MEET THE MAYOR OF THE LONDON BOROUGH OF HOUNSLOW

The Mayor of Hounslow 2023-2024 is Cllr Afzaal Kiani



Mayor Kiani was first elected as a Cllr for the Hounslow Heath Ward in 2018.

He was born and raised in Rawalpindi, Pakistan and moved to the UK in 1986 as a student. After completing a degree in law, he started work as a Community Advisor for a local organisation funded by Islington Council.

Cllr Kiani has also worked for the Civil Service in various departments and has broad experience of dealing with people from diverse backgrounds. A school governor since 1990, he has held various senior positions on the respective boards of governors.

As well as serving on various committees and panels for the Council, he has sat as Chair and Vice Chair of the Housing and Environment Scrutiny Panel.

Cllr Kiani has lived in the borough since 1998 and is married with four children.

Mayor's Charity

The Mayor has chosen two charities for his Mayoral year – Al-Mustafa Welfare Trust (Registered Charity Number 1118492) and CW+ (Registered Charity Number 1169897).

Al-Mustafa Welfare Trust Whilst a global charity, they have a Hounslow focussed 'Neighbours First" projects designed to tackle issues such as homelessness and provide elderly support, poverty support services, and young offenders support, among others.

CW+ Raising money for a new stateof-the-art facility at West Middlesex University Hospital that will include cancer services. The new centre will give residents of Hounslow, Richmond and Ealing faster access to tests and treatments closer to home, and will mark a major step forward in the development of patient care in our local community.

DELIVERING FOR RESIDENTS



It has been a full 12 months since Cllr Shantanu Rajawat became Leader for one of the most ambitious boroughs in London. At the start of his Leadership, he made a commitment to ensure that his Cabinet would deliver on the things that mattered to residents, businesses, and wider communities. This included setting out ambitious plans to make Hounslow a Thriving, Safer, Cleaner, Greener, Healthier, and more Liveable borough for everyone.

12 MONTHS → NN

Over the last 12 months there have been many successes. Here is a snapshot of some of the highlights.



With ongoing demand for housing continuing to increase, Hounslow is committed to building 1,000 new high-quality homes. 400 new council homes have already been completed and a further 142 properties have been purchased.



A small flavour of a healthier approach has been the repair, inspection, or overhaul of 645 resident bikes in the past 12 months through the popular 'Dr Bike' sessions.



A bold target was set to plant 20,000 more trees between 2022 and 2026. The initial target of planting 7,500 trees for the 2022/2023 planting season has been exceeded and we are proud to have established over 8,600 new trees across parks, open spaces and carriageways.



To make Hounslow a safer place, the Violence Against Women and Girls plan, which the Council received White Ribbon accreditation for, aims to change behaviours and cultures that lead to abuse and violence individually and collectively.



Nothing was higher on the agenda then the Cost of Living crisis with a series of high-profile marketplace events taking place. Residents were able to seek advice on matters ranging from debt to employment, specialised counselling and wellbeing support.

Healthy & Hounslow

As part of the Council's commitment to support residents' health and wellbeing, the new Healthy Hounslow service was launched. It offers healthy lifestyle choices to people who live, work, study or have a GP in the borough. Free to eligible groups, it promotes active lifestyles.



Over £210million has been invested into estates, which equates to £16,000 per council home over the next six years, to replace 500 kitchens per year, upgrade to new, more secure, door entry systems and replace old and worn-out windows on properties.



Improving recycling rates are underway with an anticipated rise from 35.9% in year 2021/2022, to 36.5% as of January 2023. The 37% target is within reach and is a testament to the dedication and commitment of residents.



Students from schools across the borough outperformed the national GCSE results average of 71.4% with a staggering 77.4% of pupils achieving grade 4 or better in Maths and English. Good luck to students across the borough for upcoming results!

BRINGING SERVICES CLOSER -

COMMUNITY & FAMILY HUBS

Hounslow Council is committed to transforming the way it provides advice, information, and services to its residents by building on the successful Community Solutions approach and opening Community and Family Hubs across the borough.

Community Solutions have been out and about in Hounslow up to six days a week, connecting residents to advice, guidance, and support for nearly two years. This preventative approach works, helping residents before they reach crisis point.

The pattern of taking the Council into communities is naturally evolving into Community Hubs, which will make use of existing Council facilities, bringing together a range of voluntary organisations, and Council services. Eventually, each will have a slightly different offer, based on local needs.

Assembly Hall and will officially open in September. However, until then, every Tuesday afternoon between 2pm-5pm, Community Solutions and a small number of other Council services and partners will be available on site. Revenue and Benefits, Estate Improvement Team, Housing Engagement, Asylum and Refugee team and EACH (counselling and support) will all be offering services throughout the summer.

The first is at the Feltham

Family Hubs will adopt a similar approach, bringing together professionals working with families into one place, to provide advice, information, and support concerned with children aged 0-19 or up to 25 with special educational needs and disability (SEND).

Family Hubs will offer face to face advice and support through one of the three hubs which were opened at the end of June in Feltham (west). Lampton (central) and Brentford (east). This will be complemented by outreach and virtual services. Family Hubs will also make referrals and/or signpost users to relevant support based within each local area, helping residents feel more confident and empowered to access support early. Each Hub will have a slightly different range of services and activities on offer, based on local needs, and this will evolve over time.

HAVING A BABY?

All families need some help to give their babies the best start in life, and Hounslow's offering provides exactly that. Start for Life is a central resource where families can find a huge range of support and services to help from conception through to the child's second birthday.

Through this offer, families will be able access the services they need, when they need them, more easily, including midwifery and health visiting, child development, mental health support, and specialist support for infant feeding and breastfeeding. This also includes support to quit smoking, debt advice or help with drug and alcohol use. Find out more: www. hounslow.gov.uk/startforlife



INTERACTING WITH HOUNSLOW COUNCIL

Hounslow Council is radically improving the way it interacts with residents. Whether they are trying to find information or seek help and advice, the Council is making sure this can be done as smoothly as possible.

As part of this overhaul, all Council services are taking part in a programme called Transforming Community Experience (TCE). This aims to make it easier for residents to navigate the Council's digital channels, resulting in a better user experience.



SUCCESS

When it comes to protecting the environment and putting everyone's health and wellbeing first, Brentford's Green Dragon Primary School really is a breath of fresh air.

The school has lived up to its name by becoming one of the greenest in the borough. This follows a successful bid made by Hounslow Council to the Mayor of London's environmental initiative to create a School Superzone at Green Dragon.

The school received £28,700 to fund the project and identified air quality as one of the top issues affecting the health of children, young people and families locally.

As part of the celebrations for Clean Air Day, Mayor of London Sadiq Khan joined Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, at Green Dragon to see the great work in action.

The Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, said: "It's great to see the work Green Dragon School are doing to reduce air pollution - from scooter storage and cycle lessons to air quality monitoring and greening their local space, they are making a huge difference to their local area."



Green Dragon School has operated a School Street since 2020, which means that there is a restriction to traffic flow at peak times. The school also received solar panels and air source heat pumps as part of the Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme, drastically reducing their use of natural gas. The school is now working towards asthma-friendly school accreditation on the back of its superzone success.

Green Dragon Headteacher, Nadine O'Hara, said: "We are thrilled with the efforts of our community to improve air quality. We are especially proud of our pupils who have shown great enthusiasm in making a positive impact on their local environment through the work of our eco team and their class participation."



NEWS ROUND-UP

ARMED FORCES COVENANT

Hounslow Council has pledged its support to military personnel, veterans and their families by signing the Armed Forces Covenant in front of invited guests.



The Armed Forces Covenant is a formal commitment to those who serve and have served that they will be treated with fairness and respect, and a recognition of the valuable attributes they bring to the workplace.

The agreement was co-signed by Cllr Afzaal Kiani, Mayor of Hounslow Council, Niall Bolger, CEO of Hounslow Council, Cllr Ajmer Grewal, Cabinet Member for Safety and Regulatory Services and Wing Commander Chris Owen, Ministry Of Defence (MOD).

The Armed Forces Covenant covers all serving personnel and veterans, both regular and reservist, their families and the bereaved.

Mission accomplished

Following a five-year project, Brentford's historic Boston Manor House has been restored to its former glory and is now open to the public.

Through funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Mayor of London's Good Growth Fund and Historic England, the site was finally removed from Historic England's 'Heritage at Risk Register' in 2022.



Set amongst 34 acres of grounds, overlooking a beautiful lake along with ancient cedar trees, the three-storey Jacobean property was built for Lady Mary Reade in 1623 and is one of the earliest examples of English Renaissance style in London.

The restoration work revealed original wallpapers from the eighteenth and nineteenth century which have been preserved and available for the public to view for the first time in centuries.



Free to enter all year round, the House will include a community programme of learning and public events, volunteering opportunities, exhibitions, galleries and a modern café. Furthermore the house will be available to hire as a stunning wedding venue.

TACKLING YOUTH VIOLENCE

Hounslow Council, together with the Police, a group of young people and the charity Participation People organised a Serious Violence Summit at Brentford Football Club's GTech Stadium.

The action-packed day featured workshops by Streetdoctors, Sheldon Thomas (founder of Gangsline) and the Metropolitan Police West Area Borough Command Unit. The panel discussions focussed on several topics including how the Council is evidencing their commitment to reducing youth violence, the early intervention services to reduce youth violence and interaction between the Police and other statutory services on sharing information.

Attendee Gursimran Kaur said: "Serious violence is something I don't come across a lot, but I hear about especially in the UK. It isn't good, and it isn't something that should continue, we can all play our part in helping stop it."



Cllr Ajmer Grewal, Cabinet Member for Safety and Regulatory Services, said: "The central theme for our Safer

Communities strategy is for residents to be less affected by serious crime. Summits like this are crucial to helping us achieve this."

Creating better employment opportunities

Over 900 residents have already benefited from the borough's efforts in building digital skills and creative crafts for better employment options, starting businesses and improving wellbeing.

Since 2021, Learn Hounslow, the Adult and Community Education service, has received additional funding through the Mayor of London's Good Work for All programme, which identified these areas as two of the five priorities for education and skills among people living in London.



Adult learners who visited the Meadowbank Adult and Community Education Centre, attended courses including digital skills, cybersecurity, programming and creative crafts such as pottery, textiles, photography and make-up.

Furthermore, 173 learners have practised their entrepreneurship skills by selling their crafts at the Designed and Made in Hounslow pop-up markets.

WALK THIS WAY


The latest round of ward walks has proven an enormous success and a new, wider set of area forums have been announced.

Hanworth will now have its own, while Isleworth becomes part of an expanded forum that includes Hounslow South, Osterley and Spring Grove areas. Brentford and Syon becomes a new event, while Heston and Cranford, Chiswick and Hounslow Central remain the same. In total there will be seven forums, four times a year.

Among the latest set of walks was one to Hounslow Youth Counselling Service (HYCS), based on top of St John's Community Centre in Isleworth. The service, which received Thriving Communities Funding earlier this year, supports young people across the borough through a free, 1-2-1 counselling service.

Their service is confidential, and anyone aged 11- 25 who lives, works, or studies in the borough of Hounslow can self-refer. They work from their base in Isleworth, in schools or at Feltham Young Offenders.

REDUCING PLASTIC POLLUTION

Hounslow Council has joined forces with councils across England and Wales to help stamp out the use of single-use plastics across the UK.

In support of City to Sea's national campaign, Hounslow has become a Refill Destination, working to connect residents to places they can eat, drink and shop without the needless packaging.

As a Refill Destination, the Council will promote sustainable alternatives to single-use plastics that will not only protect the environment, but also help residents and businesses to save money by taking advantage of reusable alternatives to disposable plastic items.

Harriet Bosnell, CEO of City to Sea, said: "It's great to have Hounslow Council on board.

"At the heart of this is an acceptance of the plastic crisis we face and an acknowledgement that we can't just recycle more to solve this environmental disaster.

"City to Sea will work with Hounslow over the coming years to measure their impact and to transparently report on the growing refill and reuse in the area, as well as supporting Hounslow Council in engaging businesses and residents alike."

IN THE LIMELIGHT

Lime e-bikes have now launched in Hounslow in partnership with the Council. The trial scheme is up and running in Chiswick, Brentford, Osterley and Isleworth. It is expected to launch in August across Heston, Cranford, Bedfont, Feltham and Hanworth.

As part of the new scheme, Lime is offering 50% off the cost of e-bike rides for lower income residents via its Lime Access programme. The programme provides unlimited discounts with Lime for eligible riders - including concession pass holders, key workers, students and the unemployed - helping them get where they need to go in a safe, sustainable and affordable way.





Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport said: "Cycling has so many benefits - from

supporting people's health and wellbeing, to easing traffic and improving air quality.

"By introducing dockless e-bikes to the borough and enabling people to take oneway trips, we can encourage even more people to try out cycling in the area and improve the air quality for all."

Users must park the e-bikes at mandatory parking zones located around the borough which are marked out. Riders will need to take a mandatory end of trip photo, which are all reviewed. Those that park outside of these zones will be warned and then fined.

GETTING READY FOR ULEZ EXPANSION

With air pollution estimated to be a contributing factor in premature deaths and life-changing illnesses, the Mayor of London is expanding the Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) to cover Greater London.



Eligible Londoners and small businesses may qualify for a grant to scrap older, polluting vehicles and replace them and the criteria as to who can receive the grant has now been expanded.

Subsidies to support wheelchair accessible vehicles and minibuses owned by schools/ colleges, charities, academies and local authorities. In addition, some vehicles or residents are eligible for grace periods, discounts and exemptions from the charge.

Drivers of non-compliant vehicles will need to pay a £12.50 daily fee to use the vehicle in the zone. Failure to pay the fee will mean prosecution by a penalty charge notice of £180. The zone will apply 24 hours a day.

Across the borough, signage will be installed to advise motorists that they are entering a ULEZ area which will be enforced by automatic number plate recognition cameras.

The second pillar includes measures aimed to reduce inequality around disability, age, ethnicity, gender, sexuality and faith, as well as how we can better support local businesses.

Based on feedback from groups within Hounslow, and focused on improving accessibility, representation, and support, this includes:

- Ongoing partnership between RNIB and MAB. including employment of two dedicated Eye Care Liaison Officers
- Better partnership working between the Council and health partners to improve communications and engagement with LGBT+ residents
- Imminent funding for the borough's deaf community through Royal Association for the Deaf, focusing on skills development and employment opportunities
- Setting up a Young People's Network to increase engagement in local decision making
- More wellbeing classes to keep older people active and stimulate minds
- Support community groups to co-design and host equality events, in partnership with Hounslow's Cultural **Providers Network**
- Flexible Adult and **Community Education** courses to support women and carers to upskill and re-skill.

WORKING TOGETHER FOR HOUNSLOW'S YOUNG PEOPLE



The launch of the Youth Skills and Employment Guarantee (YSEG) recently took place at Hounslow House and shared the stage with the graduation of the latest cohort of DFN Project SEARCH* interns.

Among the speakers were Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of the Council, Cllr Lily Bath, Cabinet Member for Education, Children, Skills and Employment; and Mandy Skinner, Assistant Chief Executive.

Job prospects for some of the borough's young people remain tough – although the number of 16-24 year olds receiving Universal Credit for more than a year has fallen from its 2021 peak, it is still almost double what it was pre-covid.

There are obvious, long-term benefits to both individuals and their communities through the all-important transition from education to work, from improved future earnings and financial resilience to community spending.

The ambition of the YSEG is to ensure all young people aged 14-25 have better access to the skills and employment opportunities across Hounslow. The offer to young people will include:

- Skills pathways that ensure young people are equipped for future employment opportunities
- Richer, better quality work experience and training programmes including apprenticeships
- Improved access to information, advice, and guidance to help navigate opportunities available through the Council and partners.

A key challenge will be to develop an alliance of local partners to help shape the offer. The launch included members of the local business community, representatives of the Education, VCSE and Public Sectors plus, of course, the latest graduates from DFN Project SEARCH and their families.

YSEG will endeavour to remove barriers and improve outcomes for young people who currently have difficulty accessing skills, training, and employment including SEND, care experienced and those who have experienced or been supported by the Youth Justice System.

Among them was Heston based Kinan Patel, a DFN Project SEARCH graduate who, following a successful internship, has now secured a job as an Apprentice Business Support Officer with Hounslow Council, and he commented: "I'm ready and excited to take the next steps in my career with the foundation Project SEARCH has helped me build.



"The encouragement, expertise and mentorship has been helpful in equipping me with the essential skills necessary for my Apprenticeship Business Support Officer role, and any future opportunities that may arise."

*Project SEARCH is a year-long transition to work programme for young adults with a learning disability and autism or both. Hounslow is one of over 100 DFN Project SEARCH sites across Europe and increases a young person's employability from 4.1% to over 60% into full time paid employment. Hounslow Council has regularly achieved outcome rates of 70% plus.

YHSH offers a range of different methods to support Hounslow's young people with their sexual health, including Relationship and Sex education, providing registration and an outlet hub for the Come Correct C-Card Scheme, and free testing for Chlamydia and Gonorrhoea.

Welcoming the new initiative, Cllr Samia Chaudhary, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Transformation said: "Hounslow Council and its partners are committed to providing our young people with the best support to help them feel protected, safe and to enable them to make informed choices about their health and relationships.

EMPOWERING INDIVIDUALS TO FLOURISH

The Community Provisions team supports adults with disabilities, who live in the borough, to access amazing opportunities with the focus on empowering individuals to flourish. The service, which is part of the local authority, provides person-centered support via the Community Access Service, Employment Opportunities Service, Travel Training Service and the Prevention, Transition and Development Service.

The services specialise in supporting people with mild to moderate learning disabilities and individuals who are neurodiverse, by connecting them with activities and events that can help them to overcome barriers they may face and reduce isolation. Opportunities are facilitated to make friends, increase inclusion, stay healthy, make informed choices, learn new skills, and develop independence.

The Travel Training Service trains residents to become independent travellers on public transport, which increases their skills and confidence, as well as developing knowledge around personal safety and awareness.

The Community Access Service provides opportunities for residents to access the local and wider community. Focus is on participating in new activities, volunteering, health engagement, developing soft skills, friendships and coproducing the service.

The Employment Opportunities Service supports residents to find and sustain meaningful paid employment, Access to Work with signposting for support, with special focus on job retention and career development.

The Prevention, Transition and Development Service provides 1:1 specialist support for those individuals who require more focused outcomes to overcome barriers and make connections in finding pathways they wish to follow.

RECYCLING AND REPAIRING

Hounslow Council, in partnership with ReLondon, recently launched Heston In The Loop, a pioneering environmental initiative that aims to transform Heston into a thriving circular neighbourhood.

The sustainable neighbourhood model aims to introduce circular economy solutions that empower individuals, schools, and businesses in the Heston area to waste less and reuse, repair and recycle more.

Hounslow and ReLondon have developed sustainable practices that benefit residents, visitors, and businesses; leading to a reduction in Hounslow's carbon footprint, and helping residents save money amid increasing cost of living challenges.

The official launch was marked by Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, at one of the project's low-carbon Eco Refill events at Springwell School in Heston.

The Eco Refill events involve pupils 'selling' their reusable products to teachers and parents and helping the school's community cut down on plastic waste.

Cllr Rajawat, said: "We are delighted to collaborate with ReLondon on Heston In The Loop as it represents a significant step forward in the Council's efforts to create a more sustainable and resourceful borough.

"By embracing low carbon neighbourhoods, we can effectively address waste reduction, protect our environment, and empower residents to waste less, reuse more, and ultimately save money.

"We hope to lay down a marker for circular neighbourhood transformation in London, as well as helping to guide councils across the United Kingdom."

Too Good To Go, Ferris, and Olio: these partners' apps help businesses and residents to share unwanted food, clothes, and household goods.

Hounslow Council and ReLondon will be working with different circular partners throughout the two-year project.

FOR THE FUTURE

Hounslow Council has pledged £1 million to tackle damp and mould in all its council homes with a dedicated taskforce being established to confront the issue head on.

The Council is now reviewing and updating damp and mould processes and procedures and establishing case review panels for any high risk cases.

This is part of its wider plans to make its homes sustainable for future generations.

Earlier this year, the Council also received £4.3 million from the Department of Energy

Security and Net Zero to retrofit 348 council homes across Hounslow. The funding could provide an average fuel saving of £110 per annum for social housing properties that receive the retrofitting and aims to lift residents out of fuel poverty.

A BUG'S LIFE: REWILDING OUR COMMUNAL AREAS

Thirty 'bug hotels' are set to be established across Hounslow's estates in a bid to rewild the Council's communal spaces. The initiative, which will enable natural habits to flourish for the long term, will be trialled until October and the Council is seeking residents' feedback on the initiative.

It also helps to tackle pollution by locking carbon away below the ground."

THREE THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT THE COUNCIL'S PLANNING ENFORCEMENT TEAM

We deal with almost 1,500 queries from the public each year!

It could be anything from a bed in a shed, a person selling cars from a residential address through to more serious issues such a tree being felled in a conservation area or unauthorised works to a listed building.

Whilst it might seem like planning enforcement issues should also include party wall concerns, encroachment of land or construction noise, these are generally not planning matters.



Just because the build doesn't comply with Council's approval or government legislation doesn't necessarily mean we will take enforcement action

The team's job is not to play 'spot the difference'. Some matters we cannot justify enforcement action, especially if it's a minor breach such as an extension which is an inch too high, or a brick type which doesn't 100% conform with the approval.

The Council needs to act in a proportionate way, and ensure that any action it takes, removes the impact to a next-door neighbour or to the street scene.

We will not hesitate to prosecute parties who fail to resolve issues which the Council raise with them

Since the start of 2020 the Council has brought in almost £1 million pounds back into the public purse because of 23 prosecutions against planning flouters.

FIRST ZERO CARBON

HOUSING SCHEME LAUNCHED



Residents in Hounslow will now reap the benefits of the Council's first zero-carbon housing scheme. The two-year project, which was developed in partnership with Neilcott Construction, saw 13 affordable homes being built.

Located on the corner of Staines Road and Frampton Road in Hounslow, the scheme incorporates the use of Air Source Heat Pumps, photovoltaic panels and a highly efficient building fabric, which contributes to Hounslow Council tackling the climate emergency it declared in 2019.



Speaking about the Council's development plans, Cllr Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Regeneration and

Development, said: "Like many other London boroughs, Hounslow is facing





an acute housing shortage. This scheme epitomises our commitment to tackling the crisis and building 1,000 new council homes over the next four years. Not only will these residents benefit from homes at affordable rent, but they will also benefit from homes with a zero-carbon design."

NEW SPACES CREATED FOR GROWING **FOOD**

Hounslow Council's trailblazing new programme, Grow for the Future, has been allocated £165,000 from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF).

Grow for the Future is a first-of-itskind policy in the UK to turn unused and unloved land across the borough into new allotment sites, community gardens and orchards to grow food.

For the first time ever in the UK, the Council will look to pair each new site with a local school and dedicate a portion of it to teach urban children in often deprived areas about where their food comes from, the importance of good nutrition, and how to live healthy lives.

The food grown by the schools can be donated to support children and their families who are going hungry.



Cllr Salman Shaheen, Cabinet Member for Recreation, Public Spaces and Parking, said: "Grow for the Future will provide

hundreds of new growing spaces for Hounslow's residents to put food on their plates as the cost-of-living crisis bites. We will take wasteland that has lain empty for years and put it to use, equipping our children with vital life skills and educating them on biodiversity, sustainability and healthy living.

"I am delighted that the government and the GLA have given their backing to this unique new programme. I hope



other councils across the country will be inspired to take unused land and open it up as a common treasury for all people."

Hounslow Council expects to be able to create 500 new spaces for food growing from the first phase alone. It plans to bring online four new sites per year and expects the first sites to be ready this summer.

WHY **HOUNSLOW SUPPORTS NO MOW MAY**

Each year, the Council and Lampton Services support No Mow May by letting grass grow in selected Housing areas, Parks, and grass

Plantlife's No Mow May is an initiative that encourages households, organisations, and local authorities alike to refrain from mowing their lawns during the month of May (and sometimes beyond).

Each year, strategic periods of longer grass can:

- Help tackle pollution
- · Lock carbon away below the ground
- · Support wildlife and local habitats to thrive

By putting away the lawnmower, mini wildlife sanctuaries can prosper in parks and gardens. Wildflowers - such as daisies, clovers, and buttercups - flourish during No Mow May, and attract essential pollinators like bees and butterflies (as well as other insects).

These insects play a vital role in pollinating plants and contribute to the overall health of our ecosystem.



IMPROVED WEED REMOVAL **PROGRAMME**

You asked, we listened.

As part of Hounslow's commitment to ensuring a cleaner and greener borough, the use of chemicals to treat weeds was stopped in 2020. This decision supports ambitions to protect the environment, promotes biodiversity and encourages

The new manual method of weed treatment means the Council has reinvested the resources that were previously spent on chemicals. These

Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet member for Highways, Recycling and Health Integration, said: "It's our fourth year where we are

managing weeds in Hounslow without the chemicals far too many councils continue to use – by which they are killing bees and generally harming the environment.

"We are learning how to cope without chemicals, and it is not straightforward, but we have greatly improved the service this year. Manual weed management does however mean clearing weeds may take a little longer.

"Weeds may sometimes grow back faster, so ongoing control is necessary. To ensure an efficient service, we have extended the removal window, and more than one visit will often be needed, as well as widespread use of the new Deep Cleansing programme."

Please check the plans set out on the Hounslow Highways website, which gives the planned dates for visits to the streets selected for more intense weeding and for deep cleansing, based on experience and what residents have told us are most

DON'T LOSE **YOUR VOTE**

The way you vote is changing you now need to show an accepted form of photo ID to vote in a polling station

ACCEPTED FORMS OF PHOTO ID INCLUDE:

- PASSPORT issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state, or a Commonwealth country
- DRIVING LICENCE issued by Britain, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or an EEA state
- **BIOMETRIC IMMIGRATION DOCUMENT**
- IDENTITY CARD bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card)
- A BLUE BADGE
- A NATIONAL IDENTITY CARD issued by an EEA state
- **OLDER PERSON'S BUS PASS**
- **DISABLED PERSON'S BUS BASS**
- **OYSTER 60+ CARD**
- FREEDOM PASS

You can still use your photo ID if it has expired, as long as the photo still looks like you.
