Dear Resident

At the Borough Council meeting on 1 March 2022, I announced that I will not be standing in the upcoming local elections on the 5 May 2022. This is because I have recently been diagnosed with cancer – and as you can imagine this has been a shock to me and my family and friends. That said, I have had excellent care and support from our brilliant NHS. My treatment and recovery will take a few months so I am sure you will understand my reason for standing down.

It has been an absolute honour and privilege to have been able to serve you as Leader of the Council since 2014. I would like to thank you all for the support you have given to the Council in whichever way, and to me personally.

We live in a wonderful borough, an exciting, forward looking, and dynamic place. All our schools are now 'good' or 'outstanding'. 21 of our parks now have green flags. We will have built 1,300 new council homes since 2018. Everyone has worked tirelessly together to fight the pandemic from individual residents, community groups, and businesses who all came together to protect the most vulnerable in our communities during the most serious health emergency this country has faced in generations.

I am particularly grateful to all those who have worked in the emergency services, council staff, our local partners like the Metropolitan Police Service, the NHS, the voluntary sector and others who worked throughout the pandemic on the frontline. From lorry drivers to supermarket staff, teachers and support staff, to waste and recycling operatives and our street cleaners - and many more - you know who you are, and I thank you from the bottom of my heart for what you have done for the borough.

I am extremely proud of the achievements of this Council. This culminated in the London Borough of Hounslow being awarded the coveted 'Council of the Year' in October last year by the Local Government Chronicle. This is an annual national award which Hounslow Council has never won before. I believe this is an outstanding achievement, as we were not only judged on our response to managing the COVID pandemic but on our work in, and with the communities we serve, and for our plans for the future. It truly is a recognition of the One Hounslow spirit we've

Since 2018, we have created over 4,000 new apprenticeships and training opportunities, invested new money in our roads and pavements and distributed over £70million worth of grants to local organisations and businesses. We have

provided over 9,500 children with free school meals throughout the pandemic and will continue

to do so. We set up the shop local voucher scheme with a £20 voucher given to every household which resulted in £1million going to local shops into our high streets and shopping parades.

I've highlighted just some of the things we've been doing but we have also continued to do our day job - keeping our communities safe, investing in extra police, looking after our most vulnerable, particularly the young and the frail. We've ensured our waste and recycling rates improved, and made it easier and safer for our residents to walk and cycle. As well as investing in our parks, libraries, leisure centres and open spaces, we've brought those services back into the management of the Council and ensured all staff now receive the London Living Wage.

As we look ahead, I am confident the Council is in a strong position to deliver and continue to improve the services people want and need. We will continue to create an environment that is cleaner and greener, and help people to fulfil their aspirations by providing new opportunities and ensuring they have the right skills and knowledge to face the future. Our principle since the start of the pandemic has been to be a Council that is always stepping forward, and never back. We remain committed to that principle, as the very basis for delivering the fairer, greener, stronger, Hounslow that residents today and in the future deserve.

This will be my last Hounslow Matters magazine before I leave office on the 10 May 2022. Therefore, I would like to personally thank you for your support and wish you and your family all the best for the future.

### HOUNSLOW SCHOOLS RECEIVE TOP MARKS

Schools in Hounslow have received very positive reviews from regulatory inspector Ofsted.

All schools in the borough have now been rated 'Good' or 'Outstanding' by Ofsted, the regulator responsible for standards in education, children's services and skills.\*

A total of thirteen primary schools, six secondary schools and two special

education schools received the highest rating of Outstanding from inspectors.

Cllr Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Education, Children and Youth Services, said: "These reports show that our schools are helping to provide bright futures for every child in the borough.

and school staff despite the significant challenges and disruption caused by the pandemic.


"Learning in a safe and happy environment is critical to ensure our children reach their full potential and achieve their academic and vocational goals."

Lorna Bruce, Hounslow Town Primary School Deputy Headteacher, said: "This Ofsted report is a great result for the school and the children, we want ambition for every single one of them. The pandemic was tough on our pupils, even holding a pencil posed difficulties for many when we returned to the classroom. We had to quickly identify the areas they were struggling with because of the pandemic and put things into place to fix them while monitoring the impact and ensuring they are benefiting our children."

### FUNDING CAN HELP RESIDENTS WITH RISING ENERGY BILLS

Hounslow residents could be entitled to energy-saving measures to help with the rising costs of heating bills.

The Council is promoting two schemes that could help eligible households to cut their bills and reduce carbon emissions in our borough.

Better Homes Better Health supports vulnerable residents, including people aged over 65, low-income families with children under five and people with long-term health conditions. You could be entitled to a home energy assessment, advice on energy saving and bills and support with claiming the Warm Homes discount. The scheme can also provide free, small energy-saving measures such as draught-proofing and energy monitors.

The Green Homes Grant Scheme can also provide support for homeowners and people in rented accommodation on low incomes, whose homes have a reduced energy rating.

Under this scheme, residents could be entitled to up to £10,000 worth of government funding to pay for energy-efficient measures like wall, loft and hot water tank insulation.

The scheme also offers support with fitting environmentally friendly technology such as heat pumps and energy-efficient boilers.



Hounslow Council's Cabinet Member for Communities and Climate Emergency, Cllr Katherine Dunne, said: "We all need to use our heating

systems more over the winter months. These schemes offer vital improvements which could benefit people across Hounslow who are on low income and find it hard to heat their homes.

"Improving the energy efficiency of our homes will also help to reduce carbon emissions in our borough which supports our ambitions around climate change."



### Can you transform a child's life?



Foster Care Fortnight, an annual campaign to raise the profile of fostering, and show how foster care can transform the lives of children and young people, is set to take place between 9-22 May.

Hounslow needs short- and long-term foster carers from all walks of life to help children and young people in need of care across the borough. Short term foster carers provide a home for children who are temporarily unable, for a range of reasons, to live with their own family. Long-term foster carers provide a home to children up until age 18, and possibly beyond, embracing them as part of their family.

Children of all ages need foster care, from babies to teenagers. Some may be young parents, some may be children on their own, and some will be siblings who need to stay together.

We are looking for foster carers from borough and surrounding areas. Advice and support is always available to carers, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, with a generous weekly allowance paid to meet the needs of each child placed.

### HOUNSLOW GETS EXTRA BOBBIES ON THE BEAT

The West Area Borough Command Unit (BCU) has launched the Hounslow Town Centre Team. Consisting of twenty-four additional police officers – one Inspector, two Sergeants and twenty-one PC's - the team will work with local communities and businesses to deal with their concerns.

Inspector Javid Khan, in charge of the new team, was joined by Commander Alison Heydari and Superintendent Anthony Bennett in the town centre for the launch and the officers, alongside Hounslow Council's Enforcement Officers, set about getting to know the local community and discuss any concerns they may have.

Chief Superintendent Sean Wilson, West Area Commander said:

"Hounslow is one of my key policing priorities; the new Town Centre Team will provide a much needed resource to tackle the many issues which have concerned our residents and businesses.

"This team will work closely with our partners in the London Borough of Hounslow to ensure we provide the best possible service. I look forward to us working together."

Hounslow Council Leader, Cllr Steve Curran, Deputy Leader Cllr Lily Bath and Cllr Katherine Dunne jointly commented: "The deployment of these additional officers to Hounslow Town Centre is part of the Met's commitment to driving down crime and improving residents' and businesses' confidence that they are doing everything they can to reduce crime and the fear of crime. Based on data and intelligence, London Borough of Hounslow and the Met have placed these extra officers in areas where additional policing is needed. At a time when many of us have felt uncertainty as we move out of the pandemic, as a Council we want to reiterate to our communities and businesses that we will continue to put measures in place to address their concerns and ensure Hounslow is a place where everyone feels safe.

"The relationship between the Council and the Met has gone from strength to strength during the pandemic with a tremendous amount of joint working, culminating in this new Police Team for Hounslow Town Centre and cements our closer working relationship for the benefit of our residents."

The new Town Centre Team is a key development in keeping Hounslow a low crime borough and a safe place to live, work, study and visit.

POTHOLE PLEDGE
Invest £2 million to fix potholes in local roads
SMASHED!

An ambitious promise to fix Hounslow's roads reached the end of its journey with the resurfacing of Osterley Avenue, the 81st street to be mended under the Council's 'Pothole Pledge' programme.

Starting with Brentford's Chestnut Avenue in 2018, more than £4 million has been invested in improving roads, with residents invited to report streets that needed attention.

The Pothole Pledge is additional to the established road maintenance programme. In the latest annual State of the City report, Hounslow received a perfect score for its road maintenance asset management for the second year running and was also found to have the lowest backlog of potholes to fix, of any London borough, for the third year in a row.

Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Highways, Recycling and Companies, said: "We know repairing potholes is important to residents and I'm really pleased to report that we actually invested double the amount originally pledged to improve our roads. Thanks to everyone who nominated roads to be improved."

# No business like green business

Hounslow Council is leading a citywide plan to give London's green economy a big boost.

London's Green Economy is currently valued at £48 billion and accounts for five per cent of the city's jobs, but an ambitious new report sets out how the Council will double the size of the city's Green Economy to £100 billion by 2030.

Entitled Building the Green Economy, the report outlines how local authorities and partners across London, will work together to stimulate green innovation and enterprise, support small businesses and help our residents gain skills to pursue new career opportunities.

The plan also maps out how traditional industry will be supported to embrace the kind of technological change that will help reduce the carbon they produce.

The Green Economy Action Plan, promises to bring the Council's ambition to life, accelerating the transition to a low carbon economy, whilst boosting jobs growth.

Hounslow Council's Cabinet Member for Communities and Climate Change, Cllr Katherine Dunne said: "When Hounslow was chosen to lead on this green economy action plan, we jumped at the chance. It is an exciting time for our borough to showcase our great work supporting the environment and share best practice across London and beyond.

### FLY-TIPPING IS CRIMINAL AND HOUNSLOW'S HAD ENOUGH

Members of the public are being asked to help Hounslow Council crack down on fly-tipping, which blights the streets of the borough and costs taxpayers an estimated £1.3 million a year to clear up.

As part of its 'Let's Scrap Fly-Tipping' campaign, Hounslow will be publishing stills from CCTV footage on its website picturing individuals suspected of illegally dumping waste on the borough's streets. The Council has a wide network of CCTV cameras across the borough and is asking people living and working in Hounslow to come forward if they can help identify the individuals pictured, so appropriate enforcement action can be taken.

During 2021, there were 24,210 fly-tipping incidents on the public highway reported to Hounslow Highways, which manages the borough's highways on behalf of the council. This included 63,343 bags of rubbish dumped on our streets. These fly-tips are estimated to have cost Hounslow tax-payers more than £1.3 million to remove. During this time, we also received an additional 1,887 reports of fly-tipping on private land in the borough.

In 2021, Hounslow Council issued 699 Fixed Penalty Notices for fly tipping on both public and private land, and also issued 6,281 FPNs for littering offences. The Council has even put in place a dedicated enforcement team, the Special Waste Service, to target fly-tipping hotspots throughout Hounslow.

Cllr Steve Curran, Leader of Hounslow Council, said: "There is absolutely no need for anyone fly-tipping in Hounslow and I would urge everyone to play their part in helping us to tackle the illegal dumping of waste. It not only makes our borough look a mess but also wastes money clearing it up. This public money would be better spent on adults' and children's care and on other essential services."

Cllr Guy Lambert, Hounslow Council Cabinet Member for Highways, Recycling and Companies said: "There is no excuse for fly-tipping - it's a crime, and we won't hesitate to crack down hard on anyone caught illegally dumping waste in Hounslow. The standard fine is £400, but if you end up in court the penalties are much heavier. We offer so many ways for people to get rid of waste properly and I would call on all residents to do their part to help us keep our streets clean and tidy, and also come forward if they can help us identify anyone pictured in the CCTV images we will be publishing."

### CLEANER, GREENER, **HEALTHIER HOUNSLOW**

Hounslow residents are leading the way in creating a more environmentally-friendly borough, thanks to the recent introduction of three Community Reference Groups (CRG).

Bringing together likeminded community members, the groups look at different environmental issues.

The Cleaner Greener CRG will concentrate on parks and open spaces, whilst the Climate and Clean Air CRG will consider improvements on air quality, supporting the goal of Hounslow becoming a net-zero carbon-producing

Alison Lakey is a member of the Climate and Clean Air CRG. A business manager at Hounslow's Belmont Primary School, Alison has been using her time with the CRG to support the school's environmentally-friendly aspirations.

"Our school is dedicated to helping to make Hounslow a cleaner, greener and healthier place to live. Being part of the Community Reference Group means that we are at the heart of the conversation about these issues in the borough."



### **CARBON-FREE FUTURE**

A multi-million pound plan to make Hounslow's schools the greenest in London is starting to take shape after the Council was awarded more than £7.6m to introduce carboncutting and energy-saving measures across 33 of the borough's primary schools.

The work, funded through the Department of Business, Energy and Industry Strategy (BEIS), includes fitting air source heat pumps to replace

gas boilers for heating, solar panels to generate renewable power, as well as LED lighting and insulation to conserve energy use.

Research has shown that the borough's schools account for 70 per cent of the authority's carbon emissions.

The new measures will remove 1,264 tonnes of carbon dioxide, save more than six million kilowatts of electricity and generate £254,000 worth of savings for the borough each year.

Hounslow Council's Cabinet Member for Communities and Climate Change, Cllr Katherine Dunne, said: "Tackling climate change in Hounslow is vital. We're determined to get a head start as we work to reach net-zero emissions."

Where a School Street scheme is in place, traffic is temporarily restricted on the school street and on nearby roads and enforced by cameras which recognise number plates. Signage is clearly in place and pedestrians, cyclists and residents' vehicles are not restricted.

Headteacher at Springwell School, Heston, Mrs Kamm Grewal said: "Springwell has had a School Street since September 2020 and it's done wonders in significantly reducing the traffic on Speart Lane. Message from Kelly O'Neill, Hounslow Director of **Public Health** 

We all know that looking after our health and wellbeing is incredibly important, however we often do not always make it our priority. As we move towards Spring now is the time take action to get up to date with any health appointments that you have missed whilst our NHS services have been focused on tackling winter health emergencies and the response to another Covid-19 wave.

As Covid measures for many of us have been lifted, and we can start to feel that we can move back to our lives without restriction I must advise caution; many new Covid infections are occurring every day, and our borough rates, along with many outer London boroughs, remain high. Risk of serious illness is reduced by being vaccinated, however there are 3 people in every 10 who live in our borough who are not vaccinated at all, and some of those people continue to be at risk of serious illness if infected. Our NHS is also busy,

with usual demands and Covid. One outcome of Covid-19 must be that we pay closer attention to being as healthy as we can be, to act on symptoms of illness, and to start to adopt behaviours that contribute to a healthier lifestyle.



Hounslow borough has lovely green spaces, and we can all be more active every day, for example reaping the health and wellbeing benefits of a daily brisk walk. Add to this a regular sleep pattern, thinking about what we eat, cutting out unhealthy foods and reducing our intake of alcohol and sugary drinks and we can make a real difference to our health and how we feel.

If you need information, advice and support, there are services to help - like One You Hounslow and the easy to use app that rewards you for a healthy behaviour, Better Points. Also make time to visit

the dentist, for yourself and if you are a parent, for your children - too many of us have missed these appointments.

One result of the pandemic has been that really important cancer screening appointments have been missed by those eligible. Screening can detect cancer at an early stage when it is more treatable; delays mean that cancer can be detected late. sometimes too late



There is also the NHS Health Check programme for residents aged between 40-75 years old. This brilliant programme helps identify a range of health conditions that – if caught early - can reduce long term ill-health. If you've missed any of these sorts of appointments contact your GP or the screening service as soon as possible. Acting early will benefit you, your family and the NHS.



For those people who are struggling with their mental health and are experiencing fear, sadness, anxiety, anger or physical symptoms such as headaches, difficulty sleeping and changes in eating patterns please don't be alone with these feelings. If you feel you need help and support visit www.goodthinking.uk, NHS approved Digital Wellbeing Platform for London and the national Every Mind Matters - NHS (www.nhs.uk) programme to learn more, and be directed to services that will help you.

There are many other actions we can take and should take, and I know we can have busy lives dealing with other pressing life issues that we are facing. All the same, our health is our biggest life asset, and we must protect it, so start small with these actions to get back on track.

# A responsible budget for a thriving Hounslow



One of the most important tasks for the Council is to set a responsible budget for the year ahead. This is particularly difficult in an environment where inflation is high and the cost of living is going up across the board. We know these are challenging times for our residents.

On your behalf, we are always stepping forward for Hounslow and we are very proud of what we have done in recent years to deliver on all of our pledges and make this a fairer, greener and stronger borough.

Now we want to build on those successes to ensure our communities can continue to thrive when we emerge from the pandemic.

In order to deliver on our priorities and meet growing demand in areas like social care, we have decided this year to raise our portion of the Council Tax bill by **2.99%**.

On average our increase works out at about **77p** per week – and we have considered this carefully, knowing every penny counts at the moment for hard pressed families. # Spending priorities for the year ahead

### **Vulnerable** children

The Council will be investing in additional social workers to work closely with staff in schools and community partners to help children who are potentially at risk and support families to protect children through early intervention.

There will also be a £2.7million investment to build a new children's home in Feltham to improve facilities

for looked after children.

### Community **Solutions**

The Council will invest £850,000 in its innovative Community Solutions model, which connects residents with the right services before they are in crisis. The team knows these are challenging times for residents facing multiple pressures and through early interventions it can better able to address residents' needs before they escalate.

### Adult social care

The borough has seen a huge rise in demand for adult social care, so the Council Tax rise includes a 1% precept which will go towards these rising costs.

### **Special educational** needs

There is increasing demand for services for children with additional needs and the Council wants to provide highquality services to give these young people the best start in life.

### Climate and environment

As part of its commitment to reach net zero, the Council will invest in green enterprise and innovation, support the workforce to develop green skills and create low carbon neighbourhoods.

An additional £5.4m investment will help deliver major improvements to the borough's parks, plus £1.5m over three years for community-led transport schemes.

### **Community** safety

The Council has boosted its work to make our communities safer with a new team of officers working alongside the community, the police and other partners, to tackle issues. It will also continue to fund extra police to increase the visible presence on the borough's streets.



### **FRESH WAVE OF COVID-19 GRANTS**

In response to the Omicron variant business owners in Hounslow were provided with access to two new COVID-19 grants. The government's 'Omicron Hospitality and Leisure grant' offered one-off grants of up to £6,000 for eligible businesses, including pubs, restaurants, cafes, cinemas, museums, or soft play centres.

The Council then made available a second limited grant in February, funded by the Government's COVID-19 Additional Restrictions Grant. Businesses not eligible for the Omicron grant could access a one-off payment of £2.000 on a first come. first served basis.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Cabinet Member for Finance and Corporate Services, said: "The impact of rising COVID-19 cases on businesses – particularly in the hospitality and leisure sector – was plain to see during the festive period. What is supposed to be a time of celebration and joy was made significantly more difficult as the Omicron variant spread across the capital.

"Making these grants available to businesses in need was really important for us. They are a life line for many businesses and play a huge role in protecting local jobs."

# GREEN DEVELOPMENTS

After declaring a climate emergency in summer 2019, we're working hard to reduce direct carbon emissions across Hounslow. Zero-carbon housing is essential to reducing our carbon footprint, especially as we continue to deliver new homes at pace. So far, we have secured 1,200 new homes against our commitment to build 1,000 new Council homes by 2022.

The development of five zero-carbon homes at Orchard Road in Brentford will be used as a blue-print for all future Council developments. Starting this spring, the scheme will be car-free with triple glazed windows, a waste-water heat

recovery system, an air source heat pump to provide hot water and heating, and solar panels on the roof.

Other green schemes in the borough include Rose Gardens in Feltham and Brentford Block D, which boast 42 and 96 new council homes respectively. Homes at both developments will be completely electric with no gas boilers. Another development of 13 new homes at Frampton Road, Hounslow is also being built to zero-carbon standards, and the Clements Court scheme will offer cycle storage units to encourage tenants to cycle more.



### NEW HOMES IN BRENTFORD

One of the latest schemes to be delivered under our joint venture with Lampton Property360 and EcoWorld London, the development offers two-, three- and four-bedroom homes at Council rent. The development benefits from cycle parking spaces, a play area, landscaped gardens and a private open space for residents. The homes also feature electric vehicle chargers and solar panels, with some houses including a nesting box for birds and bats.

### ARE YOU LOOKING TO SELL YOUR HOUNSLOW HOME?

We have recently agreed a deal with the Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, to help us and our housing company Lampton Investment 360 purchase 555 homes across the borough.

Hounslow will receive £38.7m from the Mayor's new Property Purchase Scheme, which gives London boroughs and council -owned housing companies the ability to purchase homes from the open market. This includes purchasing back former council homes that have been sold through the Government's Right to Buy programme, as well as homes in Hounslow that meet our brief. These homes will then be used to house local families who are on the housing register, homeless or threatened with homelessness.

Twenty family-sized homes will be ringfenced for Afghan nationals who have been granted leave to resettle in the UK. A further 25 low-cost, social rented homes will be allocated specifically to provide first homes for young people leaving care.

Cllr Steve Curran, said: "We've already met our target of delivering 1,000 new council homes and this funding means we can provide more council homes for those that need them."

### KEEPING IT LOCAL: BUILDING HOMES AND EMPLOYING OUR OWN



Last year there was a 168% increase in the number of people without work in Hounslow. We are not only committed to building new council homes, but also investing in local people. We work in partnership with developers to create job opportunities and boost our postpandemic recovery and growth. This includes:

- Creating apprenticeships and hiring young people to teach them construction skills.
- Employing 15 Hounslow residents to work on our new-build sites.
- Organising workshops in schools to educate young people.
- Providing work experience so young people can gain the skills needed to enter the world of work.

As part of the Kickstart scheme, developer Wates is offering work opportunities for local people. One apprentice, Lily Powell, enjoyed a six-month paid contract at the Burlington Close housing site as office support, and now has a full-time permanent role with the company.

Lily said: "I first became interested in construction after hearing about the industry from my uncle who worked at Wates. I knew nothing about construction, but I'm keen to learn more and progress in my role. I'm happy to say I have now been offered a permanent placement at Wates. I love my job; the people, the atmosphere and learning more about construction."




