The way you vote is changing - you now need to show an accepted form of photo ID to vote in a polling station



#### **ACCEPTED FORMS OF PHOTO ID INCLUDE:**

- PASSPORT issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state, or a Commonwealth country
- DRIVING LICENCE issued by Britain, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or an EEA state
- BIOMETRIC IMMIGRATION DOCUMENT
- IDENTITY CARD bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card)
- A BLUE BADGE (Disabled parking permit)
- A NATIONAL IDENTITY CARD issued by an EEA state

Whether you're in search of information or seeking guidance and advice, we are committed to ensuring that you can access the right solution, right in your neighbourhood. Stay tuned to our social media channels as we expand this network throughout the entire borough.

In a month of significant events, consultations and milestones demonstrating our ambitious plans for Hounslow, one of my highlights was attending the inaugural meeting

of our Youth Skills and Employment Guarantee (YSEG) alliance. It was great to build on this fantastic initiative to help get young people more skilled and more likely to get great apprenticeships and jobs. I was proud we were able to bring big-hitting local employers around the table, including Brentford FC, Heathrow Airport, JCDecaux, Job Centre Plus, Marriot Hotels, University of West London, and West Thames College.

You will see a theme of collaboration running throughout this edition of Hounslow Matters. # YOUTH SKILLS GUARANTEE GATHERS PACE



A strong alliance of local business and education providers met to discuss and bolster the offering available for young people aged 14-25 living in Hounslow. This followed the official launch of the Youth Skills and Employment Guarantee (YSEG) in June.

With collaboration crucial to the success of the project, including defined pathways into employment, businesses across the borough joined the Council to discuss next steps for the initiative.

Brentford FC and its Community Sports Trust arm, Heathrow, JC Decaux, Marriot Hotels, University of West London, West Thames College and the West London Chamber of Commerce were all in attendance.



Cllr Lily Bath, Cabinet Member for Education, Children, Skills and Employment said: "As a group we share a passion

for the future of our young people, who reiterated what an asset they are to Hounslow. YSEG seeks to maximise the young talent in our borough."



Hounslow Council has also committed to improving its own offer to young people by:

→ Providing meaningful and good quality work experiences that raise aspirations, enhance skills and boost personal networks

- Creating good and sustainable employment
- Targeting policies and making funding available to 30 areas most in need across the borough and in line with the Council's Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion plan
- → Tackling inequality by developing an inclusive recruitment and retention practice.

Furthermore, the Council will be improving its SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) offering for young people that are part of the David Forbes Nixon (DFN) Project Search programme. This is a one-year transition to work programme for young adults with a learning disability or who have autism spectrum conditions, or both.

Hounslow Council is one of over 100 DFN Project SEARCH sites across the UK. The programme increases a young person's employability from 4.8% to 60% and the Council's programmes have regularly achieved outcomes of 70% plus into full time paid employment.

DFN Project SEARCH is a key partner in delivering the Youth Skills and Employment Guarantee (YSEG) to residents in the borough. This is further supported by the likes of Kaleidoscope Social Enterprise (Job Coaches) and West Thames College, who work closely with the Council and parents to provide the allimportant wrap around support for local interns.





Students from across the borough showcased their educational prowess this summer by not only smashing national and London averages in GCSE Maths and English, but also for A-Level results with a pass rate of 98% with over 75% of A-Levels awarded achieving grades A\*- C.

63% of students achieved grade 5 or above in Maths, 20% higher than the national average of 43% and 13.5% higher than the London average of 49.5%.

In English, 71% of students achieved grade 5 or above, outperforming the national average of 58% and the London average of 67%.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, joined students at Heston Community School, where he also studied, to celebrate as they received their GCSE results and sent a heartfelt message to every child in Hounslow who received their results.

Simon Hart, School Principal of Springwest Academy said: "We are incredibly proud of all our students receiving their GCSE results. This is the culmination of years of hard work and



effort, a true collaboration between the students, families and staff.

"We believe everyone deserves a great education and these results now enable our students to look to the future with excitement and confidence. We wish them every success as they embark on their next steps."

Kevin Burke, Headteacher of Gunnersbury Catholic School, said: "We're absolutely delighted for our students for achieving such fantastic A-Level and BTEC results. They have worked exceptionally hard, engaged superbly with their teachers in learning, and have always been exceptionally supportive of their fellow classmates.

"They are an absolute credit to their families and our school. With great pride, we say goodbye to these young women and young men as they leave school to start their university lives or to take up apprenticeship programmes. We wish them well and look forward to hearing of their future success."

Cllr Lily Bath added: "I want to congratulate our students in Hounslow for their incredible effort. They have worked so hard, and we are very proud of what they have achieved. I would also like to thank our teachers who work tirelessly to deliver the very best outcomes for our students."

# CELEBRATING OUR SISTERS

The Ghanaian Community Forum, alongside local groups Southall Black Sisters and West London Ghanaian Alliance, as well as national organisation Soul Purpose 360, recently joined the Council in celebrating sisterhood during Black History Month. The event, hosted at Hounslow House, proved popular with speakers and visitors alike.



The important theme of the event - Celebrating our Sisters – showcased the crucial role that Black women have played in shaping history, inspiring change and building communities.

A packed afternoon started with a vibrant marketplace of more than ten stalls featuring community groups and Council teams, highlighting their work in the community and around the borough.

This was followed with a series of keynote speakers whose touching and heartfelt stories were shared. Yvonne Lawson (MBE) and Lorraine Jones, who both tragically lost their sons to knife crime, discussed the wider impact it had on their lives, families, and friends. The audience was visibly moved by the way they have turned their pain into positivity with such tangible strength and a collective passion for improving the lives of young people in their communities.

A roundtable discussion on black sisterhood then discussed the prevailing levels of discrimination and stereotyping that still stymies black women generally, and the ongoing need for empowerment. Guest pupils from the Green School for Boys spoke of a greater need for representation in the arts and media, effective mentorship programmes and collaboration between the Council, schools, and community groups.

Palma Black, whose organisation Soul Purpose 360 were represented at the event, summed up their work and how it aligned with the theme of BHM '23: "For many Black women – and when I say that I mean women that are prone to racism - there are lots of things outside of our sphere of control -



things like racism, sexism, misogyny and the country's economy. But there are also things that are within your control and one of those things is your mind and how you think about yourself and how you treat yourself and what you do with your life."

Samantha Obeng from the Ghanaian Community Forum: "We really wanted to lead from the front and demonstrate what we can achieve, collaborate with the Council and other community groups to show other residents that we can really make a positive difference in the borough if we put our effort and energy together."

# Tree Will Rock You!

The borough is steeped in heritage and culture and has been home to many famous faces. In Feltham one of those stars was Freddie Mercury, lead singer of Queen, who moved to the area with his family in the 1960s.

185 Japanese fans donated a Sakura Cherry Tree to Feltham, which was unveiled at a special civic event

Freddie's appeal to fans across the globe continues to this day as 185 Japanese fans crowdfunded and donated a Sakura Cherry Tree to Feltham to honour his life and work.

On what would have been Freddie's 77th birthday, local resident's group, the Friends of Feltham Green, led a special unveiling ceremony of the tree, bringing together members, the community, Freddie's sister Kashmira Bulsara, and a group of Japanese tourists visiting Feltham for the special occasion. The tree will be

eventually planted in the newly created memorial garden.

Angela Parton, Chair, Friends of Feltham Green, said: "A group of Japanese fans came forward and suggested that a Sakura Japanese Cherry Tree should be included within the memorial garden – as while touring – Freddie fell in love with the gardens and country. The crowdfunding campaign went live on Freddie's birthday in 2022 and within 48 hours of the campaign opening the target was smashed.

"The heart-warming messages left by donors worldwide was overwhelming and highlighted greatly that fans wanted a special place to lay tributes and to keep alive the love and memory of Freddie Mercury.





"Words cannot express enough how thankful the Friends of Feltham Green are for all the support and help we had to make the ceremony such a proud day for



Feltham. It was an honour to be joined on the day by Kashmira Bulsara and the Mayor of Hounslow to unveil the tree."

## IN THE BACK OF THE NET

Hounslow Council welcomed the news that Brentford FC and the University of West London (UWL) have both received their London Living Wage accreditation. As part of the pledge, they will offer job opportunities to residents and young people in Hounslow at the London Living Wage rate.

All jobs at Brentford FC, including those on matchdays, will be paid at least the London Living Wage rates. Furthermore, the football club plans to develop a work experience programme that will benefit young people in Hounslow.

Brentford's Chief Executive, Jon Varney said: "We are proud to join the ranks of responsible employers in London who are committed to paying their staff a wage that allows them to lead a decent life in the capital.

"Our staff are at the heart of what we do, and we're well aware of the impact financial difficulties can have on our employees particularly with the current costs of living. This step reinforces our desire for creating a positive and supportive environment for Brentford staff to thrive and in turn provide excellent fan engagement and experiences at our stadium."

The UWL, who received accreditation earlier this year, includes casual job opportunities for current students as well as staff employed by external catering and facilities management companies.

Neil Henderson, Director of Human Resources at the University of West London, highlights the benefits for employers and job seekers.

"As a local employer, we are committed to offering a better salary to our staff including young people to support local



employment. Young people can benefit from a higher salary as they start off their careers, whilst it helps UWL attract and retain talented young workers to work in the Higher Education sector."

# Roaring success

More than 800 people attended the inaugural Boston Manor Arts Market (BAM!) in September.

A free market for everyone, BAM! showcased the diverse arts and crafts culture in the borough and created an outstanding platform for creative entrepreneurs to connect with the community.

In collaboration with the local creative business marketer 'I Do Handmade', the market featured 40 local, small and solely-owned creative businesses across Hounslow and West London, selling an array of designed and handmade products, including jewellery, ceramics, textiles and paintings.

Stall holder Nina, who started a creative business selling handmade accessories inspired by South Asian Culture, took part in BAM! to showcase products to customers for the first time. "As I have been doing business online, customers have not been able to touch and feel my products. Here I can meet them and receive their feedback in person. I also meet many creative people too. Each stall holder is selling unique products which are wonderful to see."

BAM! and Space M4 are recent additions to a portfolio of creative spaces and initiatives within Hounslow's Creative Enterprise West (CREW), which comprises the Council's first-ever affordable Digital Dock Brentford, Boston Manor House Jimmy Choo London Fashion Academy, and artists at Johnson's Island.



CREW is one of the nine projects in the Creative Enterprise Zones which is funded by the Mayor of London's Creative Enterprise Zone Sustainability Capital Grant Fund.

Deputy Mayor for Planning, Regeneration and Skills, Greater London Authority, Jules Pipe CBE, said: "I am delighted that the Mayor of London's Good Growth Fund has enabled the creation of a new piece of civic infrastructure to support local people, businesses and the creative industries in Boston Manor. London's local communities are sources of tremendous innovation and this new creative workspace, with its 14 designer-maker spaces will be fully accessible, inclusive and outward-looking and will celebrate diverse cultures."

# TRANSFER DEADLINE DAY

Primary and Secondary schools in Hounslow are now accepting applications from families with children starting primary school (reception) or transferring to secondary school (year 7) in September 2024. Families must submit the applications for primary and secondary schools using an online form. They can choose six schools for both primary and secondary.

The deadline for secondary school admissions will close on Tuesday, 31 October 2023, shortly after half-term. To avoid disappointment, please complete the applications by the deadline. All late applications without a valid reason will only be considered after the allocation of all applications received on time.

Children in Hounslow who are currently in Year 6 and were born between 1 September 2012 and 31 August 2013, will need to apply for a secondary school for September 2024.

# The deadline for applying to primary and junior schools is Monday, 15 January 2024.

Children who were born between 1 September 2019 and 31 August 2020, will need to apply for a primary school (reception class). If children are in Year 2 in an infant school and born between 1 September 2016 and 31 October 2017, they will need to apply for a Year 3 place in a junior school.

# Council funds voluntary groups

Fifteen voluntary groups have been awarded over £300,000 as part of Hounslow Council's Thriving Communities Fund.

Among the beneficiaries are six disability centred projects, who have been given nearly £147,000. These include two groups dedicated to autism - a swimming club for people with dementia, buddying for those isolated through disability; and two that alleviate practical issues associated with disability, including the support of carers who may be overwhelmed with related paperwork.

Four projects for young people and families worth nearly £70,000 have also been awarded, including an initiative focused on ending violence against women and girls and an innovative partnership with RollaDome org, (pictured) that seeks to increase the employability of young people not in education or employment.

Anne-Marie Waugh, Founder and Chief Executive of RollaDome, who have received £29,646 to benefit young people, said: "We are grateful for the support which will help further establish ourselves in West London. As an organisation, we have a proud history of using skating to engage young people and this specific project will focus on individuals that can benefit from what we're good at; helping kids and their families move towards more positive outcomes at a crucial time in their development."



Cllr Shivraj Grewal, Cabinet Member for Communities, Equalities and Culture said: "We have awarded over £600,000 to local groups this

calendar year, based on need and aligned to our priorities as a Council.

"The result, including this exciting set of projects, is a mix of activity that further compliments and enriches our vibrant voluntary sector."

Funding for the Thriving Communities Fund is provided through the Local Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), the Community Partnerships Unit (CPU) and the Housing Revenue Account (HRA).





# YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS RECEIVE SUPPORT

Three young women from Hounslow, Charanlen, Mavleen and Ravleen, have showcased their entrepreneurial flair with the support of local charity Hounslow Action for Youth Association (HAY) and the Council.

The trio have been part of a project that works with young people turning their passion into successful businesses. They recently had the opportunity to put their trading skills to the test using retail space across the borough, including a vacant shop unit at The Centre, in Feltham. This space was secured by the Council, as part of its commitment to finding innovative ways of unlocking affordable retail spaces

working with over 70 young people from across the borough aged 14-21. During the intensive training programme, participants brainstorm ideas, learn basic skills of design and marketing, and pitch their business model to a panel of tutors and entrepreneurs. They can develop their confidence and learn skills for running businesses.

Ravleen, a year 13 student from Hounslow shared her experience and appreciates HAY's support for developing her business. She encourages young people to start their businesses, even having small ideas. "It would take time, effort, and a lot of hard work to make

things happen. But it'd be wonderful to see what you can make of it."

Biial Karavadra. **Deputy Director** of HAY said she learned a lot from young women who are so creative and determined to succeed. "They solve problems and build their businesses all by themselves from

scratch. I am happy to see they are forming a community, the sisterhood, that can support each other."

# AIR QUALITY SENSOR SECURED

Up-to-the-minute information about air quality in central Hounslow is now within everyone's reach thanks to a partnership between Hounslow Council and a community support group for people with long-term respiratory conditions.

The Council has installed a Breathe London Air Quality sensor on the west end of Hounslow High Street following a successful application from the Hounslow Borough Respiratory Support Group.

The group successfully applied for the sensor from a Breathe London community programme designed to give residents better access to local air quality information.

Roger Smith, who is Chair of the Trustees for the Hounslow Borough Respiratory Support Group, said: "The group is delighted to have successfully bid for a sensor which will provide an opportunity to help raise awareness on air quality issues for the benefit of Hounslow residents and visitors.

"We could not have achieved our goal without the collaboration of the Council, who made recommendations on where the sensor could be situated. Many thanks, London Borough of Hounslow Council for your support and guidance."

# Hounslow is Play Streets Ahead

To mark World Car Free Day, Hounslow Council teamed up with transport charity Sustrans and two local schools in the borough to host Play Streets sessions and give residents the opportunity to experience their neighbourhoods with fewer cars on the road.

The events, which took place outside lybridge School in Isleworth and Strand on the Green Junior School in Chiswick, invited residents to come along and enjoy the afternoon with their families and local community.

Both sessions featured crafts, play, refreshments, music, and importantly, the chance for residents to discuss the role of Play Streets and School Streets in their neighbourhoods.

Will Norman, Mayor of London's Walking and Cycling Commissioner, said: "It's wonderful to see the children and families playing freely in the street outside their schools. Play Streets is a great way to kick off the School Street design process to make these streets beautiful places for local people to enjoy, and where children and families can safely walk, scoot and cycle to and from school."



Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport, said: "The Play Streets events provided

residents and the school community the chance to enjoy communal spaces with family, friends, and loved ones, as well as sparking an important discussion around the liveability of our neighbourhoods

including providing feedback on the School Street schemes at both schools.

"As a Council we are committed to making the borough as liveable, clean and green as possible, and resident feedback is crucial in shaping this."



James Cleeton, Sustrans London Director, said: "It's always great to see people prioritised over motor traffic, especially outside schools, where the street environment should be a safe and pleasant place for children and families to spend time at school pick-up and drop-off times.

"Hounslow's Play Streets clearly show how opening streets for people transforms them into sociable places where people can meet, chat, play and enjoy spending time in their neighbourhood."

# FIRST CLASS BUSINESS SUPPORT

A new, robust business support programme has been unveiled by Hounslow Council.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, said: "Hounslow is a fantastic place to do business, whether you have



## Advice and support, closer to home

As part of Hounslow's commitment to making its services and support more accessible, the Council were delighted to launch the first of its community and family hubs in Feltham.

This includes a major new community resource, open weekly at Feltham Assembly Hall and the existing Family Hub. In addition, a further five community venues are involved, including Feltham Library where Citizen's Advice Hounslow are based, and the Community Hub will be open and offering support every Thursday, from 16 November. There is also Bedfont Lane Community Centre, Southville Road Community Centre (where Age UK Hounslow are based) as well as Feltham

Community Development Association's Community Centre in the Highfield's Estate, and Bristol Court off Bedfont Lane.

This new network of support is a natural development of our Community Solutions approach and is a key part of the Council's efforts to improve its interaction with residents. Whether you're trying to find information, or seeking help and advice, we are making sure you can find the right solution, closer to home.

Commenting on the establishment of the new neighbourhood support available, Cllr Shivraj Grewal, Cabinet Member for Communities, Equalities and Culture said: "Feltham Assembly Hall has featured Council teams including Community Solutions and Revenue and Benefits advice, alongside partner organisations such as RNIB, and Each on a weekly basis for three months now. Together with our Family Hub and other venues rich in community activities, an exciting local approach is emerging, and will soon spread across the borough."

Aiman Elal, from Citizens Advice Hounslow, commented: "We are proud to be part of Feltham's network of hubs, and will be in situ at Feltham library from November. We've been a partner of Community Solutions since its inception, and fully endorse this way of providing residents with in-person support on everyday issues."

Beverley Fyfe, CEO of Age UK Hounslow added: "It's exciting to see so much support available in Feltham, and for Age UK to be part of it. We are a busy service, popular with local people, and we look forward to spreading the word."

The launch included a panel discussion featuring Yolande Burgess, Strategy Director for London Communities at London Councils, who said:

"A community hub to me is an extension of the family home. On a good day at home, our family supports us, but sometimes we need our family to be a bit bigger, and that can be things that come from the Council, or our amazing voluntary, community, social enterprise and faith partners. To me, it's just a bigger family."





# TO KEEP YOUNG PEOPLE SAFE

Hounslow Council recently joined forces with the Metropolitan Police to deliver its Annual Hounslow Citizen Scheme, which helps equip young people identify the skills needed to deal with a wide range of potential emergency situations.

Children from 38 schools participated in the scheme which included:

- → What to do if they have difficulties with a stranger on or offline
- → How to deal with stop and search requests and their legal rights
- → The impact of knife crime and how to avoid dangerous situations that can arise from the mishandling of knives
- → Fire safety including how to dispose of lithium batteries
- → Healthy eating and healthy lifestyles
- Prevention of radicalisation of young people through gaming, online and offline



- → Information, advice and signposting to support the 'Violence Against Women and Girls' initiative
- Contributing to community life in a healthy and positive way.

Partner groups who helped deliver the impactful sessions included the local and central Met Police (Cyber Choice),



London Fire Brigade, Blue, Brentford Football Club Community Trust, Public Health Team and the Hounslow Community Safety team.



Cllr Ajmer Grewal, Cabinet Member for Safety and Regulatory said: "These sessions are a vital service for our young

people in the borough especially as they move from primary to secondary school. It is important that we equip them with the skills, tools and knowledge they need to stay safe both online and offline.

> "I would like to thank all our partners for helping to organise this scheme as well as our Council Prevent team who have worked around the clock to be able to deliver this successfully."

This scheme, which runs annually for schools around the borough, is aimed at schoolchildren in year six, aged 10/11, as they prepare to move into secondary school.

During the colder months, flu and COVID-19 spread more easily as we spend more time indoors. These viruses can have a serious impact on people's health, which can lead to time in hospital and even death. If eligible, getting a vaccine will help protect families over the winter months.

From this month onwards, the NHS will be encouraging people who are eligible for these vaccinations to come forward for them.

Those most at risk, including adult care home residents, will be the first priority. Other groups eligible for both flu and COVID-19 vaccines include those aged 65+, people with lower immunity, and those in their households.

Pregnant women are also strongly encouraged to book their flu and COVID-19 jab. This can be done at any stage of the pregnancy.

Children aged 2 - 17 will be offered the flu nasal spray or vaccine, and those in

school will have the option to have it during their school day.



Cllr Samia Chaudhary, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Transformation, said:

"Getting your winter vaccinations is the best protection you can have against becoming seriously ill if you catch these illnesses. You will also be helping to slow the spread of the viruses, protecting yourself, your family and your community.

"This winter, we will continue to face lots of pressures around our health services and we all need to do everything we can to support these vital services by taking responsibility for our health and getting the protection from these viruses we need."

# DEMENTIA FRIENDLY STATUS SECURED

Hounslow has been recognised for its achievements in supporting people who are living with dementia through a major national accolade.

The borough has been awarded Dementia Friendly Community status by The Alzheimer's Society.

A Dementia Friendly Community is a place that creates an environment where people living with dementia will be confident that they can contribute to community life. The NHS estimates that there are more than 2,000 people over 65 living with dementia in Hounslow and it is anticipated that this could reach 3,000 by 2030.

Some of the initiatives that are being pioneered include regular memory cafes for people living with dementia and their carers to enjoy group activities and speak to people on a similar journey. There are Singing for the Brain sessions and regular outdoor-themed events such as dementia-friendly walks.

# HEALTHY MALE SHOT

When it comes to finding out about all the great health and wellbeing services available in the borough, look no further than The Hounslow Male.

Hounslow Council and its health partners have produced a pioneering newsletter aimed specifically at men - to encourage more of them to think a bit more about their own health.

determined to learn from the lessons that came from the tragic death of toddler Awaab Ishak in Rochdale, and our new healthy homes taskforce is working hard to implement a new approach to dealing with damp and mould.

"On top of investing additional funds to urgently address required repairs in our housing stock, we want to provide our residents with accurate, up-to-date information and advice to prevent and manage damp and mould in their home. Tackling the problem early is vital for preventing any harmful impacts to your health.

"Our new healthy homes guide will provide useful tips and tricks for preventing damp and mould, while also providing advice for removing it when it does begin to appear. It's a must read as we enter the colder months. If you do need help and support, please get in touch with us."

Heston Farm resident Anthony Stokoe said: "The Community Garden has been an amazing addition to the estate, with residents of all ages using it daily. The residents on the estate were keen to have a peaceful space for the community to spend time with their neighbours while

learning to grow produce. It's been fantastic to see children with their parents learning vital skills and lessons about where their food comes from. So far tomatoes, basil and peppers are the most popular growing choices, but we can't wait to see how it develops."



# CRACKING DOWN ON HMOs

Following resident feedback and a two-month consultation across the borough, the Council has put in place new regulations on Houses of Multiple Occupancy (HMOs).

The new rules state that if a landlord wants to convert family homes into HMOs for three to six tenants, then they must obtain planning permission from the Council.

Cllr Tom Bruce, Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Development, said: "I would like to stress that for many residents in our borough HMOs is an affordable housing option, which is low-cost and flexible.

"However, is it clear that many HMOs are having detrimental impact on the local community and this measure becoming permanent will ensure thorough oversight – protecting both the tenants in HMOs and the communities that surround them.

"I would encourage residents to get in touch if they have planning enforcement query related to a HMO."

"This vision embodies our commitment to provide safe, healthy homes for residents. It also sets a clear



The event was attended by Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport along with ward councillors and residents. Feltham Arts ran a special flag making session followed by the unveiling of a plaque to commemorate the opening of the station with the event closing with the pass through of the station by the Sunset Steam Express much to the delight of local train enthusiasts.





# £130,000 FUNDING SECURED TO IMPROVE TRAIN STATIONS

The funding from the South
Western Railway (SWR) Customer
and Communities Improvement
Fund (CCIF)is for the development
and delivery of projects across the
borough, which include an all-ability
cycling hub in Feltham and Hounslow.

This is part of the Council's ambitious corporate plan for a greener and healthier borough, supporting residents to make healthy travel choices and improving air quality.

To support this ambition, an all-ability cycling hub has been proposed that will provide free cycle training for all members of the local community, with a particular focus on having a range of adapted bikes for residents with learning and physical disabilities. The funding from SWR for this project will pay for the implementation of a new cycle training hub at Feltham Arenas with the purchase of 30 new cycles. The funding will also cover the purchase of new adaptive cycles to be used at Feltham Arenas and at Inwood Park All Ability Hub in Hounslow.

As part of this the Council will also deliver 43 new Sheffield stands for

cycle parking - providing a convenient location for rail users and visitors to the wider Kew Bridge and Strand-on-the-Green area.

At Isleworth Station, a forecourt feasibility study will be carried out to understand what further improvements can be made to the station to ensure it is accessible to everyone. The Council along with Network Rail and South Western Rail have already started working on making Isleworth station more accessible by providing a step free access to the main platforms.

A feasibility study will also be carried out at Brentford Station with the aim to improve access for active travel, providing low-carbon methods of access to the rail network.



# REIMAGINING THE STREETS OF HOUNSLOW

To help shape Hounslow Council's vision for a healthier, greener and cleaner borough, residents are invited to have their say on its draft Parking and Kerbside strategies.

With 60% of trips in the borough made by walking, cycling and public transport, the Council wants to get a better understanding of how kerbside and parking spaces are used throughout the borough to help reimagine its streets for the benefit of residents, visitors and local businesses in the community.

#### What is the kerbside?

The kerbside is the space that sits next to the footway on the road. You might find trees, planting, cycle parking, taxi bays or cars parked here. Well-designed streets and spaces benefit everyone, not just a few. The Council is currently considering proposals for lots of other kerbside uses such as cycle parking, seating and outdoor eating areas, car clubs, deliveries and green areas.

# Why we need a new approach to parking?

Hounslow requires a progressive car parking strategy to manage and enhance its existing provision to meet emerging trends. The Parking Strategy looks to maximise benefits for users and parking management by examining key areas, including parking supply, safety and security, future mobility (e.g. electric charging points), pricing, tariffs and operations, active travel (e.g. cycling, walking), accessible and priority parking (e.g. for people with disabilities or parent and toddler bays).

The consultation is open for 12 weeks until 10 December and the Council is encouraging everyone to respond to help shape the use of streets in Hounslow.

Actor Jim Carter OBE, who appears in Downtown Abbey, has backed Hounslow Council's trailblazing new programme – Grow for the Future.

This is a first-of-its-kind policy in the UK to turn wasteland across the borough into new allotments, community gardens and orchards to grow food in a cost-of-living crisis and pair them with local schools to teach children about healthy living, sustainability and biodiversity.

Jim Carter said: "I am delighted to add my wholehearted support to Hounslow Council's Grow for the Future initiative. The brilliance of this project lies in its simplicity. Take unused wasteland and utilise it for the benefit of young people who have little or no access to outside space.

"I am a keen advocate of gardening, with its self-evident physical and mental health benefits, and Grow for the Future is a wonderful stepping stone towards achieving this aim.

"I urge all local councils to take a lead from Hounslow and to introduce similar initiatives in their own boroughs. This is an idea whose time has come. Grow for the Future."



Cllr Salman Shaheen, Cabinet Member for Recreation, Public Spaces and Parking, said: "Fantastic that Jim Carter supports

this unique new programme. I hope other councils across the country will be inspired to take unused land and open it up as an educational resource."



# WASTE NOT, WANT NOT

Hounslow Council is urging residents to reduce the amount of food that is wasted each week in family homes.



By reducing food waste, people can save money at a time when there's clear cost of living challenges, while the Council can also save money on disposal costs and reinvest this back into services.

On average, UK households:

- → Chuck eight meals in the bin each week
- → Throw away 1.96 kg of food daily
- → Waste £720 a year because of binned edible food waste.

The Council launched its No Time to Waste campaign earlier this year to help residents recycle more, reuse and waste less. The ongoing initiative provides residents with advice and direction on how to recycle effectively, as well as tips on how to shop, cook and eat sustainably while saving money too.



Cllr Guy Lambert, Cabinet Member for Highways, Recycling and Health Integration said: "By being more mindful with what we waste - especially when it comes to reducing the amount of food that is needlessly chucked away - we can all make a big saving at a time when every penny counts and lower our communal carbon footprint.

"The Council's No Time to Waste campaign is here to help residents with portion calculation, meal planning, and understanding the fundamentals of how to practically reduce your food bill.

"Reducing food waste by buying less is the easiest way to make a real difference. However, residents can recycle food using household food caddies, or by using a flat block's communal food waste recycling bin - which is equipped with a state-of-the-art bin washer. If you're worried about unpleasant odours, remember that food waste is collected every week, and as such has little time to develop a smell!"

# SIGNING ON THE DOTTED LINE

Hounslow Council has signed London's Food Purchasing Commitment ('the Commitment') in an innovative move that will reduce the environmental impacts of food the local authority purchases and serves across council operations. Hounslow joins Hackney, Newham, and Lambeth Councils in signing 'the Commitment', which is part of London Councils' One World Living programme.

Nearly 100,000 meals are served each year in Hounslow through council-controlled services such as schools, nurseries, and community food and drink hubs.

Many Londoners are increasingly suffering from food poverty amid rising food prices

and increasing cost of living challenges, with an estimated 1.5 million adults experiencing low or very low food security. Ensuring access to healthy, climate and nature-friendly food for London's communities is urgent.

Cllr Katherine Dunne, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport said: "Hounslow's support of the London Food Purchasing Commitment is another example of the Council's dedication to achieving net zero carbon by 2030.

"As one of the founding signatories of 'the Commitment', we're proud to help pave the way towards more sustainable, circular food systems in London.

"The Council is pledging to ensure that food bought across council-controlled services – including schools, social services, and early years settings - takes into account any impact on our climate and environment."

# YEEP!-HA

## Hounslow Council has launched the first in a series of sustainable parcel locker networks across London.

Working in partnership with YEEP! lockers, Hounslow Council's new Neighbourhood Parcel Network has initially been rolled out to areas in Brentford, Isleworth, and Feltham.

The initiative aims to improve the borough's air quality and transform the way that residents and businesses receive and return their packages.

The new YEEP! lockers are accessible by residents 24 hours a day and offer a sustainable and reliable option for parcel collection and return.

Out-of-home delivery provides a solution to help cut down delivery vehicles' carbon emissions by limiting the number of failed and missed deliveries, and reducing the number of journeys that couriers make from warehouses to individual addresses.

The Council's ambition is to ensure an out-of-home delivery option – such as a YEEP! locker - is available to every resident within a 5-minute walk of where a person lives, works, or enjoys leisure time.

Cllr Katherine Dunne said: "YEEP! lockers help contribute to a cleaner and greener Hounslow by providing Feltham, Brentford, and Isleworth communities with the ability to collect and return parcels via lockers that are just minutes from households. By utilising our new parcel network residents will help reduce the number of delivery vehicles on roads and improve Hounslow's air quality.

"Ultimately, we're targeting a boroughwide rollout of YEEP! out-of-home delivery lockers in the months to come and will be supporting residents and businesses to make the choices that both protect our environment and increase the convenience of returning and receiving parcels."
