and provides personal development opportunities for young people living in the Borough of Hounslow. The Centre offers sessions and services for the whole family, from mother and baby/toddler sessions to kids' youth clubs, children and adult karate classes, a club for senior citizens and lots more.

The charity's youth programme provides a range of activities for young people aged 8-21. This includes Junior Club for 8-11 year olds, Intermediates Club for young people in Years 7, 8 and 9 and Senior Youth Club for 11-21 year olds. Activities include: cooking, table tennis, dodgeball, music workshops, football, media, dance, arts and crafts, basketball, information, advice and guidance,

badminton, tag rugby, boardgames, pool, volleyball and more. It also provides holiday programmes, trips and other opportunities for young people. Registered Charity 1084019

HOUNSLOW YOUTH COUNSELLING SERVICE (HYCS)



HYCS offers free one-to-one counselling to any young person age 11-25 who lives, works or studies

in the Borough of Hounslow. HYCS is a BACP-accredited service with more than 35 years' experience of supporting young people. The charity welcomes young people from all sections of the community and do not discriminate on the grounds of gender, ethnicity, race or religion.

HYCS addresses young people's emotional well-being and mental health. Counsellors work with young people who present with a range of issues including: anxiety, low mood, family

issues and self esteem to name a few.

HYCS offers young people confidential Counselling by appointment at its offices in Isleworth, at secondary schools, HM Prison Feltham Young Offender Institution and our Targeted Services. Young people self-refer to HYCS and can be signposted on to other specialist local agencies where appropriate.



SEND IN THE EXPERTS



Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) services in Hounslow have been further bolstered with the announcement of an improved advice and support service (SENDIASS).

It provides free and confidential guidance for Hounslow parents and carers and children/young people with SEND aged 0-25. As a statutory service, SENDIASS works independently from the local authority, helping families navigate Education, Health and Care plans (EHCPs), understand their rights and SEND policies, and prepare for annual reviews and mediation.

The SENDIASS service has also gone through some recent changes that have seen the recruitment of new staff, training to support more cases and

Breathing new life into schools

A number of schools in Hounslow have been given a clean-air upgrade.

Clean Air for Schools (CAFS) is an initiative designed by Hounslow Council to improve air quality in schools. The programme aims to enhance the wellbeing and academic performance of students while fostering environmental responsibility.

In practical terms, every school in Hounslow can benefit from a free air quality audit, where an officer from the Council visits a local school, makes an assessment, and works with the school to implement measures which reduce exposure to harmful pollutants. For example, an IQAir purifier was installed at Marlborough Primary School in Isleworth. A new Perspex screening and roll cage was installed around an existing cycle parking at Wellington Primary School to encourage pupils and parents to cycle or scoot to school.

The Blue School in Isleworth recently benefitted from a new green hedge to make the school area cleaner. Headteacher Matt White, said: "Our pupils are showing a great interest in the new hedges and have a keen curiosity about environmental wellbeing."



The initiative is completely free for schools in Hounslow and schools can contact the environment team at environmental.strategy@hounslow.gov.uk to register their interest.

Hounslow Council recently launched its first green investment opportunity, offering residents and businesses the chance to fund local climate projects.

INVESTING IN A

GREENER FUTURE

The scheme, called Hounslow Green Investment, aims to raise £5 million over the next five years, to be invested back into the local economy on a range of environmental improvements.

Investors will receive a fixed interest payment every six months. It means that residents and businesses can make first-hand, low-risk, fixed return investments in green projects. Anyone putting money into the project will receive a fixed interest payment every six months and the interest rate is 4.1%



Cllr Katherine Dunne, Cabinet Member for Environment, Climate Change and Transport, said the Green Investment will help turbo-charge Hounslow Council's Net Zero efforts. She added: "Such schemes have already proven incredibly successful and very popular in other local authorities.

"It's a great way for people to invest in the borough and make a decent return too. But more importantly, it is encouraging people to take an active role in lowering local carbon emissions. We want everyone to play a part and that's why you can start investing for as little as £5."

The quest for net zero

To help reduce carbon emissions, churches, sports clubs and an arts centre have all recently benefitted from community energy funding. The funding will help decarbonise the community groups' buildings and enhance energy efficiency in community spaces.

The four organisations that benefited from the funding include:

Hanworth Methodist Church who will use the funding to install solar panels

Sports Club Indian Gymkhana will replace their floodlights with LED bulbs

St Paul's Church in Brentford who will use the funding to install solar panels

Hounslow Arts Centre who will purchase of an Electric Vehicle to reduce their environmental impact.



This funding is provided by the Council's Carbon Offset Fund, which collects contributions from developers unable to meet on-site carbon reduction targets. These funds are then allocated to support community-based carbon-saving projects.

She now works as a full time Health and Social Care Support Worker - a testament to the supportive learning environment at Learn Hounslow.

The legacy of Multiply continues, with courses like Money Management and Numbers for Entrepreneurs helping learners build financial independence and support business growth in line with the London Growth Plan.

HELPING WOMEN INTO WORK



North Hyde and North Cranford have both been identified as areas where residents would benefit from additional support and services.

These areas have a higher proportion of residents working in entry-level, low-paid jobs compared to the borough average. Women, in particular, face barriers to employment due to poor health or caring responsibilities.

To address these challenges, Work Hounslow, supported by the Equality, Diversity and Inclusion team, has launched a programme for unemployed women aged 18 and over living in North Hydes and North Cranford.

Participants receive free, one-to-one careers advice and guidance from Employment Advisors, with fortnightly meetings over a six-month period. The programme also includes mentoring, career workshops, events and more. To register, visit: www.workhounslow.co.uk

"It makes our borough look unsightly, the fly-tips are potentially hazardous, and otherwise it is the law-abiding residents that must pay to clean it up."

Khiro, one of the Enforcement Officers

who has been enforcing the new fines since April, said: "I've been patrolling areas across the borough, taking firm action against fly-tipping and littering. I also inspect local businesses to ensure they have legal waste contracts in place. These enforcement actions act as a strong deterrent, and our visible presence in the community gives reassurance to residents that we're taking firm, direct action.

"Fly-tippers are becoming more calculated, but through patrols, CCTV and strong evidence, we're staying one step ahead and protecting our

Enforcement Officers also launched "Operation Swift" with the Met Police to target and stop vehicles suspected of carrying waste and check for valid waste carrier licences. Such operations see the team issue Fixed Penalty Notices and, in serious cases, seize the vehicles.

Cllr Shivraj Grewal, Cabinet member for Infrastructure, Recycling and Transformation said: "Fly-tipping is a blight on our streets, and we are taking firm action to stamp it out.

"We want to make it clear: we will not tolerate illegal dumping in Hounslow."

Joe O'Kelly, FoodCycle Regional Manager for South London, said: "We've had a brilliant response from the local community at FoodCycle Feltham - both from volunteers giving up their time to help, and guests who come along to enjoy the meals.

"We're grateful to Hounslow Council for providing the venue, and for the support from the team at Bedfont Lane Community Centre. This has enabled us to serve more than 600 free community meals so far this year, and we've saved almost two tonnes of surplus food from going to waste.

"It's a lovely atmosphere, and we're always open to welcoming more people to get involved. Everyone is invited to join us to eat, no matter what their life circumstances, and free training is provided for volunteers."

Carol said: "It's amazing on Thursdays, I always look forward to being there. The staff from FoodCycle, Joe and Molly, are lovely, and the volunteers are amazing, they all do a fantastic job.

"It's a beautiful atmosphere, nobody feels out of place coming for lunch, for whatever reason. We had people aged from three to 90 years old today and we help many people who won't ask for help and are too embarrassed to go to a foodbank. The food is amazing. we advise people not to eat before they get here!"

COME DINE WITH US

Hounslow Council's refurbished kitchen at Bedfont Lane Community Centre is being put to good use.

Every Thursday national charity, FoodCycle, runs free community meals at Feltham Community Hub. Valued community activist Carol who is the volunteer manager at Bedfont Lane Community Centre, helps to bring in local people and supports at these events.

Carol works with local volunteers, transforming the centre into a café themed dining hall, complete with gingham topped tables.

The team uses surplus food that would otherwise go to waste, supplied by food redistribution charity Surplus to Supper, a team of volunteers' head to the kitchen to plan and prepare a fresh, healthy, nutritious three-course lunch. This is

served free of charge to local guests.

Other support services are also available at Council-managed community dining

events and foodbanks. Council teams and partner organisations offer support to anyone looking for help with housing, work, health, safety and more.



Cllr Ajmer Grewal, Cabinet Member for Residents Support, Communities and Equalities, said: "It's been inspiring to see how all these local volunteers, FoodCycle and our guests, make weekly community dining a magical experience.

Community hubs network grows

The Council's growing Community Hub network connects residents with a variety of services and activities closer to home and at a time and a place that works for them.



All eleven Hounslow libraries will become Community Hubs this year, adding to their current services. Giving the Hubs locations and opening hours that meet the needs of each community.

This resident first approach is already leading to improvements. From February to April, 1,580 residents accessed support at Community Hubs in Hounslow, Cranford, Brentford and Feltham.

Brentford Community Hub opens every Friday from 10am to 2pm. The hub offers people access to a range of local services and support, and workshops and activities led by local organisations. These help with money management, wellbeing, mental health and more. For example, 30 older people recently attended a rug making workshop hosted by the Hounslow Senior Trust. They had fun, learned a new skill and met some likeminded people.



Many residents who come to Hounslow Council's Community Hubs need help with complex issues, like managing money, employment or housing problems. Community Hubs operate at fixed locations across the borough, so people can visit their hub and not be passed around to get the help they need.

To make sure Hounslow's Community Hubs are working, the Council looks at residents' satisfaction. Between February and April this year, 81% of residents said their experience at their




local Community Hub was good, and 90% said they got what they came in for.

Cllr Ajmer Grewal, said: "Our Community Hub advisors do an excellent job, going above and beyond when supporting local people. It's lovely to hear about the many ways in which they have helped.

"In addition, extra support is provided at Community Hubs by teams with specific knowledge, like our health outreach officers, housing and Work Hounslow staff, as well as Hounslow Citizens Advice and people from external organisations, like the Hounslow Seniors Trust, at our Brentford Hub."



Lali who attended the rug making workshop, said: "I've always wanted to make rag rugs. It's a very relaxing, therapeutic activity and a lovely creative way to spend time. The teacher and Hounslow Senior Trust are great and I've made some new friends too."

Heston Repair Café, co-funded by Hounslow Council and ReLondon, through the Municipal Journal's (MJ) award winning Heston in the Loop programme. It's a brilliant community project that helps residents repair and reuse everyday items from household electronics to textiles, instead of throwing them away. Hosted regularly at Cranford Community College, the Café brings together skilled volunteers and residents to help reduce waste, build skills and strengthen community ties.

The regeneration of Heston Grange is progressing with strong community

backing. Following extensive consultation led by Metropolitan Thames Valley Housing (MTVH), 71.9% of residents voted in favour of redevelopment, with a 79.1% turnout - a clear indication of support for transformation shaped by local priorities.

MTVH has led engagement with residents through workshops, surveys and events to shape the future of the estate. The proposals include around 260 new affordable homes - a mix of one to five-bedroom apartments for social rent and shared ownership.

The scheme also includes plans for improved street lighting, landscaping,





and an acoustic barrier to help reduce noise from the nearby M4, as well as enhanced access from North Hyde Lane.

Throughout the process, MTVH has prioritised resident involvement to ensure community voices shape the development. The redevelopment is planned in phases to minimise disruption.

Hounslow Council has engaged constructively with MTVH to provide planning comments and offer wider support where appropriate.

Supporting young people and families



Heston is also home to Heston in the Community, a local charity delivering inclusive sport, education and health programmes.

Through football and community outreach, the team empowers young people, promotes physical and mental wellbeing, and brings families together. Their work exemplifies what can be achieved when grassroots organisations and council priorities align.

100 YEARS OF THE GOLDEN MILE

Hounslow Council has launched Golden Mile 100 (GM100) – a vibrant, year-long celebration of the Great West Road's 100th anniversary and the borough's proud legacy of innovation, creativity and industry.



Since 1925, the Golden Mile has been a symbol of ambition and design – home to iconic Art Deco buildings, global businesses, and now a new generation of media, tech and creative industries. GM100 marks this centenary with a programme of free public events, workshops, talks and exhibitions designed to engage residents, schools, and businesses alike.

The celebrations kicked off with a launch event and will continue throughout the year. This will include public design workshops and exhibitions imagining the Golden Mile in 2125.



The Council is part of the London Festival of Architecture 2025, where Hounslow proudly features as an official Destination.

Rosa Rogina, Director of the London Festival of Architecture, said: "The centenary celebrations offer a powerful opportunity to amplify local voices, explore the area's architectural legacy, and inspire new visions for urban regeneration. This programme exemplifies the festival's spirit of dialogue, experimentation, and placebased storytelling."

The GM100 launch also welcomed a delegation from Issy-les-Moulineaux, Hounslow's twin town in France. Discussions included future student internships, cultural partnerships and the possibility of a citizen exchange visit later this year.



Cllr Tom Bruce, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Assets, Regeneration and Development, said: "The Golden Mile has shaped Hounslow's identity for a century, as a beacon of industry, architecture, and aspiration. With GM100 we are both honouring that legacy, and setting the stage for the next hundred years of sustainable growth and creativity.

"This is a celebration for everyone – families, young people, local businesses and history lovers alike. I want to thank everyone who helped make this possible, including our brilliant community partners and the Mayor of Issy-les-Moulineaux, who joined us for the launch and reminded us of the importance of international friendships as we look ahead."

How UKSPF is powering up Hounslow



Greener streets, livelier town centres, new jobs and more chances for people to connect - the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) is making a real difference across Hounslow's communities.

With £2.49 million allocated to the Council from April 2022 to March 2025, Hounslow Council has delivered projects that improve everyday life for residents. That includes over 10,000 square metres of enhanced green space, 104 new trees and 145

community events that have brought people together.

Local high streets have seen a transformation. Hounslow High Street now features bespoke planters and benches, Chiswick's "Ginkgo Corner" parklet has become a new social spot and Brentford Market Place has a revamped staging

area. In Feltham, the brand-new Green Eco Cabin is already buzzing with community activity.

Angela Parton, Chair of the Friends of Feltham Green, said: "The Feltham Green Eco Cabin is so much more than a building - it's a hub for people to connect, learn, and be inspired. From gardening workshops to after-school activities, it's already brought new life to the high street and given the community something to be proud of.

In numbers:

- → 66 new jobs created and 175 safeguarded
- → 49 new businesses started
- → 769 local businesses supported
- → 1,646 volunteering opportunities enabled
- → Over 5,400 people engaged in events and activities
- → 59 young people supported into training or employment

Culture has also played a central role. The Hounslow Festival of Storytelling and West London Volunteer Programme brought creativity into everyday spaces - with poetry, performances and popups in libraries and town centres, reaching more than 5,000 people.

With one year to go, the legacy is already taking shape - greener, busier, and more connected communities across Hounslow.




Hounslow Council is refreshing the Feltham Masterplan and since the end of May residents have been invited to help.

Much has happened in Feltham since the 2017 masterplan was created, with new homes, improvements to public spaces and community art projects including the England Connects mural mosaic.


It is currently being updated to reflect future opportunities – including the redevelopment of the former Ministry of Defence site. Once finalised with resident support, the revised masterplan will

Recycling more and wasting less helps everyone save money. This includes the Council.

It costs the Council £119.28 for every tonne of residual waste (general rubbish) disposed of. Many everyday items – such as paper, cardboard, plastics, tins, glass, textiles and even small electrical appliances - can and should be recycled. The key is knowing what can be recycled and how to do it correctly.

WHAT RESIDENTS TOLD US

Earlier this year, Hounslow Council asked residents to share their recycling habits through a borough-wide survey. The aim is to find out what people knew, what caused confusion, and how recycling could be made easier and more effective.

The survey revealed that:

- → 59% of residents do not know what happens to their recycling or food waste after collection
- → 27% have never heard of recycling contamination or do not understand its impact
- → 29% are not currently recycling their food waste, and only 22% know what happens to it

→ The biggest motivation for recycling is caring for the environment (67%), followed by convenience and habit



Cllr Shivraj Grewal, Cabinet Member for Infrastructure, Recycling and Transformation, said: "These results show

that residents care about recycling but need clearer guidance and more confidence in the system. Now we are focused on providing the right tools and information, so everyone can recycle more and waste less."

Residents can access the Waste Wizard - an easy online tool where they can search any item and instantly find out how to dispose of it properly.

GREENER LIVING STARTS AT HOME

Food waste accounts for around 40% of the average rubbish bin in Hounslow, much of which could be recycled or avoided altogether.

With summer now upon us, bringing barbecues, picnics, and outdoor dining, the Council is encouraging residents to rethink how they manage food waste.

Research from the Waste and Resources Action Programme (WRAP) shows that



the average UK household wastes the equivalent of eight meals a week - nearly 2kg of food each day - including 1.7 million tonnes of fresh, edible fruit and vegetables every year. One important factor is how people shop: buying loose produce rather than pre-packaged items helps households buy only what they need, reducing waste significantly.

Cllr Grewal further added: "The average UK household throws away up to £60 worth of food each month - adding up to a staggering £720 per year. Not only can recycling your food waste save you money, but it is also a simple way to help build a greener Hounslow."

The good news is that small changes in the kitchen can have a big impact. Residents are being encouraged to:

- → Plan meals ahead to avoid overbuying ingredients.
- → Get creative with leftovers turn extras into wraps, soups, or
- → Store food correctly to keep it fresher for longer
- → Organise your fridge so older items are used first
- → Label and freeze extras before they spoil

MIYAWAKI FOREST

SETS DOWN ROOTS IN FELTHAM

Hounslow Council has teamed up with Energy Garden to plant a new forest for the benefit of the local community.

The initiative saw 5,500 trees planted in Blenheim Park in Feltham, with the first community planting day completed and volunteers helping to establish the first 1,000 small trees.

The Council responded to local people who campaigned for more greening in Feltham, including Blenheim Park. The forest will increase the amount of biodiversity, combat climate change by storing carbon and provide a shaded 'cool zone'.

The new trees, known as whips, will be planted using the Miyawaki method, which uses a dense planting technique, placing the trees close together, which quickly establishes a forest ecosystem. This allows the trees to support each other, grow much faster and be more resilient to disease, drought and climate change.

The project will also see bird and bat boxes installed, as well as bug hotels and a community orchard. It will be delivered in three phases.





the world's ecosystems have never been more imperilled, Hounslow is stepping up to play its part in tackling climate change and increasing biodiversity. It is wonderful to see local people getting involved with planting the trees and having a stake in this woodland, which will grow to support wildlife, and help to clean our air for many years to come.

"I'd like to thank Energy Garden for their support and enthusiasm and invite the people of Feltham and beyond, to join us in planting more trees for what will one day be Feltham Forest."

Agamemnon Otero, Chief Executive Officer of Energy Garden, said: "It has been a huge pleasure working with Hounslow Council to make this mini forest happen in the heart of Feltham.







ALLOTMENT SPACE

The site has been transformed by the Council, Lampton Greenspace and Scheffel into a brand new allotment site that includes a community growing space and ecology zone.



The space, based in Faggs Road North in Bedfont, includes new allotment plots and a communal growing space that will allow community groups or forest schools to host growing sessions, share learning and increase biodiversity efforts within the space.

John Patterson from Accessible Allotments highlighted the transformation. He said: "When I first visited this site, it was overgrown with lots of rubbish. This is the first time I have been back in two years and the space is incredible."

Cllr Salman Shaheen praised the benefit of this space for the local community. He said: "It was my great pleasure to officially open this site and see this wasteland transformed into a wonderful community garden and allotments that benefit Bedfont residents.

"The Community will now have the

opportunity to get their hands dirty and grow their own fruit and vegetables.

"Revitalising this space is part of Grow for the Future programme to transform neglected spaces into places where people can grow their own food and learn about healthy living."

Grow for the Future turns unused and unloved land across the borough into new allotment sites, community gardens and orchards to grow food in a cost-of-living crisis and teach urban children and adults about healthy living, sustainability and biodiversity.

Back in 2023, the scheme received the backing from the Government and received £165,000 from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF). It has won praise from Downton Abbey's Jim Carter. This transformation was also part of the wider Allotment Improvement Project.





The Council is committed to helping all new mothers to feed their babies however they choose to do so. Its newly-published Baby Feeding Plan lays out all ways new mothers are being supported across the borough, as well as highlighting ways to help parents give their children the best start in life. A big focus of the plan is supporting breastfeeding mothers. It contains guidance on how colleagues from NHS services, local government, voluntary sector organisations and families are working together to promote and normalise breastfeeding.



Cllr Lily Bath, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Transformation, said: "We can all play our part to help

new mothers feed their children at what is a wonderful but sometimes difficult time for new parents. The Baby Feeding Plan sets out the ways that we at the Council can support mothers and it has really useful information for mothers

and their families, so I'd encourage everyone to read it."

HELP TO BREASTFEED

More than half (61%) of women are still breastfeeding after 6-8 weeks. The Council wants to offer as much support as possible to all the women who can and choose to continue breastfeeding, ensuring they feel safe and supported.

DON'T GET STRESSED, TEST THIS SUMMER

Sexual health is just as important as any other part of people's wellbeing. Unfortunately, rates of infection are increasing across the country, including in Hounslow.

Many sexually transmitted infections (STIs) don't show symptoms straight away, or at all, so it's important to get tested and reduce the risk of passing on an infection. There are two main routes for free testing in Hounslow.

SEXUAL HEALTH HOUNSLOW (SHH)

Sexual Health Hounslow offers contraception, HIV and sexual health services in three clinics across the borough in Isleworth, Hounslow and Feltham. If people are experiencing any symptoms of STIs or would like to discuss any aspects of their sexual health or contraception, they can call 020 8321 5718 from 8am Monday to Friday and book an appointment with the SHH team.

SEXUAL HEALTH LONDON (SHL)

Sexual Health London offers a free STI testing service across most of London. Simply register with SHL.UK and complete an online consultation to order your free testing kit.

HELP FOR PARENTS AND BABIES WITH THE SUMMERTIME BLUES

With longer days and warmer weather, summer can be a tough time for little ones. Babies cry for many reasons including, hunger, tiredness, discomfort or simply needing a cuddle. This can be made worse by the hot and long summer days which can make babies more irritable and disrupt sleeping habits.

NO PARENT IS ALONE

If a baby is crying more than usual, it can be overwhelming and frustrating, but it's important to know that no parent in Hounslow is alone and there is support available. ICON stands for infant crying is normal, comforting

methods can help, it's OK to walk away skin contact, humming or singing, warm and never shake a baby. It is aimed at baths or going for a short walk with supporting people to cope with crying your baby. babies and prevent abusive head trauma.

It highlights the comfort methods people can use to soothe a baby when basic needs have been checked (hunger, tiredness, nappy change) but he or she continues to cry. Employers across the borough are getting their staff's health checked for free thanks to the Council's Healthy Workforce offer. Many are taking advantage of the free 25-minute NHS Health Checks that include BMI, blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol, alongside support and advice on how to quit smoking.

EASY AS PIE

One such employer is logistics company Simmons & Hawker, who recently had a visit from the Healthy Workforce team. Managing Director John Hawker describes the process as "easy as pie" and explained why he believed it was such an important thing to do for his business and employees.

He said: "Business owners have a duty of care to make sure staff are healthy. Additionally, if you have people off sick that means they're not working. Statutory sick pay isn't very much, so staff are losing out, and you have to hire temporary staff. So early intervention initiatives like this are great for both staff wellbeing and productivity. It's a win-win.

"I'd encourage any employers in Hounslow to take advantage of the Healthy Workforce offer. People are not very good at seeking medical intervention, so these outreach programmes work incredibly well."

Hounslow tenants are stepping into the spotlight with the Residents Voice scrutiny group – a way for council tenants to influence how housing services are delivered and improved.

This tenant-led group puts residents at the centre of shaping the housing services, giving them the tools to examine council services, highlight issues and recommend meaningful changes. From repairs to maintenance, tenants now have a stronger voice in shaping the services that affect their everyday lives.

David Squire, Chair of the group, says the initiative is a turning point. He said: "At long last, residents have the chance to scrutinise the service they receive. We've been given access to data and support like never before. This is a real opportunity to make a difference."

The group has already made an impact. In early workshops, members examined the repairs and grounds maintenance services, identifying communication as a key concern for tenants. In response, the Council has made changes to how staff handle phone calls, emails and online forms – making it easier for residents to reach the right people. Work is also underway to improve updates on communal repairs, addressing feedback that residents are often left in the dark.



Cllr Sue Sampson, Cabinet Member for Housing Management and Homelessness, said: "Residents Voice is a

powerful step towards truly involving tenants in shaping the services they rely on. When residents lead the conversation, we all benefit from more transparent, accountable, and effective housing management."

Residents Voice promotion event

Council tenants and housing staff came together in May for the Residents Voice promotion event – an engaging afternoon celebrating the tenantled approach to housing scrutiny in Hounslow.

The event, which was held at Mission Hall in Brentford, showcased the Residents Voice group. Their mission is to hold housing services to account and ensure the Council delivers on its promises and that tenant voices

are heard at every level of decision making.

Guests had the chance to meet group members, learn about their goals, and explore how tenant-led scrutiny can bring real change. With support from the Council's housing engagement team, the group remains fully independent – driven by tenants, for tenants.

DON'T STAY SILENT, TAKE ACTION

Hounslow Council takes all acts of anti-social behaviour (ASB) seriously and is committed to taking clear steps to deal with it.



From everyday disturbances to more serious offences, ASB can take many forms. The Council works closely with residents and partners to address reports swiftly and effectively.

What is ASB?

ASB covers a wide range of unacceptable actions, including: nuisance, cuckooing (a practice where criminals take over a vulnerable person's home), street or residential drug dealing, verbal abuse, physical abuse, vandalism, intimidation harassment or noise nuisance (for example loud music). No matter the scale, ASB can impact lives and the Council is here to support residents with solutions.

How to report ASB

Council tenants or residents reporting ASB involving council tenants, can contact their estate's housing officer directly, or by calling 020 8583 4000. Once a report is received, a housing officer will respond within two working days and work with the resident to agree on an action plan.

Communities Team by emailing

safety officer will review it and contact
the resident to discuss the case and
explore possible actions.




