A tribute to the Queen

With a reign spanning seventy years, our late Queen's enduring service to our nation was admired and respected across the country, across races and classes and around the world.

It was therefore unsurprising to feel the power of silent tribute in Westminster Hall as people from every walk of life came together in reverence of our late Queen. I was struck by my own overwhelming sense of gratitude, and I know those watching from afar on the livestream were also deeply moved by the sheer outpouring of love and respect apparent in the silent gestures and expressions and often tears of people of all ages, some of whom had queued throughout the day and the night.

At a local level, Her Majesty touched hearts too - visiting Gunnersbury Park and Museum in 2002 as part of her Golden Jubilee Tour, to open the Sri Guru Singh Sabha Gurdwara's education wing in 2004 and the University of West London's Brentford campus in 2009.

I was honoured to join several commemorative events celebrating our late Queen's life of dedicated service and give thanks alongside communities across the borough, including the dedicated multi-faith event at the Gurdwara and evening service at the Holy Trinity Church – the day before her funeral. Joined by

a number of Hounslow Cllrs and the MP Ruth Cadbury we were able to collectively recognise and pay tribute to her late Majesty's embodiment of unity and respect for all cultures. It seemed only right that in Hounslow, one of London's most diverse boroughs, we did so.

Hounslow also had the great honour of having the Queen's cortege pass through our borough after the service at Westminster Abbey. Thousands of residents lined the route along the A4 to pay their respects. For me was a perfect example of Hounslow's affinity to our late Queen. I would like to personally thank all the council workers, our partners in the police, and the military who were involved in ensuring that Hounslow played its part in the funeral procession.

Mrs Sukvinder Dhanjal – who met the Queen at the Gurdwara in 2004 – said something that really resonated with me - she described the Queen as the 'mother of the nation' and I would certainly endorse that opinion.

As we now enter a new chapter in our history, I know the borough feels a real sense of pride in welcoming our new King, His Majesty King Charles the Third. We wish him the best of health and a long reign.

Hounslow was alive with the sound of music this summer.

Streets echoed to the rhythm of the dance.
Museums, parks, historic houses and art centres pulsed with performance and creativity.

This was our Summer of Culture. It was your celebration of life in our borough.

Between June and August, Hounslow Council worked with community groups and partners to stage and support more than 180 events.

There were headline acts from international performers alongside local people who all came together to share and participate in culture.

The packed programme saw around 125,000 people turn up to be entertained and inspired through

activity including storytelling, sport and even the chance to sit back and watch a big screen movie in the open air on a hot summer's night.

The idea behind Summer of Culture was to reflect the rich cultural diversity, heritage and creativity that Hounslow has to offer.

Many festival events were free, and the Council made it possible for everyone to take part by offering a series of grants to borough-based community groups.

In partnership with Watermans
Centre and Creative People, and the
Places programme, we delivered a
spectacular outdoor programme.
Ranging from a fiery performance
from 'Amor' – delivering an explosive
mix of dance, drama and fire on Bell
Square, to the silent-era stylings of
Polish slapstick comedy production
'Aliens from Mons' which brought
much needed laughter to the
proceedings.

Showcasing the culture of our diverse South Asian community over the course of one great festival day, community organisation/performance company Ahnad brought together performers from across London for a feast of colours, sights and sounds.

Summer of Culture with Deblozay – this French/Haitian performance was the festival finale and saw a spectacular parade through the streets of Hounslow.

Other festival events, such as the Festival of Storytelling, brought all ages together to experience stories in their widest form right across the borough.

Films on the Green brought some of the biggest crowds to the event, with hundreds of people turning out for screenings of Bend it Like Beckham, Encanto and Aladdin.



Cllr Shivraj Grewal, Cabinet Member for Communities and Equalities, said:

"Hounslow's Summer of Culture was a real high point in our borough's calendar. This was a celebration of our communities and our creativity on a scale that we have not seen before. Thank you to all our partners and event organisers, and everyone who took part, delivered their performances or turned up to support the many amazing shows – you did our borough proud.

The Council provided the opportunity of grant funding, information and guidance to those who wanted to get involved. The aim was to create a legacy for the Summer of Culture that goes far beyond the three months of the main celebrations.



Gators Basketball Club HOOPLA FOR HOUNSLOW

For the Chiswick Gators Basketball Club. the Summer of Culture was a chance to bring their beloved sport to the community. It also gave the club the chance to pay a fitting tribute to club coach and founder member Ali Abucar Ali, who tragically lost his life in a stabbing incident in Brentford last November.

Club coach Mike Kwentoh and parent volunteer helper Kate Astley jumped at the chance to apply for funding to put on the club's own basketball festival.

"We wanted to do something to introduce young people to the sport and to celebrate the life of coach Ali," said Mike. "Our idea was to run a full day of taster sessions and a tournament. We also wanted to make it a fun day by having music and other activities.

"The application process for funding was straightforward and there was plenty of help available. We felt fortunate to be given a grant. We were also quite nervous because this was the first time we had done this sort of thing."

The event was at Lampton School and saw more than 100 young people take to the basketball court.

It was so successful that now the Gators want to make it an annual affair.

"It was a real learning experience for us," Kate said. "And one that has made us realise what is possible. We want to use it to help our club grow and to provide more events in the future."

It has also spurred on the club with plans for the Coach Ali Foundation - a newly registered charity providing young people with training and educational opportunities in all aspects of the sport.

"Being part of the Summer of Culture was a significant moment for the club." said Mike. "It was great to be part of such a big celebration. It has shown us what is possible when we all work together."

Mohinder is a founder member of the Trinjan Women's Social and Community Group. It began life women in our borough. Club

was the chance for the group to celebrate its success and to get

When Mohinder Dosanjh discovered that her group could get involved with Hounslow's Summer of Culture, it was something to make a real song and dance about.

The group received a grant of £965 to stage two events - a music day to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and a sports day at Thistleworth Tennis Club in Isleworth.

> "It was great news when we discovered that we had been successful in getting a grant to stage these events," said Mohinder. "We have regular meetings, but we had never attempted anything on this scale. It was really exciting for us.

"We wanted to provide the

community with chances to get together and celebrate. We also wanted to raise the profile of the group and encourage more women to ioin."

The music day saw more than 100 people turn up to enjoy a selection of music and activities such as bouncing along to a Bhangra keep fit session. The sports day saw a further 40 people enjoy activities such as yoga and table tennis.

"This was an amazing journey for us," said Mohinder, "It was great to be part of Summer of Culture. It has given us the confidence to stage more events like this in the future and to continue to bring our community together."

Cycleway 9 - Bike to the future

Plans to make travelling by bicycle through Chiswick and Brentford easier and safer are on the right track.

Working in partnership with Transport for London, Hounslow Council is ensuring the bike-friendly Cycleway 9 project supports two-wheeled transport across West London, to make it safer and more accessible by creating dedicated lanes in some of the busiest areas.



The next phase of construction work on Cycleway 9 is now underway. Work is taking place on Chiswick High Road from the junction with Chiswick Lane up to Heathfield Terrace

The work includes improvements like new entry points for cyclists, new bus shelters and parking spaces, road resurfacing and a new zebra crossing on Chiswick High Road.

Cllr Katherine Dunne, Hounslow Council's Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport Strategy, said: "The Council and its partners have consulted widely with residents and other stakeholders on this scheme and have kept them informed of progress.

"We can see Cycleway 9 taking shape across West London as a major initiative to encourage more people to cycle to work and for pleasure.

"The Council is committed to tackling the challenges we all face through climate change. We also want to make Hounslow a cleaner, greener and healthier place for everyone who lives and works here. Projects such as Cycleway 9 are part of this plan."

RECYCLING EFFORTS RECOGNISED WITH INDUSTRY AWARDS SHORTLISTING

Hounslow Council has been shortlisted in the National Recycling Awards category for best Food Waste Initiative, with its Flats Communal Waste Service catching the eye of the judges. It is one of only six organisations to be shortlisted for the coveted award.

Hounslow became the first London borough to introduce an innovative fully operational state-of-the-art bin wash (similar to a large-scale dishwasher). A full bin is collected from each site weekly and replaced with a clean bin, solving the issue of dirty and/or smelly bins reported in residents' feedback.

Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Environment, Highways and Operational Services, said:

"We are of course delighted to be recognised for our service's innovation, and for the dedication displayed to tackle the problem of food waste. Around 32% of properties in our borough are flats, so the roll out of the Flats Communal Food Waste service is really making a meaningful difference to Hounslow.

The project has cut more than 5,000 kgs of carbon dioxide emissions, so we're doing our bit to support the Council's green ambitions, too.


"The Council can't afford to see food waste quite literally wasted, and residents increasingly do not want to contribute to this either.

"People are becoming more aware of the amount of food wasted and its negative impacts on the environment, and this is leading to positive behaviour changes in terms of the reduction of food waste.

"There's a clear desire from our residents across all property types to recycle more, and it's our duty to provide ongoing accessible and innovative solutions to tackle the issues of waste."

State of Independence

Hounslow Council hosted a successful drop in event for Ukrainian refugees at Brentford Library recently with over twenty families attending. They were able to make connections with key Council services, network with other new arrivals and continue settling in the borough, knowing support is in place.

Work Hounslow and Community Solutions were two of the services in attendance along with various other Council teams. Both also played their part in helping a recent arrival in the UK, Shihab Al Balushi, who came into Hounslow House on Ukrainian Independence Day to share his story.



Originally form Oman, Shahib moved to Ukraine over six years ago, finding love and settling in Ivano Frankivsk in the west of the country to raise a family. And then the war started.

The family initially fled to Poland and then decided on the UK as the best destination for their future.

However, upon arrival, financial difficulties followed and at one stage Shahib and his family had to sleep in their car. But through word of mouth, he found himself talking to a member of the Community Solutions team who immediately assisted with applying for a household support grant, the opening of a bank account and childcare.

The partnership element of Community Solutions also led to a connection with both Job Centre Plus who helped the family access available benefits, and Work Hounslow, who managed to accelerate the visa application and arrange an interview with a hotel in Heathrow.

With employment eventually secured the family found accommodation through a specialist Ukrainian refugee charity and are all now settled in Twickenham.



NEW ROUTE INTO DUKES MEADOWS MOVES ONE STEP CLOSER

A stunning new footbridge for pedestrians and cyclists along the Thames Path will soon provide an uninterrupted journey through one of Hounslow's most scenic areas.

The Dukes Meadows Footbridge project has reached a major milestone with the installation of the 30m long central span.

Until now, visitors enjoying this idyllic stretch of the 185-mile Thames Path have had to take a long detour to get around the Grade II listed Barnes Railway Bridge.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, said: "This imaginative project opens up one of our borough's premier spaces to be enjoyed by even more visitors. This major construction milestone is testament to years of close partnership working between Hounslow Council, our construction partner and the local community - under the leadership of my predecessor Steve Curran. We believe it will attract many more visitors to this amazing green space and will provide residents with a new walking and cycling route."

Hounslow Council has been working closely with construction partner Knights Brown on delivering the complex project. The footbridge is due for completion later this year.

Ride on time

Hold onto your handlebars and press down on your pedals because it's time to hit the saddle as Hounslow Council continues to support people who want to get to grips with cycling as a great way to get around.

There are several schemes that the Council supports which can help you to get moving as choosing the bike over the car is great for the environment, it's brilliant exercise and can be beneficial for your mental health.

The borough hosts regular weekly training sessions for children, adults and groups,

aimed at making you safe and secure when riding. These sessions are free but must be booked in advance.

Our regular Dr Bike sessions offer free cycle check-ups by qualified mechanics. The team can also make minor repairs and adjustments.

The Try Before You Bike scheme gives you the opportunity to hire a bike for a small monthly fee. And if you want to buy the bike at the end of the trial, you can claim the money back. Find out more at:

£500,000 TO BENEFIT borough's partially sighted community

Hounslow Council, in partnership with the Royal National Institute of Blind People (RNIB) and the Middlesex Association for the Blind, have been awarded £500,000 from The National Lottery Community Fund to benefit Hounslow residents with sight loss.

The funding is over three years and will deliver emotional and practical advice, guidance, and support to 2,500 people per year. It will also provide two Eye Care Liaison Officers (ECLOs), who will provide

an important bridge between health and social services in addition to support and wellbeing of patients.

There will also be increased awareness through events, talks and workshops with around 100 planned over the next three year. Finally, there will be a new focus on the number of Certificates of Visual Impairment (CVI) issued in the borough - which are important for rehabilitation, mobility training and assistive devices.



Hounslow restaurants encouraged to make A COMMITMENT TO HEALTHIER CHOICES

Hounslow Council is working in partnership with local food businesses to make it easier for customers to find restaurants and takeaways serving healthier food.

Recent Public Health England data for Hounslow shows that 38.7% of children in year six and 63.2% of adults are overweight or obese. One of the biggest barriers to maintaining a healthy weight is the lack of healthy food and drink options.

The London Healthier Catering Commitment (HCC), is a voluntary scheme aimed at making simple changes to how food is prepared, cooked, and served, to reduce the amount of food that is high in fat, sugar, and salt.

The new scheme is designed to attract a network of local food businesses in the borough committed to offering their customers healthier choices when eating out, on the basis that small changes can make a big difference. That way, customers can decide where to dine, knowing that healthier options are available to them.

The first business to sign up to the scheme, Humble Thali, opened during the Covid-19 pandemic as a takeaway restaurant due to lockdown restrictions but has since opened its doors to welcome customers as a dine-in restaurant as well. Any businesses wishing to join can express their interest by email for an initial assessment.

Humble Thali owner, Abhijit Borkar, said, "We are delighted to be the first food outlet in Hounslow to sign up. It's really easy to join and the support on offer has been great to help us lead the way. We felt it was important to be part of the positive impact it will have on our customers' health allowing them to enjoy a guilt-free meal out."

Commenting on the launch of the commitment in Hounslow, Cllr Samia Chaudhary, Cabinet Member for Adults and Health Integration, said: "Staying a healthy weight can be a real challenge when there is so much unhealthy fast food available, so it is very inspiring to see food outlets playing their part. We encourage more to join the scheme to boost healthier options available throughout the borough."

Participating businesses will receive support from the Council's Public Health team to make the healthier changes and can display a certificate and window sticker to promote their participation in the scheme. They also receive a free online food safety training place in recognition of their efforts.

Reducing adult and childhood obesity is one of the Council's top health priorities and HCC will help raise awareness of the healthier options available.

Pawsome Animal Welfare Team wins multiple awards

The Council's Animal Welfare Team have been awarded the RSPCA's Pawprints gold award in two categories – the Stray Dogs service category and the Kennelled Dogs category.



Making it a hat-trick, one of our very own Animal Welfare Officers, Andy Newnham, has won the 2022 RSPCA Special Recognition award for work carried out to disrupt puppy farming during lockdown, work on animal welfare prosecutions, and efforts in building community relations and supporting animal owners.

Andy said: "This is completely unexpected, as the competition is so tough. I'm overwhelmed by the support that officers from the Met police, RSPCA inspectors and our local community animal groups gave to the nomination, and I'm honestly over the moon to receive the award. I also have my colleagues and Hounslow residents to thank for it, without whom this wouldn't have been possible."

The RSPCA Pawprints awards recognises and celebrates local authorities, housing providers, and police officers who have gone above and beyond for animals in their communities.

TARGETED FUNDING HITS THE SPOT

Support for people affected by cancer, family carers in the borough and preventing youth violence are just a few of the projects that have benefited from the most recent round of Hounslow Council's Thriving Communities Fund.



The fund is aimed at helping the voluntary and community sector (VCSE) deliver projects that benefit Hounslow communities and meet the ambitions outlined in the Council's new corporate plan. Through it, voluntary and community organisations can apply for revenue grants of up to £25,000 with a focus on:

- A Greener Hounslow by supporting community food projects and the circular economy
- A Healthier Hounslow by strengthening social connections
- A Liveable Hounslow by building resilience for Hounslow Housing tenants
- A Safer Hounslow by protecting vulnerable residents

 A Thriving Hounslow by supporting young people through employability and skills.

An additional £50,000 has also been made available through Hounslow's Borough Based Partnership to deliver projects that make Hounslow healthier.

Key priorities include children and young people's mental health, dementia, diabetes, falls suffered by elderly people, intermediate or short-term care, and population health management.

The grantees will be announced in January.

More than £70,000 was allocated in total to The Mulberry Centre who look to improve the lives of people affected by cancer, Harrow Carers, first-time beneficiaries, now branching out in Hounslow, to offer wide-ranging support for carers in the borough, and Osterley-based Our Barn who provide specialist support for family carers.

Golden Opportunity Skills and Development received £25,000 for a new project that offers early intervention work in preventing youth violence in the borough of Hounslow.

Nearly £40,000 was awarded to sport-related projects including Project Turnover, who, through rugby, seek to re-engage 12–17-year-olds back into education and away from possible exclusion and Feltham/Hounslow based London Warriors Basketball Club, who run regular community sessions in the area. Hounslow Community Rowing Trust - a first-time beneficiary - provide indoor rowing lessons to state school pupils at Brentford Leisure Centre.

Mags Davison, CEO of Project Turnover, said: "We are delighted to be supported by Hounslow Council's Thriving Communities Fund. Project Turnover aims to create positive outcomes for the UK's most vulnerable young people via an immersive programme based on proven research that sport can be used as a framework for a program of positive change for young people. We run a program that leverages sport, to cultivate resilience, motivation, and hope in students at risk of exclusion, gang involvement, drug abuse, violence, and opting out of school.

"The Thriving Communities bid has allowed us to continue supporting young people in the borough to make positive life direction changes."



Lots of people are genuinely worried about the high cost of living and an event like this can only do good. The Council's done a good job getting this together and I've been really impressed."

charity, felt the event was beneficial for residents and themselves, as advisor Kate Burling explains: "It was a wonderful experience. The most important thing for us was to meet people who need our service but also to meet other people who are working within Hounslow itself, offering other services our clients need.

"It was a great opportunity for us to see where we might be able to signpost some of our clients along to and also so they (other organisations) know a bit more about what we do so they feel confident about referring people across to us when they see a client who needs debt advice."

Also among the attendees was Cllr Shivraj Grewal, Cabinet Member for Communities and Equalities, who added: "Supporting residents with the impact of the increase in the cost of living on residents is a top priority. The Community Solutions team are out and about in the borough, up to six days a week, signposting residents to the support available – so don't wait before seeking help. The earlier you access available support the less likely you are to reach crisis."

The first of our revitalised area forums – at the Musical Museum on Brentford high street in late September, saw approximately eighty residents, local community groups and Council representatives gather in the venue's Concert Hall for a lively session on the issues important to local people.

Local residents and groups including The Mulberry Centre, Cultivate London, Men's Sheds and All Aboard Club, were dotted around the room, as attendees connected with each other, Cllrs and council officers.

An extended Q&A session and debate between the audience and Cllrs helped ensured community views and priorities were at the heart of the event.

Maurice Akin, a local postman who was attending his first forum commented: "I thought it was really good. Because I know the area so well, I was aware of



what people's concerns were and think they had merit as issues. And I think they were left feeling that the Council were going to act on their concerns."

A week later and Feltham library was the venue for the Bedfont, Feltham and Hanworth Forum. Opened by a fabulous performance from the Jean Inward School of Dance in Feltham, there was another full house discussing a range of topics from a prospective local 'youth zone', a new cricket pitch, to toilets at Faggs Road Allotments.

Among the local groups attending were Friends of Feltham Green and Creative People and Places. Attendee,

Lily Bough, a teacher at Reach Academy and campaigner for the new youth zone commented: "I'm always excited to get involved in democracy. It was lovely to see so many people from the community there, the stalls were a great idea, and the dance group was a lovely touch. It felt joyful and very community orientated."

MAYOR OF LONDON BACKS

HOUNSLOW'S CREATIVE INDUSTRIES

Hounslow has been successful in securing reaccreditation as one of the Mayor of London's Creative Enterprise Zones, which includes a £,630,000 investment.



Hounslow's zone – Creative Enterprise West, was founded in 2019 and is situated around the Great West Corridor. It focuses on championing and nurturing creative industries and skills, unlocking workspace for creative industries and supporting a network of creative businesses, which includes industry giants like Sky and the Discovery Channel and a range of smaller local creatives.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council said: "Hounslow has long been a hotbed of success for the creative industries, especially in TV and film production, with a vast mixture of large worldwide organisations, smaller businesses and start-ups producing content enjoyed across the globe. "Our zone has already provided a great boost of support to the sector and is inspiring the next generation through the educational and training opportunities."

Activities in the reaccredited zone will focus on helping Hounslow residents access employment support and training to secure jobs in the film and television sector. The new Creatively Developing Futures in Hounslow programme aims to boost employment in the 'screen' industries and upskill residents already working in creative businesses to enable them to progress further in their careers. POSITIVE CHANGE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

Helping children displaying challenging behaviours has been the key aim of the Focus30 Programme with the Brentford FC Community Sports Trust, Chiswick school and Springwest Academy.

A student from Springwest Academy student said: "Controlling and expression my emotions I wanted to have a better positive attitude towards school and certain lessons. The emotions workshop really made me think about all the different emotions I can be feeling at the same time and how to express them in a positive way which meant I wasn't getting in trouble."



Another Springwest student said: "I have improved on my silly behaviour in class, I can often get distracted by others which gets me into trouble but now I know to take myself away. I have also been able to make a new friendship group which has helped me make better decisions."

Ms D Bertin, Assistant Head Teacher, Chiswick School, said: 'We loved the fact that we could ask for bespoke sessions. The staff established good relationships with the students throughout to the extent that the boys from the first cohort still ask to see them."

This scheme is part of the support for local schools and community organisations through the Hounslow Education Partnership.

SAFETY EVERY DAY

In March 2021 we launched our Safer Communities Strategy with the aim of working across our communities to keep Hounslow a low crime borough and a safe place to live, work, study and visit.

THE THREE PRIORITIES OF THE STRATEGY ARE:

Residents are less affected by serious crime.

Young people and adults exposed to and exploited to commit crimes receive help.

Residents work together to keep Hounslow safe.

As part of delivering on our priorities for the strategy, earlier this year we launched Keeping lybridge Safe, Together, a new area-based initiative that focuses on talking to residents to find out what crimes and behaviours are concerning them, so we

can understand what the causes are. To this effect we launched a survey which residents helped design. From the survey 50% of the respondents feel fairly-safe on the estate, but we know we can do more to help make people feel safer.

An element of this approach is doing things differently and we have created international links with partners in the Netherlands to learn from the models they are using to approach community safety which we will be rolling out to other areas of the borough as well.





YOUNG PEOPLE MAP PLACES OF SAFETY

Local young people met
Cabinet members from the
council in July this year,
to present and discuss
a People and Places of
Safety map they have
produced. Hounslow Young
Facilitators are a team of 34
young people, aged 11-19,
from nine different schools
and colleges across the
borough.

The map is the culmination of a long-term project that started in November 2021 in association with Participation People.

The team explored perceptions and insights into people, and places of safety across

Hounslow. The resulting map offers a snapshot of the group's hopes and aspirations around the concept of

community safety, and how we could all work together to make Hounslow a safer place to live, work and study.

Working with a

'graphic recorder', the map highlights community strengths, and existing community safety projects employed by Hounslow Council. radicalisation, and grooming to further inform their work.

Jess, 18, said: "I know this map will help young people think about what to do and who to go to if they want a place of safety. I'm really proud of our work."

Vanessa, 15 said: "It was so great to hear where other young people felt safe and didn't feel safe. I didn't realise how big Hounslow was and all the things that are going on for the community."





Hounslow students receiving their A-Level results recorded a collective pass rate of 98.3%, while GCSE results showed that 77.4% of pupils achieved a grade 4 or better in Maths and English, outperforming the national average of 71.4%. Results across all subjects saw improvements on pre-pandemic results, with significant boosts in Maths and English attainment.

Result day celebrations were not just limited to young people in the borough. Adult learners also undertook GCSE examinations with Hounslow's Adult and Community Education Service – which provides a range of accessible learning opportunities for adults in Hounslow. The adult learners recorded a 100% pass rate in both English and Maths GCSEs.

Mr Stephen Davis, Head Teacher of Lampton School said:

"We are immensely proud of all our students who have received their GCSE results. The last few years have been tough for everyone – let alone young people preparing for their important examinations – but their hard work has been rewarded.

"Every teacher, staff member, parent and carer has also played a pivotal role in preparing the students for their GCSEs and ensuring they were successful."

Mr Mike Rose, Deputy Head of the Heathland School, said:

"We are all so proud of our students receiving their A Level results. They worked incredibly hard, engaging with their teachers, and providing commitment and support to one another along the way.

"They all have exciting futures ahead of them as they embark on university courses, apprenticeships or enter the world of work. We wish them the very best of luck and hope that they take with them some fond memories of their time at secondary school."

Cllr Lily Bath, Cabinet Member for Children, Learning and Employment, said:

"The time young people spend in school is such a formative part of their lives and I'm proud that Hounslow – where every school is rated 'Outstanding' or 'Good' by Ofsted – is equipping young people with the tools to succeed. The future is bright for Hounslow.

"The success of our adult learners showcases that it's never too late to sit your GCSE's and gain vital qualifications that will help you progress in your career. We have a vast range of flexible courses for adults, and I hope other residents in the borough will be inspired to sign up and realise their full potential."

THE UNSUNG

HEROES OF THE COUNCIL

Andrea Tidy, Estates Services Manager at Hounslow Council, explains why caretakers are such an important part of the Council's work.

"Our caretakers are extremely resilient," Andrea explains. "No day is the same and they often have to deal with a number of reactive issues."

During the pandemic, caretakers were the only frontline staff interacting with residents - face to face - within housing services.

"I remember talking to an elderly woman who was so frightened by the pandemic," Andrea says. "When she saw one of our caretakers still carrying out his daily duties she felt reassured and realised everything was going to be ok."

Along with being a reassuring presence during the pandemic, one of the Caretaking Team Leaders, Tina Memory, was recently recognised for her continued delivery of the British Institute of Cleaning Sciences cleaning training, which led to her winning an award for BIC's Assessor

of the Year.

"Previously, I think the caretaking service has often been perceived as a 'Cinderella service'. Post pandemic, we really have a powerful voice. Our caretakers have one of the strongest, and closest, relationship with our residents – it is important they play an important role in ensuring estate pride."

And estate pride is the cornerstone of Hounslow Council's housing priorities over the next four years. The Council have pledged a £300 million investment in council estates and wants to improve the ways it engages with residents.

Cllr Sue Sampson, Cabinet Member for Housing Management and Homelessness, believes caretakers play an integral role on the borough's estates – having lived on the Worple Road Estate for most of her life.

"They often go about their daily work without complaint or any need for recognition for their tireless work," she says.

"They truly are the unsung heroes of our Council and are the bedrock of the communities they serve."







A PLACE TO CALL HOME

Supported housing for residents with learning disabilities and/or autism

The Two Bridges housing development based in Feltham was opened in August 2022 by Leader of Hounslow Council, Cllr Shantanu Rajawat. At the event, Asim, one of the residents, proudly showed around the self-contained flats and some of the residents shared how they felt about living there.

Leo Maloney, Two Bridges resident, said:

"Before this, my life was not great, and I did not feel like my future mattered. Since moving in here, I have met a lot of new people and had opportunities to change my life for the better.

"I made a lot of self-destructive decisions in the past. Now, my habits have changed, and my mental state is better. It has been a life-changing moment for me and for the first time in my life I believe I have a future to look forward to."

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, said:

"As part of our ambitions for Hounslow, we want to ensure people with learning disabilities or autism have the right support and access to our services while leading rewarding and fulfilling lives in a place they can call home.

"As a Council, we are achieving more through working in partnership and collaborating with our local communities. I would like to thank our partners as well as our residents and their carers who have all come together to help make this project possible."

Dimensions, a not-for-profit organisation supporting people with learning disabilities and/or autism, is providing 24-hour support to the residents which includes a management team and senior behavioural practitioners providing care tailored to the individual's need.



JOIN OUR BOROUGHWIDE FLOWER IN BLOOM PROJECT

Following the success of the Feltham in Bloom project, residents on other estates are being encouraged to replicate the project in their communities.

Established in 2019, Feltham in Bloom aimed to clean, green and beautify the Feltham, Bedfont and Hanworth area. The 1,750 strong Facebook group has won awards in two 'London in Bloom' bids. Feltham in Bloom has been actively boosting the growing and sharing of all kinds of plants over the past three years. During Covid, plants were being given away regularly. They have also worked to encourage the growing of flowers fruits and veggies in three local schools.

Cllr Sue Sampson, Cabinet Member for Housing Management and Homelessness, said: "I was really inspired by the Feltham in Bloom project: it is an exemplary case of residents transforming the spaces and places that matter to them. We are committed to making our borough greener and developing 'estate pride' across all our estates."


FOOD WASTE RECYCLING RATES

A project aimed at increasing food waste recycling rates in Hounslow is proving to have all the ingredients for success.

Having set an ambitious target in early 2020 of providing a food-waste collection service to 24,000 flats by the end of 2022, Hounslow Council is well on track to achieve and even exceed its goal.

More than 17,000 households across 137 sites have benefited from the scheme, with savings of more than £54,000 as of early September.

The Council's recycling team and its partners have engaged with residents throughout the project, playing an active role in the programme by providing ideas to improve the service throughout the roll out.



Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Environment, Highways and Operational Services, said: "There is an appetite among our residents to recycle more food waste than ever before.

"Our aim is to provide a food waste recycling service to all households in the borough, and providing a service to purpose-built flats is a significant step in achieving this objective. By participating you will be helping to reduce waste, cut costs, and protect the environment."



It's a simple idea that is helping precious trees across Hounslow thrive and grow.

The borough's interactive website Hounslow Greentalk encourages residents to get involved with its Adopt a Tree campaign. Residents can simply sign up to the website and then take on a public tree close to home. A little bit of water and some TLC can make all the difference to these planet-saving trees.

And in one remarkable example, the Adopt a Tree initiative is helping a young girl from Isleworth carry on an amazing family tradition.

Fourteen-year-old Kea has an awareness about the fragile nature of our environment, and like many young people her age, she wants to preserve it. She believes in safeguarding the best of nature for generations to come and is fully aware of the science behind the need to support trees, and how it feeds into the Climate Emergency Hounslow Council declared in 2019.

By giving some of her time, she is supporting an important cause. She helps to care for a street tree and in doing so, she's helped to preserve her own family's heritage. "My grandfather when he was younger, would plant crops and grow food," she said. "He would learn from a young age how to cultivate land to produce the best crops, and how to germinate seeds and look after the bees and insects so they would pollinate his flowers and crops."

There are more than 123,000 trees in Hounslow. The Council and its partners believe every single tree in this impressive green canopy is special, and it's clear that the people of the borough do to.

She further added: "For my grandfather, I have adopted a tree within my local community near his house," she said. "It's newly planted, and I hope to look after it so it can provide oxygen and help clean our air. It will also support wildlife, something that is important to my grandfather and myself."

Kea's message to anyone who cares for the environment in Hounslow is a simple one: "Get involved."



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
