer roads for pedestrians, cyclists and our children.

Local trips on foot or by bike have noticeably increased. Public transport use has fallen dramatically. Trips to and from the airport have reduced.



Positive impacts already from the changes are that:

- some pollutants are down 20-30 per cent against the 2019 average
- there has been a notable reduction in transport related carbon emissions
- fewer cars on the road means congestion is lower
- walking and cycling (known as 'active travel' modes) are good forms of exercise and contribute to improved health and mental wellbeing.

The Council's response to these challenges and opportunities is in line with new statutory guidance issued by the Government and the Mayor of London's Transport Strategy.

It also delivers on the Council's own, key Air Quality and Climate Emergency action plans. The trial measures sit within a range of commitments to Clean Air, to green recovery and to long term Climate Crisis and sustainability measures, so it is critical that we lock-in positive changes wherever possible.

carers campaign has been launched to recognise the vital contribution that carers make to families and communities across our borough.

In Hounslow there are about 22,310 carers. Young carers look after a sibling or parent and often do more chores than other children would. On top of providing emotional support to the person they care for, they may also look after their personal needs like bathing and dressing.

Manjila cares for her sister N'nambalu, 27, who is disabled. The 17-year-old fits her other commitments, such as school and studying, around caring for her sister. A typical day for Manjila involves getting up at 5am to study for a few hours, cooking breakfast for her sister and helping her to get ready for school.

She said: "I have helped care for her nearly all of my life. It is all I have really known. Both her and I have an amazing relationship and facing the challenges that her health condition brings, has made us strong and resilient. I find it really rewarding to help her have a better quality of life."

"It's hard for people to understand what being a carer is like, especially having to explain to newfound friends. Sometimes I have to drop everything at short notice to help my sister. "I'm pleased the Council is running a campaign to raise awareness of carers and encourage more people to identify as carers. I am proud to share my story, because helping my family, who depend on me, isn't something to be ashamed of. In an ideal world, I'd like to see young carers have the opportunity to share their experience in school. This would make my peers more aware of some of the challenges we face."

Manjila receives support from the local young carer service, run by Brentford Football Club Community Sports Trust and commissioned by Hounslow Council. She said: "They provide a range of activities and trips where I can make friends with people who understand my situation and have someone to talk to which helps me keep everything balanced. To put myself first for a short time means a great deal. It's probably the hardest and most important part of being a carer."

Mahjila's advice to other carers would be to have a hobby that enables you to escape, be patient and priorities your time.



Protect yourself by getting the flu jab

Even at our fittest and healthiest, we can still catch the flu. For those aged 65 and over or 15 to 64 year-olds with a medical condition or pregnant women, catching flu can be more serious and that's why they are offered a free flu vaccine.

Carers and those patients with learning difficulties are entitled to a free flu jab.

The children's flu vaccine is safe and effective. It's offered every year as a nasal spray to children to help protect them against flu. Flu is caused by a virus. It can be a very unpleasant illness for children. It can also lead to serious problems, such as bronchitis and pneumonia. Children spread flu easily. Vaccinating them also protects others who are vulnerable to flu, such as babies and older people.

If in doubt, check it out



Finding cancer earlier makes it more treatable. If you have these symptoms it may be nothing serious, but it could be cancer:

- an unexplained lump
- unexplained pain that lasts three weeks or more
- unexpected blood, like in your pee or poo

Don't wait, call your GP surgery now to arrange an appointment. GP surgeries in Hounslow are open and safe to visit. All national cancer screening

programmes (breast, cervical and bowel) are running now. If you receive a text message or letter inviting you to a cancer screening appointment make sure you respond. Cancer screening saves lives by catching cancer early, so don't miss your appointment.

Don't visit your GP surgery or hospital if you or someone you live with has COVID-19 symptoms.

Remember, an explained lump, pain or unexpected blood could be cancer. Catch cancer early. Just speak to your GP.

Dr Richard Baxter, local GP and Clinical Lead for Cancer at NHS Hounslow CCG, said:

"Don't delay going to see your GP with cancer symptoms. If you find a lump or a mole or are concerned about symptoms you have, you should contact your GP straight away. GP practices are open and patients should be reassured that processes are in place to keep them safe."

Flu - facts Vs fiction

This winter, with the combined risk of flu and COVID-19, it is important to get your flu vaccination.

You may have concerns about getting your flu jab or have heard rumours that make you feel uncomfortable or worried. Make sure you know the facts.

Here are three common myths you may hear:

The flu is not serious, so I don't need the vaccine.

The flu can be serious for vulnerable people, but even healthy people can develop complications including pneumonia.

The flu vaccine can give me the flu. The injected flu vaccine contains an inactivated virus that cannot give you the flu. Feeling achy or slightly feverish afterwards is normal.

I am pregnant so shouldn't get the flu vaccine.

It is important to get your vaccine as your immune system is weaker than usual. The flu vaccine is safe at any stage of your pregnancy.

The Mayor visited volunteer poppy sellers from Isleworth Royal British Legion at Ivybridge Tesco ahead of Remembrance Day.




The Mayor, and his representatives laid wreaths at war memorials across the borough to commemorate those fallen on Remembrance Sunday.

Recycling at Christmas

After the gifts are unwrapped and the food is eaten, the festivities often leave us with a lot of waste. Here's a guide to making sure it all ends up in the right place!

During this festive season think about how you can reduce your waste at home. Ask yourselves – what could you do differently with any unwanted gifts, consider giving something a second lease of life or if you are going to need all that food when you go shopping. Less waste helps towards making a positive contribution to the environment, reducing our carbon footprint, while helping to keep the borough clean and tidy by not littering or dumping.



Christmas food waste

Don't put plastic bags or film in your recycling containers

Plastic bags or other films will clog up the recycling system, which could shut down the entire recycling system by getting bound up in the equipment. Recycle your plastic bags and waste film at your large local supermarket or even better use reusable shopping bags.

Battery recycling

It's important not to include batteries in your recycling as these can cause fires. Take them to your local Reuse and Recycling Centre or to a collection point at a supermarket, DIY store or local shop. Visit **takecharge.dtwdigital. co.uk** for more information.

Glitter and wrapping paper

Avoid shiny, glitter or foil wrapping as it can't be recycled. Wrapping paper can

only be recycled if it passes the scrunch test (scrunch the paper in your hand and if it stays in a ball, it can be recycled). Remove any tape or decorations as these cannot be recycled. Simple paper wrap can be recycled in your blue box, but foil or glitter-decorated paper, including cards, cannot and must go in the general waste.



Small Electrical Items

Small electrical items can be recycled. Place in a small bag next to your boxes on your collection day or take them to your nearest household waste and recycling centre.



Cardboard boxes

As online shopping increases, so do the number of boxes used for the deliveries. Most cardboard boxes are high-value recyclables. If you receive gifts by post this year, the cardboard boxes should be flattened and broken down, to not exceed 70cm in width and placed in the blue recycling box or in a communal bin where you live.

Litter busters

Two new road sweepers have been added to Hounslow Highways fleet, in anti-littering livery designed by local children.



Did you know?

You would need to use an artificial Christmas tree for 12 years to offset its carbon footprint instead of buying a real Christmas tree.





Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Highways, Recycling and Trading Companies said:

"This year we have seen a marked improvement in recycling rates, well done to everyone trying to make a difference.

"While it's great we are recycling more, our waste in general has increased significantly this year as we spend more time at home. It is vital that we all work towards reducing our waste especially at Christmas. If you have any ideas about how the council could help you recycle more, let me know.
