

We've also been dishing out our own awards, with this year's Advance for Growth competition winners being announced. The Hounslowbased small business, Wild Chai,

was successful and will now enjoy enhanced support from the Council in growing their enterprise for the benefit of the local economy.

As the world gathers in Dubai for the annual climate change summit, COP 28, Hounslow will be continuing our efforts, in collaboration with local residents, to reach our ambitious netzero targets. Later in the magazine, you will see the latest developments, from new recycling services to our free trees giveaway.

As temperatures drop and energy bills rise, we will be teaming up to provide spaces and places for residents to help keep warm this winter. So, please do check out the articles on pages 12 and 13 for support in keeping the bills down.

The Council's ambitious plans for a fuller events programme attracted record numbers of attendees throughout 2023. Eleven high profile events were held across the borough that were suitable for all age groups.

During the warmer summer months, a series of eight outdoor film screenings took place, that allowed families and friends to enjoy classic and much-loved films on the big screen for free.

Over 2,500 people attended to watch films including Mamma Mia!, The Greatest Showman, Trolls and The Lion King, with one resident commenting:

"It's great that the Council is providing this, we haven't had anything like this for free for a long time where family and friends can gather."



Marking the end of a remarkable summer programme, September saw the launch of

the smaller Greener Living Festival in The Strand on the Green Recreation Ground and Thames Road Allotment. The event, which aimed to raise awareness and educate residents on topics such as active travel, climate change and biodiversity, ran tours through Thames Road Allotments, highlighting the benefits of growing food on both physical and mental health, and how it can be done in much smaller spaces such as balconies and window pots.

As the colder nights approached, the Council's popular fireworks display was back in action. Set at a new location, Blenheim Lights, not only brought back Beach's Funfair and activities themed around Halloween, Bonfire Night and Diwali, but this year community performances kept the crowds entertained before the fireworks display took centre stage.

With 5,000 residents and visitors to the borough in attendance, Blenheim Lights was a spectacular show, bringing together communities and families.

More recently, the Council hosted its final event of the year - Christmas at Redlees, which created a fun-filled




festive afternoon for residents to enjoy. The Isleworth Bowls Club ran a market, Redlees Artists' Studios opened its doors to host a mini open studio event and the courtyard in the park had funfair amusements, reindeer, Christmas trees, Santa's Grotto and craft activities for visitors to participate in.

The 2024 programme looks set to be even bigger and better with a new Films

on the Green programme and the seasonal 'Lights' show returning. A new event series - Rhythm and Sound - will be showcasing the borough's talent.

CELEBRATING SCI-FI HERITAGE

Sci-fi fans have been materialising in their hundreds at Gunnersbury Park and Museum's major new exhibition 'Set to Stun', celebrating sci-fi film and television from the 1960s through to today.

The exhibition, spread across 8 zones within the building, celebrates the west London artisans, artists and crafts people who have been instrumental in bringing classic British programmes including Doctor Who, Red Dwarf and the Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy to television screens around the world.

Visitors will come face to face with a Dalek and Cyberman among an interactive showcase of sets, costumes, prosthetics and artistic visualisations showing how initial designs are brought to life. There is also an amazing interactive motion capture experience and artwork and models created by Delamar Academy Advanced Prosthetics graduates. You can even find out what space smells like.

Childcare support for working families

From April 2024 to September 2025, existing childcare support from the Government for working families is changing. These changes will help you with the rising costs of childcare, support you to return to work or to increase your working hours.

This will be in three phases:

- 1. April 2024, working parents of 2-yearolds will be able to access up to 15 hours a week of childcare support. If your child turns 2 before 1 April 2024 you need to apply at www. childcarechoices.gov.uk between January 2024 and 31 March 2024
- September 2024, working parents of children between age 9 months and 3 years will be able to access up to 15 hours a week of childcare support
- **3.** September 2025, working parents of children from age 9 months will be able to access up to 30 hours a week of childcare support.

DON'T MISS OUT - HOLIDAY ACTIVITY FUN



Children living in Hounslow, aged between 5 and 16 and entitled to benefit-related free school meals, are eligible for the Holiday Activity Fund (HAF) programme for free, and fun activities from 2 - 5 January 2024.

Attendees can stay active, make new friends and learn something new as well as enjoy a free and nutritious meal each day.

More than 2,381 children participated in the programme in summer 2023 and took part in a broad range of enrichment activities, including computer coding, outdoor sports activities, arts and crafts.

Interns secure roles at thrill seeking theme park

Thorpe Park is the latest business to provide supported internships for young people from Hounslow with special educational needs through its DFN Project SEARCH programme.

A one-year transition to work programme for young adults with a learning disability or autism spectrum conditions, the programme increases employability from 4.8% to 60%, regularly achieving outcomes of 70% plus into full time paid employment.

The interns will combine work-based experience at the theme park with study at West Thames College in Isleworth.

George Pickersgill, the Programme Specialist at DFN Project SEARCH, said: "We want choice for these young people and for them to learn transferable skills, not just for the host business but for the local community. We have rotations for them that range from customer services to engineering throughout the year." Neil Poulter, Divisional Director at Thorpe Park, added: "I strongly believe that it's the variety of roles, training courses and experiences throughout my career that have been key in leading me into my current role of Divisional Director which I am proud to hold."

As part of their experience the Thorpe Park cohort will also receive wrap-round support from West Thames College, with Supported Learning Tutor Sandra Julian commenting: "They've been going through their vocational training, thinking about personal aspirations and what they want from the experience. I fully expect them to achieve their visions and goals."

Cllr Lily Bath, Cabinet Member for Education, Children, Skills, and Employment added: "DFN Project SEARCH is a fantastic programme, and one our local young people have excelled in. We're delighted that Thorpe Park are on board and pledging their support to our YSEG programme."

SEND SURGERIES TAKING PLACE

A new series of Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) drop-in surgeries will be taking place across the borough to help and support families.

The sessions, conducted by Hounslow Council's SEND team, are held twice every school term, either side of the half-term break. They offer advice and guidance for parents and carers who have children aged 0 to 25 years with special educational needs. Individual sessions will have professionals from the following teams available:

PARTNERSHIP PRAISED AT CAREERS SUMMIT

The recent West London Skills Summit at Wembley Stadium brought together a wide range of stakeholders, with the aim of making west London the best place in the country for youth employment.

The event featured Linda Hawkins from Marriot Hotels and Tracy Aust, principal of West Thames College.

Speaking about the value of partnerships in crafting opportunities for young people, Tracy said: "The key thing about cross party collaboration is building partnerships and working collectively. Genuine collaboration, as opposed to competition, is very important and post pandemic there's been a greater appetite for organisations working together. We need to look at partnership models that work."

Linda Hawkins is an advocate of supported internships, based on the multiple benefits of employing young people with learning disabilities or autism, something Marriot have been active in since 2015. She said: "Our supported internships have really grown. We wouldn't be able to run programmes without collaboration with schools, the local authority and Project SEARCH. But it's also about how employers are finding out about these opportunities."

PAWS AHEAD OF THE COMPETITION

For the second year in a row, Hounslow Council's Animal Welfare Team has been awarded gold in the RSPCA PawPrints Award in two categories: the Stray Dog Services PawPrints Awards and the Kennelling PawPrints Awards.

Only two gold standard awards for Kennelling were given in England for 2023. The award recognises not just the work the team do with stray dogs, but also the care given to the animals of hospitalised residents and the support available to them.

Lee Gingell, the RSPCA's Public Affairs Manager for local government, said: "Despite the challenging situation for all local authorities and public bodies across the country, we're thrilled to see Hounslow Council pick up the RSPCA's Stray Dog Services (Gold) and the Kennelling (Gold) PawPrints Awards.

"It's a tough time for pet owners as the cost-of-living crisis continues, and a tough time too for local authorities and public bodies as demands increase and resources decline. In the face of these challenges, we're proud to award Hounslow Council the PawPrints Awards for implementing and promoting schemes and policies that protect and promote animal welfare, and support pet owners, which is now more important than ever."





A bridge too fine

The new Dukes Meadows Footbridge in Chiswick, which was opened by the Council earlier this year, has won an award at the New London Architecture 'New London Awards 2023' in the Transport and Infrastructure category.

The new walkway provides walkers with convenient and safer access to the scenic Thames Path, removing the previous obstacle of a long detour to rejoin the path after Barnes Bridge.

The successful project was made possible by local community support,

the collaboration between the Council and its partners, and the dedication shown by former Hounslow Leader, Steve Curran, and current local ward member, Cllr John Todd. The project is part of the Mayor of London's £53 million Liveable Neighbourhoods initiative and is a prominent example of Hounslow Council's commitment to invest £5 million to ensure its parks and open spaces remain among the best in London.

TEAM OF THE YEAR AT NURSING AWARDS



The service, which helps people to break a cycle of addiction to drugs and alcohol and is part of the Central and North West London NHS Foundation Trust, is funded by Hounslow Council.

Hounslow Council partners, the Addiction Recovery Community (ARC) Hounslow service, has been named Team of Year at the Royal College of Nursing (RCN) Awards, which was given in recognition of the team's work to improve marginalised populations' access to hepatitis C testing and treatment.

The judges praised the team's commitment to improving marginalised populations' access to hepatitis C testing and treatment, led by addiction nurse practitioner Eugenia Moyo-Hlahla.

ARC Hounslow was one of the first drug and alcohol services to achieve hepatitis C micro-elimination two years ahead of the NHS England's target of 2025.

Glimpses shortlisted for film award

Hounslow Council's acclaimed video about the impacts of dementia on family life narrowly missed out on a major international film award.

Glimpses, which was filmed on location in the borough, was shortlisted in the Europe, the Middle East and Africa (EMEA) Shots Awards, which was held in Leicester Square recently.

Shortlisted in the Charity category, it joined videos from global big-hitters including the World Wildlife Fund, Women's Aid, and the Child Poverty Action Group.

It follows the lives of Hounslow mum Saima and her son Adam, as they come to terms with her diagnosis of dementia. Hounslow Council worked with Hounslow-based not-for-profit video production company Capture Minds to create the film.

Glimpses was also chosen to be showcased in the international Aesthetica Film Festival, a qualifying event for the BAFTAs, which ran throughout November

Here, she offers some yuletide guidance, so Hounslow residents can enjoy a more frugal but fun festive period.

The average UK household spends around 30% more in December, and one in five people say they'll be relying on some form of borrowing or credit to finance their Christmas spending (source: YouGov).

What can we do to keep costs down and avoid getting into financial difficulty at 'the most wonderful time of the year'?

SET A BUDGET and work out what you can afford to spend. Write it down somewhere prominent as a pre-purchase check. Remember, your family and friends don't want you getting into financial difficulty for their sake; consider alternative gifts such as a babysitting 'voucher' for your services, or a home-baked box of biscuits.

AGREE PRICE LIMITS with your circle of gift-givers, so that noone feels pressurised to spend more than they can afford.

PLAN YOUR MENUS TO SAVE MONEY AND AVOID

WASTE, making an inventory of what you already have in your kitchen. Ignore 'deals' unless they fit with your plan or store the surplus to use later. Food shop online if possible, to avoid temptation and consider 'downshifting' a brand - use a food price tracker such as Trolley. co.uk for particular products at cheaper prices.

CONSIDER BUYING SOME PRE-LOVED (SECOND-HAND)

GIFTS, it's better for the planet and kinder to your wallet. Try Vinted and Depop. com for clothes, Schpok and eBay for household items, and local groups such as Facebook Marketplace, Nextdoor, Gumtree or even Freecycle for bargains in your area, or try charity shops on your high street. Online tip: Fatfingers.com is a website which allows you to search for things listed on eBay with spelling mistakes, which no-one else finds - leading to a bargain to be had!

USE A CASHBACK

WEBSITE like Quidco or TopCashback for your online shopping, as they earn you back a percentage of each purchase.

PLAN AHEAD WITH ONLINE ORDERS to take

advantage of free postage, so you're not forced into pricey 'express delivery' to get items in time. Signing up to retailers' websites often generates vouchers and offers via email – you can unsubscribe after shopping.

BEWARE OF 'BUY NOW, PAY LATER' OFFERS AND CREDIT CARDS

which can rack up the interest if not paid off in full.

LOTS OF STREAMING PLATFORMS OFFER ONE-MONTH FREE

TRIALS, so opt for some cheap home-based entertainment with Christmas films and box-sets on tap (just don't forget to cancel after a month!)

KEEPING HOMES HEALTHY & WARM

With the winter months upon us, there are some simple steps residents can take to ensure damp and mould doesn't creep into their homes. With the potential to harm health and cause damage to homes, early action is essential to protect family and loved ones.

Step-by-step guide:

- Ventilate your home at regular intervals by opening windows and using extractor fans – particularly in the morning, after cooking or showering
- → In colder weather, use your heating system to maintain a constant temperature in your home
- → Keep air ventilation ducts clean and clear of obstructions
- → Do not dry clothes on radiators as the water evaporates out of the fabric, turns into moisture and leads to condensation
- → Wash off mould growth from walls and ceilings with a suitable remover to avoid further growth
- Clean and wipe moisture from windows when it appears to prevent mould growth
- → Leave space between the walls and furniture such as beds and sofas, to allow air to circulate. Try not to overfill wardrobes, cupboards, or rooms as this will restrict air movement.

ONE NIGHT ON THE STREET IS ONE TOO MANY

Homelessness can happen to anybody for many reasons including financial difficulties, relationship breakdown, an unexpected eviction or mental health issues. Unfortunately, the rise in the cost of living means many people are facing issues that could lead to having to leave or lose their home.

Cllr Sue Sampson said: "No one should have to spend a single night on the streets. With temperatures beginning to drop, if you know someone, or have spotted someone sleeping rough in the borough, then please visit: **www.streetlink.org.uk** or call 0300 500 0914."

Reports are sent to outreach teams, who will connect people sleeping rough to local support services available in the area.

Call 999 if the person needs emergency help or is under the age of 18.

GREEN LIGHT FOR NEW CARE LEAVER HOMES

As part of the Council's ambitious housebuilding programme, five sites have been identified across the borough to deliver safe and secure homes for residents most in need.



The Council is set to invest £6.15m into the development of new suitable homes for care leavers, who are young people who have recently left care and continue to receive support from Children's Services as young adults, at least until their 21st birthday and in some cases beyond.

Earlier this year the Council placed 47 care leavers in permanent one-bedroom social rent homes to support their transition into adulthood. The new homes will help provide even more placements for care leavers in accommodation that no longer meets their individual needs.



Cllr Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Development, said: "We are committed

to protecting our most vulnerable residents. With care leavers we have an even greater responsibility as their corporate parent to support their transition into adulthood and long-term independence.

"Providing suitable and safe places to live, in a welcoming community is an integral part of enhancing our offer for care leavers. We know that a secure home helps them succeed in other areas of their life, such as education and employment or relationships.

"All new developments in the borough are identified to provide greater affordable housing options for residents, while creating a thriving, greener, safer and healthier place to live, play, work and study for the whole community."

The Council also recently agreed to build 124 new Council homes at the Commerce Road, Block B development in Hounslow, which will continue to expand the social rent offer in the transformed Brentford high street area.

THESE STREETS WERE MADE FOR TRANSFORMING



School Streets have become a staple part of the Council's transport delivery programme in recent years, but did you know Hounslow is home to some of the UK's first schemes which date back to the 1990s?

Quakers Lane in Isleworth and Brooks Lane in Chiswick have had restrictions on motorised traffic for over 20 years and similar measures have been introduced at more than 30 schools across the borough since 2020.

School streets are roads near a school with restricted access to vehicles at drop-off and pick-up times. The schemes allow children to safely walk and cycle into



school with reduced traffic in the vicinity. Requests from residents and schools help inform the prioritisation of Hounslow's School Streets programme.

The Council is currently working with transport charity, Sustrans to co-design improvements around lyybridge Primary School and Strand on the Green schools in partnership with local residents.

As well as hearing from neighbours, teachers and parents, the views of children are key to the project. Pupils have been involved through local walkabouts, classroom workshops and have had the chance to vote for the changes they would like to see. Sustrans have been collaborating with the wider community throughout the Autumn term and we look forward to seeing what ideas emerge from this hands-on approach to engagement.

PARTNERSHIP WITH LIME BIKES

Earlier this year the Council partnered with Lime bikes to launch the trial e-bike scheme in phases across the borough, with boroughwide coverage achieved in mid-September.

The e-bike scheme has proven to be a popular mode of transport with an average of 12,500 weekly trips being undertaken since August. Uptake in the scheme has been positive and with cycling having so many benefits - from supporting people's health and wellbeing, to easing traffic and consequently improving air quality.

As a Council that listens and after feedback from residents on the first

two phases of the launch, we asked Lime to redouble their efforts to address unsocial and unsafe use of their bikes in Hounslow. Lime have committed more resource to tackling this issue which has resulted in parking compliance increasing to 95 per cent and a steady decline in complaints.

An important element of this strong level of compliance across the borough - alongside residents and users understanding and respecting the parking regulations and being considerate of other road users and the local community - is a hardware fix that Lime has rolled out across the fleet of e-bikes to prevent 'hackers'

using and then discarding the bikes outside of the dedicated e-bike bays without penalty.

The Council is working in partnership with the borough's hospitality community to create a network of Baby Feeding Friendly (BFF) cafés and coffee shops across Hounslow.

This is part of a scheme to help new mums feel more comfortable and

confident when they are feeding their babies in public - particularly if they are breastfeeding.

It's crucial to make venues more welcoming to new mums (and dads!) and create inclusive spaces where they can feed their baby discreetly in a supportive environment.

The project will make it more convenient for mums to feed their babies whilst out and about, with a long-term aim to use the Hounslow BFF project to achieve Breastfeeding Friendly status for the borough.

LOOKING AFTER YOURSELF

Young Hounslow Sexual Health (YHSH), is a sexual health service for young people up to 24 years old in Hounslow, providing non-judgmental support to help young people feel confident in themselves, sexual health and relationships.

Working with young people in schools, colleges and community groups, as well as acting as an outlet for the pan-London C-Card (Come Correct) scheme, which provides free condoms to all young people registered on the scheme, the service also provides Chlamydia and Gonorrhoea test kits to educate and reduce infections.

WELCOME TO VACCINATION HIGH SCHOOL

There's a new school open in Hounslow.

It's a place where all the pupils, teachers and parents have taken the message about the importance of childhood immunisation onboard and protected themselves, their school and the community.

Hounslow's Vaccination High School is a new animation which explains the vital role that the MMR vaccine has in slowing the spread of childhood diseases such as Measles, Mumps and Rubella.

This fun and friendly animation highlights why it is important for children to get immunised and introduces the topic of herd immunity.

It explains the science behind vaccinations and their role in preventing diseases. The video is designed to be accessible and educational, making it a valuable tool for both teachers and parents to understand the importance of immunisation.

In recent years, childhood immunisation has become increasingly important, in light of the global pandemic we have all faced.

Now, with the rates of childhood illnesses such as measles on the rise across Hounslow and London, there has never been a better time to spread the word about how we can protect our children, our community and ourselves through immunisation.

The MMR vaccine is offered to children at one year of age and when they reach three years and four months. The vaccinations are safe and the two doses offer lifelong protection against these diseases.

Parents/carers who are unsure if their child is up to date with their vaccinations should contact their GP practice to check and book an appointment.

RECYCLING FLEET

Sophie and Naomi from Chatsworth Primary School in Hounslow have seen drawings they created for the Council's No Time to Waste recycling campaign installed onto vehicle panels.

The competition winners, both in Year 5, were joined at the installation's unveiling by Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Highways, Recycling and Health Integration. The Chatsworth students were deemed to have created the most innovative drawings by a panel of judges, and were selected from entries that came from primary schools across the borough.

The rebrand of the Council and Lampton Services' vehicles comes as part of spreading awareness of the importance of waste reduction and improved recycling.

No Time to Waste launched in March 2023 and is the flagship sustainability campaign in the borough. Its mission is to support Hounslow residents with recycling more, wasting less, and reducing food bills.

Naomi from Chatsworth Primary School, said: "My inspiration to do this was my other eco-competition picture (that made me win) where I drew the world, so I wanted to include our planet in this competition too.

"I chose to draw children because they can show the grown-ups how to recycle properly."

Sophie, also from Chatsworth, said: "First, I did some research for ideas to use in my poster and read a book 'How to save the planet' for ideas on how to help. After I read the book, I started my poster by drawing a hill. I drew a circle with fire coming out of it that was rolling down the hill, representing that you shouldn't throw rubbish away (in black bins if it can be recycled), and you won't be eco-friendly and protect the world."



Cllr Guy Lambert, said: "I was delighted to meet both Naomi and Sophie, and better still was to see both students so happy to have

their artwork installed onto our waste and recycling vehicles. Empowering young people to speak out is a hugely important part of effective climate action globally, and it will only have a positive effect on our borough too.

"As Naomi so intelligently put it, if primary school children can take action to waste less and recycle more, so can most adults!"



POSITIVE STEPS:

CARBON FOOTPRINT REDUCTION REVEALED

Latest data has shown a 10% reduction in the Council's carbon footprint since 2018, with an 8% reduction in council-controlled operations seen in the last year alone.

The Council declared a climate emergency in 2019 and adopted a Climate Emergency Action Plan in 2020, which committed to reducing its organisational footprint to net zero by 2030. A further emissions reduction target of 50% by 2026 was also set in place.

Successes include the Council generating nearly 4000kW of renewable energy (by installing Solar PV at 48 sites), and a retrofit of 32 schools and 29 corporate buildings that will save a combined 17.5m kilowatts of electricity each year. Further funding of £2.1m has also been secured to retrofit an additional six council buildings and schools.

The Council has also taken measures to 'green' its fleet of vehicles through its Fleet Replacement programme, which will result in over 200 vehicles – a mixture of electric and hybrid - procured and leased in its first phase.



Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport, said: "We're proud to be a leader in the

UK's climate action space, and the Council is continuing to invest, and take bold steps towards our net zero by 2030 ambitions. Decarbonising our buildings, numerous retrofit projects, changing our fleet of vehicles, and offering more sustainable recycling services are just some of the primary ways the Council and partners





like Lampton Services are reducing carbon emissions from council operations.

"While an overall 10% reduction in our Council carbon footprint is pleasing, we set a target of a 50% reduction by 2026, and we intend to achieve this."



FIGHT BACK ON WASTE REDUCTION

Promising new figures have revealed a reduction in what the borough wastes.

A recent analysis of residual waste and recycling streams has shown that residents are not only throwing less waste in their black bins, but also in many instances are recycling more of their food.

When comparing 2022–March 2023 with the previous 12 months, the Council reported a 3% reduction in the tonnage of residual waste collected from all homes in Hounslow. Residents who live in flats are recycling more too, with a 9% increase in recycling tonnage collected from flats over the same period.

A huge 50% increase in food waste recycling tonnage for flats has also been recorded when comparing April – September 2022 collections with April–September 2023. The report is also good news for the Council, given that disposing of a tonne of recycled waste is roughly 10x cheaper than disposing of a tonne of black-sack residual waste.

Provisional findings from Q1 of 2023 also show a borough-wide recycling rate of 37.8% for the period, which is a significant increase on the 36.2% recycling rate reported for 2022/2023.

KEEPING VULNERABLE YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULTS SAFE



As part of Hounslow Council's ongoing commitment to supporting young adults, two new Safer Communities Workers were recently introduced into the Community Safety team.

They will work directly with individuals with a focus on building positive relationships and helping break the cycle of crime.

Many young adults who are caught up in serious violence and offending may have been targeted by organised criminals from a young age. However, if support hasn't been accessed before their 18th birthday, there are fewer support services on offer as they are considered adults.

The new offer means that the team can provide practical interventions to help young adults overcome their difficulties by accessing appropriate help and support, including mental health services or training opportunities, that will help them develop lifelong skills and eventually go onto employment.

Michelle Odell, one of our Community Star Award winners, shares her experience as to why this is so important: "I lost my 14-yearold son Bradlee in August 2019 when he was involved in an accident as a passenger on a motor scooter. It wasn't as simple as it just being a motor accident. At the time this happened I didn't realise but Bradlee was being groomed. When I was made aware of it, I thought grooming was linked to being sexually groomed but grooming also covers being criminally exploited.

"Bradlee would often disappear in the middle of the night, be away for entire weekends without me knowing where

"At the time I thought he was just being naughty and didn't recognise the signs of him being groomed. I would have to hide my money as he would steal from me, and he had a lot of anger. I noticed a huge change in him and couldn't figure

"Having been through this tragic experience and heartache I would like to say to parents that they should take the time and listen to your children, and if there are things you don't quite understand then ask for help."

There are also local charities, organisations and support services available across Hounslow providing support for the parents of those affected. This includes the Hounslow Parent/Carer Champion Network. a volunteer-led peer support for parents and carers offering confidential guidance, reassurance, and signposting for those whose children may be at risk of or who have experienced violence, exploitation, trauma or arrest across Hounslow.

The network has a number of fully trained parent volunteers with diverse and relatable lived experience who work to reduce parental isolation, enhance resilience and accessibility to other external services by offering a whole community approach to safeguarding families, young people and adults from 10-25

They also raise positive awareness and prevention via community sessions and partnered initiatives throughout the year. Please email: isleworthmother@gmail.com for more information.

The first Violence Against Women and Girls strategy was launched by the Council in 2012. Since then the Council has delivered a number of successful initiatives to demonstrate its commitment to tackling the devastating effects of violence, abuse and exploitation against women and girls. The latest version, launched in December 2022 continues this work in tackling all forms of abuse, violence and harassment, as well as holding perpetrators to account.

Chiswick School worked with local primary schools for the show, including Stand on-the-Green, Belmont and Cavendish, to create a series of devised theatre pieces that look at the way pupils see healthy and positive relationships using a combination of dance, drama and song, which took place on 16 November at Watermans Arts Centre.



Cllr Ajmer Grewal, Cabinet Member for Safety and Regulatory Services, said:

"We are so pleased to have put this show together with Chiswick School. Stand-on-the-Green, Belmont and Cavendish primary schools have all put on an incredible performance.

"This project plays an important role in educating our young people on respecting their peers. As a society, we need to challenge male violence at every level and change the way women and girls are

To ensure that the borough's roads are as safe as possible Hounslow Council has started its Winter Gritting programme.

With cold weather comes the risk of snow and frost and increasingly dangerous driving conditions. The gritting team is prepared to carry out the grit runs when required, using some of the 2,500 tonnes of salt stored and is ready for action. Routes such as those used by emergency services, roads by schools and GP surgeries are prioritised first. This also includes bus routes that aren't covered by Transport for London.

Hounslow Highways uses weather reports, like other London boroughs, to determine the gritting needs for the borough. Residents can rest assured that the Council is playing its part to keep everyone safe.

Gritting routes include all the bus routes on our adopted highway network (not including the TfL roads like the A4 which are gritted by TfL)

THINGS TO REMEMBER:

If you have additional recycling, please present this in a clearly labelled carrier bag alongside your recycling boxes. It is important that you present the contents of the recycling in the same way you would when using your boxes. For example, all plastic and cans (red box) should be included in one bag, all paper and cardboard (blue box) should be in another, and glass (green box) in another. If these are mixed, the additional recycling will not be collected.

> Cardboard boxes must be flattened, and pieces should be no bigger than 70x70cm to fit within our recycling vehicles.



Hounslow's fostering champion

Amina is a fostering champion for Hounslow Council. With direct experience of the care system, she uses this to support foster carer recruitment.

She writes: "I have had experience of being in care, which generally was a positive memory. By sharing my knowledge, I believe that this will help with inspiring anyone who is interested in fostering. I think people underestimate the impact of fostering on a young person's life. It can be

enormous in shaping the life chances and opportunity for family life. The role of a foster carer is to assist a child to navigate their journey to be the best that they can.

"As a fostering champion I am assisting with the provision of training to new carers. I am also supporting with recruitment events like the various fostering stalls when the team are out and about, plus the ongoing overall recruitment of foster carers.

"I am testimony to the influence carers can have. Despite having had a challenging childhood, upon reflection as an adult, I can now say my care experiences have shaped the person I have become. My care experience was from the age of sixteen, and at that time, I was a typical young person, also struggling with my mental health, family relationships and feeling confused.

"As a vulnerable young person, the most important memory that I have is being provided with security, stability, and support from the professionals in the care system. I felt accepted and allowed to be me without fear of judgement."
