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Dear Resident,

As a Council, each Spring we must ensure we have the finances in place to deliver all our vital services and priorities for the year ahead. As you can imagine setting the budget has been particularly difficult this time around because of soaring inflation and rising demand, which is presenting a real challenge for us.

We know residents are struggling too, especially those on lower incomes, which is why we have again put in place one of the most generous Council Tax Support Schemes in London. Over the Winter we have also provided a comprehensive package of support for those struggling with the rising cost of living, and we remain committed to continuing to look after those who need our help most.

I am pleased to say that because we have managed our finances effectively, we have again been able to set a balanced and responsible budget, which will allow us to deliver on the things that really make a difference in our communities. You can find out more in our budget briefing on pages 15 – 18.

One such issue that sadly continues to impact communities across London is violence against women and girls. We are determined to tackle harmful attitudes towards women and are working with local voluntary organisations to support those who have experienced abuse. Several of those partners joined us this month to celebrate International Women's

Day with a special event where people could hear more about the work happening locally to champion issues affecting women.

Indeed, Hounslow's voluntary sector continues to be at the very heart of our work. I am delighted, therefore, that we have been able to award more than £270,000 in grants to local charities and voluntary groups which provide all kinds of services and activities, from services for carers and employment support for young people, to music and cultural projects.

On the subject of volunteering, our fantastic project to restore and reopen the wonderful Boston Manor House would have been impossible without our dedicated team of volunteers. Last month I was incredibly privileged to show Her Majesty the Queen Consort around the 400-year-old property and it was a most fitting location for a royal visit, as volunteering is the official theme for the King's Coronation in May.

Boston Manor House is set within a beautiful park, which itself has benefitted from significant investment over the last year. It's part of our commitment to ensuring that Hounslow has some of the best parks in London and as we come into the warmer months, I do hope you'll join me in enjoying our lovely green spaces.

Her Majesty The Queen Consort visited Boston Manor House in Brentford and saw first-hand how the building has been restored to reflect its momentous 400-year history. The Jacobean House, which is run by Hounslow Council with the help of local volunteers, will be free to visit when it opens later this Spring.

Her Majesty viewed some of the refurbished rooms and met with architects, craftspeople, apprentices and volunteers who played an integral role in restoring the house to its former glory.

The Queen Mother visited the house in 1963 and received a ceremonial key. During her visit, the Queen Consort was presented with a symbolic key by the Leader of Hounslow Council in the House's State Drawing Room.



Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, said:

"It was an absolute honour to have Her Majesty visit Brentford and see how Hounslow is enshrining heritage and culture into its identity. This project would not have been possible without the highly skilled craftspeople, staff at Hounslow Council, volunteers and funders who have made history come alive in this iconic house.

"Yet beyond the restoration we have cemented an important legacy: we will provide placements, apprenticeships and internships for young people under 25 – within the heritage sector - until at least 2025."

And with volunteering being a central theme at the King's Coronation, Hounslow Council aims to engage with 150 local volunteers over the next two years.

Her Majesty also visited the new Jimmy Choo London Fashion Academy based in the buildings adjacent to Boston Manor House. The academy, in partnership with Hounslow Council, is one of the newest emerging universities in the country dedicated to fashion. The Queen Consort met with school children from Our Lady and St John's RC primary school in Brentford who were designing shoes - along with students and local artisans cutting, sewing and designing clothes.

Stephen Smith, the Founder and Director of the Jimmy Choo Academy and local resident, said:

"My five-year-old son has grown up in Boston Manor Park and we would stare at Boston Manor House every time we visited. I often thought it would be a great place to have a creative space so when Hounslow Council announced they were wishing to support the local artisan community it was an immediate meeting of minds."

The restoration project was made possible through funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, London Borough of Hounslow, Mayor of London's Good Growth Fund, Historic England, Historic Houses Foundation, Wolfson Foundation, Pilgrim Trust and Heritage of London Trust.



BUILDING BRIDGES

CONNECTING COMMUNITIES

Hounslow Council marked the official opening of the new Dukes Meadows footbridge in Chiswick earlier this year.

The installation, which provides walkers with safer, more convenient access to the scenic Thames Path, removes the need for a long detour to rejoin the path after Barnes Bridge.

The new walkway also rejuvenated a previously disconnected stretch of the Thames Path, whilst improving the route, accessibility and safety for pushchairs, mobility scooters and wheelchairs.

A ceremony which included pupils from Chiswick School performing in a steel pan band and a flash mob dance took place to mark the opening of the footbridge. The Mayor of Hounslow, Cllr Raghwinder Siddhu formally opened the bridge alongside Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council.

Associates from the Council's construction partner, Knights Brown, were also present to celebrate the completion of the innovative two-year engineering feat.

Dukes Meadows Footbridge will provide numerous benefits for the local community, including enhanced access to leisure facilities and new views of the Dukes Hollow Nature Reserve.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of the Council, said: "Pedestrians using the Thames Path in Dukes Meadows usually find themselves facing a long detour that takes them away from the Thames through a narrow tunnel which passes under the railway.





"This bridge will now offer a fantastic uninterrupted route along the River Thames.

"This major construction milestone and engineering triumph is testament to years of close partnerships between Hounslow Council, our construction partner Knights Brown and the local community - under the leadership of my predecessor Steve Curran. We also received tremendous cross-party support for this project from local ward member Cllr John Todd.

"We're proud to offer residents a more inclusive and accessible route to the Thames Path and look forward to welcoming even more visitors to Dukes Meadows."

ENDING VIOLENCE

AGAINST WOMEN AND GIRLS

Hounslow Council has set out how it will work together with partners to make Hounslow a safer place for all women and girls to live, work, study and visit. ensuring that victims/survivors' voices and experiences are heard."

The Women and Girls Network, who provide a specialist service for victims of sexual violence via their helpline, said: "Here at Women and Girls Network (WGN), we provide free and confidential

The plan to end violence against women and girls is formed of three key priorities: ensuring victims, survivors and children receive the right help; working together to stop violence against women and girls; and taking action against perpetrators.

To demonstrate its commitment to engaging with men and boys to end violence against women and girls, Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of the Council, was nominated as a White Ribbon ambassador, by the Cabinet.



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Cllr Ajmer Grewal, Cabinet Member for Safety, said: "We are very pleased to have Cllr Rajawat as our White Ribbon ambassador. Over the

next three years, we will implement the White Ribbon action plan to ensure long-term change.

"Violence against women and girls is



abhorrent and I would like us all to speak up to prevent violence."

During Sexual Violence and Abuse awareness week, 6-12 February 2023, the Council held two pop up events at West Middlesex Hospital and the Heart of Hounslow. The Hounslow Domestic and Sexual Violence Outreach Service (HDSVOS) were joined by partners such as GALOP, Southall Black Sisters, Women and Girls Network and Victim Support.

Victim Support, which provides a specialist service at the West Middlesex Hospital for victims/survivors, said: "This week is particularly important to us as we believe that greater awareness of domestic abuse, and in specific sexual abuse, is vital in

emotional support for survivors of sexual violence in all London boroughs via our freephone helpline and web chat.

"The helpline service is for women aged 14 and over who self-identify as victims of any form of sexual violence at any time in their lives."

POETRY IN YOUR POCKET

Jeremy Vine was among a mix of WB Yeats enthusiasts and Councillors at an event to launch a new digital app celebrating one of the foremost figures of 20th century literature.

Those attending at Bedford Park in Chiswick were treated to a reading by the broadcaster and local resident. Bedford Park was where Yeats lived with his family during two periods in the late 1800's. Vine also demonstrated how the smartphone and QR codes worked to access information about Yeats, before leading attendees on the local trail that includes the poet's former home.





Singer Bob Geldof has spoken about the importance the area had on Yeats' work and was among the campaigners who successfully lobbied for a sculpture to be erected in Bedford Park, partly supported by Hounslow Council's Thriving Communities fund.

He said: "Bedford Park is where the national poet understood what it was to be impoverished, alien, exiled and gave rise to the greatest poetry of the 20th century."

The smartphone trail is linked to the beautiful art installation that was funded via the Thriving Communities Fund as part of the Local Community Infrastructure Levy funds.

Feltham's history celebrated

Back in 2020, the Council commissioned Feltham Arts to create a public mosaic artwork on the wall behind the Feltham Green war memorial.

Working closely with the Friends of Feltham Green, and local artist Susie John, the community voted for the best design – 'The History of Feltham's Name' – with local people having the chance to create the mosaics.

Consisting of 26 mosaic mullein flower heads, the mural represents the origin of Feltham's name in the Middle Ages, and its association with the old English plant name the Great Mullein.

Angela Parton, Chair of Friends of Feltham Green said: "It was great that so many local people shared their views, and I'm really pleased that the final design depicts the natural world and refers to Feltham's history. This means the mosaic, situated in the heart of the town centre, will genuinely represent Feltham and be unique to us for years to come."

Throughout the project, local contractors were commissioned to complete the work, ensuring that the whole process remained local to the borough.

With the mural now becoming a focal point in the borough, residents are encouraged to head down to Feltham Green and capture that all-important photo.

This initiative was part of the Feltham Green Masterplan works and funded by the Community Infrastructure Levy.





CEMENTING SUPPORT FOR LGBT+ COMMUNITY

Hounslow Council has installed a Rainbow Junction in Chiswick High Road, consisting of four separate crossings in the colours of the progress Pride flag.

Rainbow Junction, where Chiswick High Road meets Annandale Road and Turnham Green Terrace, was revealed at the start of both LGBT+ History month and Football vs Homophobia month of action and is a vivid demonstration of the Council's commitment to the rights of the borough's LGBT+ community.

The idea was the brainchild of West London Queer Project (WLQP), who the Council has worked with over the past year during Pride 2022, and in the development of a new Equalities, Diversity and Inclusion strategy.

The Council has also supported WLQP's work on wellbeing and social connection through Thriving Communities funding.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, commented: "Hounslow is a borough where everyone is welcome regardless of sexual orientation or identity. WLQP have grown from a small group of friends to a borough wide organisation of more than 5,000 members in under a year; a clear indication of the need for our LGBT+ community to have a voice, recognition, and support."

Aubrey Crawley, founder of WLQP commented: "We are delighted to continue a successful association with the Council and celebrate these important landmarks in such a public way.

"WLQP has also recently worked with Brentford Football Club, as part of its support of Football vs Homophobia's month of action, with skills sessions for the LGBT+ community and further activity before a home game against Crystal Palace."

Second generation Holocaust survivor shares story

To mark Holocaust Memorial Day 2023, the Council invited second generation Holocaust survivor Gabriel Stein to share his mother Marie Stein's survivor testimony with students, community groups and councillors at West Thames College.



Born in Łódź in western Poland in 1929, Marie was just 10 years old when the Second World War broke out. She lost her childhood forever and was subjected to Nazi persecution.

Holocaust Memorial Day provides a time for the whole borough to reflect and remember the victims of the Holocaust, Nazi persecution, and subsequent genocides. It is vital as a community we never forget these atrocities and ensure hatred is never left unchecked in our society. Sharing stories and teaching the next generation about the Holocaust is vital to keeping the memory alive.

ULEZ EXPANSION

Hounslow residents and businesses are being encouraged to prepare for the Mayor of London's expansion of the Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) to cover outer London from 29 August.

Londoners receiving certain meanstested benefits and non-means-tested disability benefits can apply for grants of up to £2,000. Disabled people who want to scrap or retrofit a non-compliant wheelchair-accessible vehicle will be able to apply for grants of £5,000 to reflect the higher cost of these vehicles. The scheme also includes an option to opt for two bus and tram season tickets.

Levelling the playing field

Hounslow Council joined forces with Brentford FC Women's First Team to celebrate International Women's Day on 8 March.

This year's theme was to '#EmbraceEquity' which has been selected to highlight the importance of collective activism, through challenging gender stereotypes, calling out discrimination, drawing attention to bias and seeking out inclusion.

Molly Holmes, Brentford FC Women's First Team captain, said: "I started at the Club when I was 17 and I have been able to witness the phenomenal growth of women's football. It is such an amazing opportunity with the girls and women

coming in and the great atmosphere where there is no judgement, and knowing we are there to be heard and counted. International Women's Day is crucial to highlight how far we have come and also an opportunity to inspire the next generation."

The Council also hosted an event at Hounslow House for third sector community groups and residents with representatives from across the borough who came together to discuss topics including gender equality in violence against women and girls prevention, feminism in the South Asian communities and gender equity in the workplace and campaigns.


JUDGE DUMPS TOUGH VERDICT ON FLY TIPPER

Mr Crawt from Surrey was recently ordered to carry out 250 hours of unpaid community service and fined £4,181 for fly-tipping. Caught by Hounslow Council's Neighbourhood Enforcement Team through its CCTV infrastructure he was seen fly-tipping garden and business waste from a vehicle on Church Road in Hounslow.

A top priority for the Council is a cleaner Hounslow with the aim of reducing flytipping by 25%. From April to December 2022, there were just over 14,000 flytipping incidents reported to Hounslow Highways, a decrease of 23% compared to the previous year.

Recently Sabeel Khan, Head of Highways PFI at Hounslow Council, featured in the

BBC's Defenders documentary on how the Council is successfully clamping down on fly-tipping in the borough.



NO TIME TO WASTE

A new campaign to encourage residents to recycle more and waste less has been launched by Hounslow Council.

Made in partnership with real people living throughout the borough, the 'No Time to Waste' campaign is supported with promotional material including video content and strong imagery.

With the cost of living crisis a prominent issue, the campaign aims to continue educating residents on both the environmental and cost-saving benefits of putting less waste in household rubbish and using the dedicated recycling bins.





Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Environment, Highways and Operational Services said: "While our borough's recycling rates

are improving all the time, they are still a long way from being the best. We are an ambitious Council and there's is still a lot more we can do.

"We're here to work with residents to reduce the amount we waste, and increase the amount of stuff we reuse and recycle – this protects our environment by lowering our communal carbon footprint.

"Let's work together to waste less food and recycle more materials. It's not hard and it saves both residents and the Council money, and helps the environment as we target zero carbon in 2030."

THRIVE AND DIRECT— TARGETED FUNDING FOR HOUNSLOW

Hounslow Council has awarded over £270,000 to 14 local voluntary and community groups in round two of its Thriving Communities funding, which offers financial support to projects and activities run by the borough's charities, voluntary and community groups.



The funding has been allocated in support of an innovative mix of projects, which includes investment in youth services, visiting support for the borough's visually impaired community, an intergenerational music making group and a nurturing space for young women.

Furthermore, the funding aims to help reduce isolation and strengthen social connections, increase independence and opportunity, and support residents with their mental health.

Emelia Biskowska, Community Manager at Heston FC added: "We are particularly grateful for this funding, as across England and Wales, there has been a 70% decline in this type of support.

"Heston football club is a place for all. We aim to build a sustainable club which is the voice for the local community. It's vital that services that support young people are prioritised in this way. Thanks to Hounslow Council, we are now able to be able to invest in this hugely important area."



Cllr Shivraj Grewal, Cabinet Member for communities and equalities said: "We have a wonderful mix of

voluntary and community groups in our borough and our Thriving Communities funding helps them deliver projects that improve the lives of our residents, for example through a new youth service at Heston Football Club.

"Over 750 of these types of youth services have closed across the UK since 2011 due to austerity measures. Our funding is targeted and based on local need in line with our wider strategy to create a safer, thriving, healthier, and greener borough for all."



Hounslow Council's Work Hounslow team has successfully partnered with social enterprise Career Camp to help residents secure interviews for roles at West Middlesex Hospital in Isleworth.

With over 10,000 NHS vacancies in the capital, the project is taking the initiative in trying to secure jobs with local people in Hounslow. Short-listed residents are invited to an NHS Healthcare Camp, hosted at West Thames College and at the end of their course, taken into nearby West Middlesex to immerse themselves in the work environment.

This proactive model was originally developed through local Hounslow Jobcentre community funding and recently endorsed by Seema Malhotra, local MP for Feltham and Heston, where many of the successful candidates have come from.

Ed Baker, founder of Career Camp said: "We are proud to have developed a ground-breaking new skills training programme in partnership with Hounslow Council (Skills Escalator), West Middlesex Hospital and Hounslow Jobcentre.

"NHS Healthcare Camp' helps residents to learn directly from NHS practitioners and gain first-hand skills and insights - supported by a series of qualifications that raise their knowledge and work-readiness.

Hounslow Jobcentre's Partnership Manager, Jaswant Lall, also worked with Ed Baker, on the vacancies at West Middlesex Hospital, and commented:

"Hounslow Jobcentre Work Coaches were able to explain the programme to customers who were looking to get into work in the care sector and the NHS.

"Jobcentre staff set out the training on offer and referred people to where they could find out more, including the employment opportunities available on completion of the programme."

Candidates are principally offered clinical Health Care Assistant (HCA) roles leading towards a career in nursing.

There are currently around 9,500 people claiming benefits in Hounslow, and this sector-based work academy model is at the vanguard of providing local jobs for local people through positive word of mouth recruitment.

MAKE SURE YOU ARE READY TO VOTE WITH PHOTO ID

You now need photo ID to vote at a polling station

A key change on voting at polling stations in future elections has been introduced as part of new election law last year.

When voting in person at a polling station, you will need to show an official form of photo identification (ID) to vote.

The requirement applies to all local government elections, Parliamentary by-elections and recall petitions from 4 May 2023 as well as to all Parliamentary elections after 5 October 2023. Please note that there are no scheduled council elections for the London Borough of Hounslow until May 2024.

The good news is that you probably already have a recognised form of photo ID, and expired photo ID will be accepted, so long as the photo remains a good likeness of the bearer.

ACCEPTED FORMS OF IDENTIFICATION INCLUDE:

- Passport issued by Britain, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, a state of the European Economic Area (EEA), or a Commonwealth country
- Driving licence issued by Britain, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or an EEA state
- Biometric immigration document
- Identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card)
- Blue Badge
- National identity card issued by an EEA state



- Older person's bus pass
- Disabled Person's bus bass
- Oyster 60+ card
- Freedom Pass

The full list of accepted identification is available on the Electoral Commission's website, along with more information about the new requirement at www. electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID

If you are registered to vote and you don't have one of the accepted forms of photo ID you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate.

Apply online at www.gov.uk/apply-forphoto-id-voter-authority-certificate or by completing a paper application form and sending it to Hounslow Council's Electoral Services Team. (use the gov website for this).

When you apply, you must provide a photograph either through the online application process or with a paper application which meets the following requirements:

Photograph of your head and shoulders:

- Without any covering of the head, unless worn for religious beliefs or medical reasons
- In sharp focus and clear
- Looking straight at the camera with a plain facial expression
- In colour and taken against a plain, light background
- Free from shadows and not in the reflection of windows or mirrors.

MINECRAFT USED TO CREATE DREAM STREETS IN FELTHAM



Pupils at Rivers Academy West London were given a chance to design their dream street through a Minecraft initiative funded by the Royal Academy of Engineering.

Sustrans, the active travel transport charity, worked with Hounslow Council's transport team and digital engagement specialist, BlockBuilders to deliver an interactive workshop for year nine children aged 13-14.

In the initiative known as Street Builders, pupils were asked to create their dream street using Minecraft. The aim of the project was for students to get involved in designing the public realm where they live, learn about different routes into Science, Technology, Mathematics, Engineering (STEM) careers.

BlockBuilders trained Council engineers and transport planners in Minecraft skills to prepare them and be on hand with any engineering advice the children would need. They then created a street in Minecraft with all the materials required including furniture, flowerpots, play equipment, trees, plants and much more.

Sustrans London Director, James Cleeton said: "The magic combination of the

children with their Minecraft skills, energy and enthusiasm working alongside highly experienced engineers brings fresh ideas and creativity. It's a chance for the kids to show engineers what they think is important to make streets happier and healthier places. When streets work well for children, they work well for everyone."

Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport Strategy, said: "The Minecraft Streetbuilders programme will show us what young people really want in their streets. And they will also see the huge role engineers play in shaping how our streets and towns look and feel."

A responsible budget for challenging times

Despite extraordinary financial pressures, Hounslow Council has delivered a balanced budget for the year ahead which will allow it to provide high-quality frontline services, while still delivering on its commitment to make the borough even better.

The Council estimates rising demand for services to support children with additional needs, plus social care for children and adults, will cost an additional £9million this year. That is on top of inflation, which is running at a 40-year high, and is expected to cost the Council an extra £16million.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of the Council, said: "Managing our finances has been exceptionally challenging this year because of the grim economic picture.

Not only are we dealing with very high inflation, but the situation was made even bleaker almost overnight, as a result of the government's mini budget.

"Despite that, I am very proud that we have managed to deliver a balanced budget which will allow us to deliver the things that residents want and deserve. We remain absolutely steadfast in our commitment to making this a Healthier, Greener, Cleaner, Safer, Thriving and more Liveable place for everyone.

To avoid a budget shortfall, Council Tax will rise by 4.99%; the amount the government assumes local authorities will add to their bills this year. This includes 2% ringfenced for adult social care, a critical investment to help meet the rising costs and demand for these services.

The rise remains well-below the current rate of inflation and the Council is continuing to offer one of the most generous Council Tax Support schemes in London, along with a 'top up' of an extra £50 off bills for eligible residents.

Delivering what matters

Last summer the Council approved Ambitious for Hounslow, its Corporate Plan for 2022-26 to improve Hounslow as a place, and the lives of residents, businesses, and communities. We're already delivering on those priorities in a variety of ways.

Making the local economy stronger and more sustainable

Hounslow is the proud home of thousands of independent businesses, but recently record inflation means the cost of doing business has soared.

The Council is committed to creating innovative ways to support businesses to navigate those challenges such as through its successful Innovate and Grow programme, which supported over 760 businesses last year.

Shankar Devarashetty, Managing Director of Oasis Accountants said: "The easily accessible support provided by the Council and its partners has given us a real boost, helping us to grow our digital skills and develop a long-term strategy to attract customers. Hounslow really is on the side of businesses and wants to help us thrive."



Supporting vulnerable residents

Hounslow Council supports more than 150 local voluntary groups and charities which help people in the local area with a range of needs.

In the latest round of Thriving Communities funding Middlesex Association for the Blind (MAB) was awarded £25,000 to help reach people with sight loss, providing support to reduce isolation, increase independence, and improve mental wellbeing.



Visually impaired residents may sometimes become isolated and immobile. Their sight loss can make it harder for them to find a job or make friends, which can lead to mental health problems such as anxiety and depression.

Once matched with a support worker or one of the volunteers, residents can often form important relationships and receive support based on individual need. Many also take up the chance to visit a regular VIP Club at Hounslow's British Legion.

Early intervention to prevent violence

The Learning to Respect Programme is a domestic abuse prevention initiative unique to Hounslow.

The Council has partnered with local schools to raise awareness of domestic abuse and promote healthy relationships to children and young people. It aims to have a long-term impact on the community to prevent incidences of domestic abuse.



Mrs P Sehgal, Headteacher, Norwood Green Junior School, said: "We're proud to be delivering the Learning to Respect programme in our school, it's vital we make these steps to help make our community safer.

"It's helping children to identify what a healthy relationship looks like and equipping them with skills to recognise the early signs of abuse."

The Council has signed up to become a White Ribbon accredited borough to demonstrate the commitment to engaging with men and boys to end violence against women and girls.

Improving the quality of our Council homes

Residents sometimes need adaptations to their homes to make it easier to live safely and independently. Last year, the Council invested over £1m to deliver more than 200 unique adaptation projects, including stairlifts and bathroom or kitchen modifications.

The Council recently transformed the bathroom of Isleworth resident Shiraz, installing a level access shower to support with his mother's disability. He said: "The new shower and bathroom is much safer for my mother to use independently which makes life easier for the entire family. The support from the Council was excellent and the work was completed quickly causing minimal disruption."

Ensuring residents live in comfortable high-quality homes that are suitable to their needs, in safe welcoming neighbourhoods, is at the heart of the Council's commitments to improve residents' lives.



Healthier and happier lives

Supported by the Council, BeeZee Bodies offers free programmes of support for families and adults to make improvements to their lifestyle and wellbeing.

Mum of three, Veena, recently took part in a healthy eating and lifestyle programme with her children. She said: "My children and I have come to appreciate the benefits of a healthy diet and being more active, we now use notes and stickers to track our progress.

"Apart from the health benefits, it's given us all a real confidence boost. Going out and meeting people has made us value how much is happening in Hounslow."



Veena enjoyed the experience so much that she wanted to help other residents make healthier life choices and has now begun working for the scheme.

Food waste recycling for flats a hit with residents

The Council has been working hard to make it easier for residents to recycle and reduce their environmental footprint. When not recycled, food waste is one of the biggest contributors to household waste and increases carbon emissions.

To help increase food waste recycling the service was recently expanded to over 24,000 flats – saving the Council over £67k in disposal costs which can be reinvested into other services.

Hounslow also became the first London borough to introduce a state-of-the-art bin washer, which allows food bins to be collected each week and replaced with clean ones.

Brentford resident and avid recycler, Lewis, said: "I was so pleased when I found out we would be able to recycle food waste from our flat. Showing my young son how to recycle and look after our planet is important to me.

"Recycling our food waste has even saved us some money by changing our shopping habits. We noticed how much food we were wasting and stopped buying foods we often threw away."

Help for those who need it

With the cost of living rising, many people are struggling financially at the moment, including some households which have never had to worry about money before.



The Mayor of London Debt Bus also visited the borough to provide much-needed advice to those worried about money.

Working with voluntary organisations, the Council has also set up an extensive network of warm spaces which will be open until at least the end of March, where people can meet with others, take part in an activity and find out about the help available.

Through its innovative Community Solutions approach, the Council has supported hundreds of people over the last six months by working with voluntary groups to host Cost of Living Marketplace events in locations across the borough, including several in places of worship.

One such event was held at Hounslow's Jamia Masjid in February when the mosque in Wellington Road South, threw open its doors and encouraged anyone in the community who was looking for help to come along, have some hot food and find out about support available.

LET'S CLEAR THE AIR

Residents are being encouraged to get on board with a new campaign to protect people's health by taking small but important actions to improve our air quality.



The quality of the air we breathe can have a big impact on our health and wellbeing.

Air pollution, which is made up of tiny particles in the atmosphere, can be very damaging.

It can enter our lungs, causing respiratory problems and the smaller particles can enter our bloodstream.

The most prevalent form of air pollution comes from the chemical nitrogen dioxide, which is produced by combustion engines and industrial sources and can cause lung and heart problems.

In 2021, Hounslow Council committed £1.2m to improving air quality and increasing monitoring throughout the borough.

Currently there are six monitoring stations that track both nitrogen dioxide and particulate matter, and a network of over

100 diffusion tubes that track nitrogen dioxide in the borough. Additionally, the authority is also investing in a new air quality sensor network that will provide real-time information on pollution levels in the borough.

Schools in Hounslow can take advantage of air quality audits with funding available to introduce measures to reduce pollution.



Working closely with Transport for London, the Council is encouraging more parents to use cleaner methods of transport for the school run including walking, scooting and cycling.



Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport Strategy, said: "Cleaning the air in Hounslow

to protect ourselves, our children and future generations is something we all must have a part in. The simplest forms of behaviour change, such as walking or cycling more, can have a big effect. There are steps everyone can take to help clean the air and by working together we can make a real difference.

"We have also introduced initiatives such as Low Traffic Neighbourhoods and School Streets, which encourage people to consider healthier alternatives to the car."

HERE ARE SOME SIMPLE IDEAS TO HELP US CLEAR THE AIR:

- → Walk the school run Driving the children to school greatly impacts the quality of life in Hounslow. It clogs up the roads, particularly outside schools at peak traffic times. It's also a major contributing factor towards air pollution levels in our borough.
- → **Don't be idle** Switch your engine off while you're waiting in the car. Keeping your engine running is called idling and is bad for the environment. A stationary car with its engine running produces twice as much pollution as a moving one.
- → Don't use wood burners or log fires Some research shows wood burners and open fires can produce more air pollution than a lorry. If you have to use an open fire do it sparingly and limit the amount of wood you burn. Always buy ready-to-burn fuel. Wet wood and bagged coal are two of the worst forms of fuel for air pollution.
- → Travel to work wisely Commuting to work in the car greatly impacts air quality across Hounslow and throughout London. Walking, cycling and public transport are healthy alternatives to driving a car.



BEA Screening Star

Hounslow Council is working with borough businesses to share a lifesaving message about cervical cancer screening.

Cervical cancer is the fourth most common cancer among women - nine women a day are diagnosed with the disease in the UK. It is also one of the most preventable forms of cancer.

All women and people with a cervix aged 25 to 64, will be invited for a test through a letter from their GP.

The test is discreet and takes no longer than five minutes. Yet it could detect signs of the disease before it happens.

The Council's Public Health Team is working with nail bars and beauty salons across the borough, which will be displaying eye-catching posters, to get the messages out about how important testing is.



Mala Sarna, who owns Mala's Hair and Beauty Lounge in Hounslow, is one of those business-owners supporting the cause. She said: "We are happy to support the Council on this campaign. It's important that we get the message out to women in our borough about how important these screening tests are. Now, everyone who comes into our salon will see the posters and be able to find out more about it."

THE HIDDEN DANGERS OF VAPING

Health officials with Hounslow Council are sending a message to the borough's young people about the risks of vaping.

Vapes or e-cigarettes can be very effective tools if you're trying to quit normal cigarettes. However, the message to young people is clear – if you don't smoke, don't vape.

NHS England says that the full extent of the health risks posed by vaping and e-cigarettes, particularly to young people, is still not yet known.

While they contain fewer harmful chemicals than traditional cigarettes, the vast majority contain nicotine, which is addictive

Recently, Trading Standards Officers in Hounslow seized more than 37,000 counterfeit vapes, some of which had misleading information about the amount of nicotine they contained. The vapes, which had a street value of nearly £400,000, were prevented from being sold in Hounslow.

GET READY FOR HEALTHY HOUNSLOW

Thanks to a new partnership between Hounslow Council and a range of healthy lifestyle services, residents will have more opportunities to eat well, quit smoking and be more active.

Since 2016, health and wellbeing services in the borough have been provided under the One You Hounslow name. From April, Healthy Hounslow will be the new name for these services, providing expert support for residents who want to make changes to their lifestyles.

HELP FOR CARERS

If you give up your time to look after a family member, friend or neighbour, then it's time to take advantage of a new service designed just for you.

Hounslow Council has teamed up with Harrow Carers to provide a lifeline for people in our borough who care for someone on an unpaid basis.

Whether it's a parent with dementia, an adult child with a learning disability or a friend with a drug and alcohol dependency.

The free service provides information and guidance on issues, including support with benefits and blue badge applications, support to access free counselling and employment opportunities, and advice on managing stress and improving sleep.

Jane from Hounslow went to Harrow Carers to get support with form filling. She got a Blue Badge approved for her mum using the service. Jane said: "I couldn't have done it without your guidance, great having that second pair of eyes to look over the form."

Bill and Pam, 70 from Feltham couldn't leave the house. They needed help to fill in a benefits application. Donna visited them in the comfort of their home and completed an attendance allowance form, taking the burden off their shoulders.

Harrow Carers is an independent charity that has been helping to improve the quality of life for carers since 1996. The friendly team can help with tasks such as filling in forms and how to find your way through the social care system.

DON'T SUFFER IN SILENCE FIND YOUR SAFE SPACE

Hounslow Council and its partners are working to ensure that anyone who is experiencing a crisis has somewhere to turn to for help, with a range of support available for anyone in the borough who feels their situation is desperate.

Operated by the mental health charity Mind in partnership with the Council, Safe Space is a new helpline that is available for anyone aged 18 and over between 11am and 11pm every day.

The Council has recently launched a new suicide prevention page on its

website which signposts people to where they can get help.

While all age groups and genders are at risk, current statistics show that, nationally, middle-aged men have the highest rates of suicide. Statistics also show that middle-aged men are the least likely to seek help with mental health issues.


BETTER HOMES FOR COUNCIL TENANTS

In January 2023, Hounslow Council gave the green light to its new, £210 million, six-year programme of investment in council estates.

The Council is committed to making sure tenants' homes are not just safe but are of high-quality and decent to live in with modern and efficient kitchens, bathrooms and heating systems.

The new programme represents an investment of £16,000 per council home, which will allow the replacement of 500 kitchens per year, upgrade to new, more secure, door entry systems and replacement of old and worn-out windows on properties.

There are many other benefits to the programme too including the renovation of green areas on estates, improving the energy efficiency of homes and reducing carbon emissions.



Cllr Sue Sampson, Cabinet Member for Housing Management and Homelessness, said:

"The Council is committed to ensuring that it delivers the best possible service to tenants and improves living conditions in all council properties. Although there have been significant estate improvements, there is more work still to do. Particularly to improve the energy efficiency performance and carbon cost of council bornes."



A group of residents, who have recently taken up their new roles as Estate Improvement Monitors (EIM), will play an active role in shaping improvements to their neighbourhood. The initiative is part of the Council's wider strategy to empower residents to be involved in shaping the spaces and places that matter to them.

Alongside Cllr Sue Sampson, Cabinet Member for Housing Management and Homelessness, they visited estates in December and had the chance to share their experiences of taking up the role and why they wanted to get involved.

Part of being a EIM is carrying out spot checks, identifying issues like fence repairs and defective communal lights, but also to put forward ideas for improvement projects such as transforming underused spaces for community use.

The group felt becoming an EIM not only empowered them, but also helped with increasing their physical activity, better mental health, motivation to meet people, and a new sense of purpose.

One of the EIM's said: "I took up estate inspections so I could learn the different

estates across the borough and to understand the staff who work daily to bring the same standards to all residents."



Cllr Sue Sampson said: "Last year, the Council pledged to invest £300 million in improving the quality of its council estates and creating

opportunities for local people to be involved in decision making.

"With 170 estates in Hounslow, plus smaller blocks, we absolutely want to work closely with our tenants, so we invest in the things that matter most and prioritise projects that make a genuine difference to their needs.

"It's fantastic to know this initiative is not only helping improve our council estates for tenants but it's also having a positive impact physically and mentally."

NEW COUNCIL HOMES FOR LOCAL PEOPLE

A pledge to build 1,000 new Council homes by 2026 in response to the current housing crisis and reduce housing waiting lists has been approved by Hounslow Council.

Cllr Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Development said:

"The shortage of quality homes – at genuinely affordable rents for local people – has meant demand for Council housing has continued to increase, which is why we have once again committed to building 1,000 new high-quality homes for local people.

"As our local population grows it's important we meet the varying needs of our residents and building 1-, 2-, 3- and 4-bedroom homes is a key part of our plans.

"By building more homes we are also reducing the pressure on our services that help to prevent homelessness."



The new housebuilding delivery plan sets out how the new goal will be achieved, including ensuring all new developments are low carbon and energy efficient to help save tenants money on their energy bills.

Current projects already underway include Hanworth Park House, which will see 120 new homes built and Charlton House which will see 209 new homes.

FROM PLAYGROUNDS TO PARKS

HOW PLANNING APPLICATIONS MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO YOU





When new developments are planned in Hounslow, housing developers are obliged to make contributions towards the funding of infrastructure that will benefit the borough's communities and residents. This can range from building step-free access at a train station to refurbishing a local playground.

Last year, Hounslow Council received over £10 million in funding to invest in projects that make a difference to communities.

Key projects to receive funding include:

- → £1 million investment in step free access at Isleworth station
- → £450,000 investment in Gunnersbury's Small Mansion and Stables Conversion – preserving the park's rich cultural heritage
- → £150,000 improvements in Watermans Park – a new playground has been used by hundreds of local children
- → £200,000 investment in Feltham Green open space, which included new play equipment, paths and fencing.



Cllr Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Development said:

"We want Hounslow to be a place where the local economy can thrive and local businesses can prosper. However, with that prosperity comes responsibility and it is important that we support the residents and communities that underpin everything that is great about Hounslow.

"So, whether your children are benefitting from the exciting new play equipment at Watermans Park or breathing in cleaner air from the hundreds of new trees the Council is planting, this funding really does make a tangible difference to our residents' lives."

ON THE PATH TO NET ZERO

Significant investment has been made by Hounslow Council into decarbonising the borough's buildings, retrofitting for better energy efficiency and lowering the emissions of its fleet since the Council declared a climate emergency in 2019.

With a commitment to achieve net zero carbon by 2030, the local authority's key successes to date include:

- → Generating nearly 4,000kW renewable energy with the installation of solar panels at 48 sites
- Retrofitting 32 schools and 29 corporate buildings with decarbonisation measures
- → Investing approximately £8 million to improve energy efficiency of council housing.



Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport Strategy, said:

"Hounslow is proud to be at the forefront of London's bold climate action and leading one of the seven climate programmes being delivered by London Councils. Our Green Economy Action Plan sets out how local authorities across the capital can double the size of the green economy by 2030 and ensure a sustainable future for our residents and communities.

"Although we face big challenges, we are also presented with fantastic opportunities which will allow our communities and businesses to thrive – the creation of more jobs, skills and training, the growth of a greener economy, a cleaner greener environment, health and social benefits, amongst others."

The Council has outlined markers that measure its climate successes, these include:

- → Planting 20,000 more trees and growing more wildflowers in our parks
- → Reducing carbon emissions by 50% by 2026 from council operations
- → Improving our resilience to flooding
- → Classifying 45% of the borough as green infrastructure

The Council is passionate about supporting nature and is proud that Hounslow is one of the greenest boroughs in London.

As part of its commitment to ensuring a cleaner and greener borough for residents and visitors alike, the Council promotes and provides a comprehensive volunteering offering that helps increase biodiversity and ensures a flourishing natural environment.

The Lampton Greenspace Countryside team manages 18 countryside sites across the borough, each with an individual habitat management plan. The team hosts regular volunteering events all year round for residents to get involved with.

Events take place at Pevensey Road (Feltham), Hounslow Heath, Boston Manor Park and Bedfont Lakes. These focus on seasonal habitat activities such as vegetation maintenance and gardening to promote a greater diversity of plants.

GROWING TO THE GYM: THE CONSERVATION VOLUNTEERS

Hounslow's weekly outdoors volunteering sessions known as Green Gyms are run by The Conservation Volunteers (TCV), a charity that supports communities in creating and caring for green spaces.

The Council's Free Trees for Hounslow initiative has proved to be a success for another year running.

Hounslow has pledged to plant 7,500 trees this year, which includes one tree planted for every child born. And it is because of the dedication from residents that canopy cover is increasing across the borough.

The Council made 1,000 trees available for residents, allotment holders and schools to order and pick up for free. Promisingly, data showed a 10% increase from the previous year's giveaway in the number of trees collected during the park collection days.



Cllr Salman Shaheen, Cabinet Member for Parking, Parks and Leisure, said: "It is wonderful that Hounslow's residents have come out in

force for another year running and helped to make our green borough even greener.

"Our tree planting community grows every year, much like Hounslow's canopy cover. I'd like to thank everyone who took home a free fruit tree this planting season: you're having a direct impact on Hounslow's green transformation, and contributing to cleaner air for us all."

Planting new trees helps to mitigate the effects of climate change, encourages biodiversity, and supports all kinds of different habitats.

While almost the entire allocation of 1,000 trees were given away, any left-over trees will be distributed to orchards and local Friends groups within the community.
